## All restrictions on communal worship and singing in church to be lifted in England

The new health secretary Sajid Javid has announced all restrictions on communal worship and singing are set to come to an end in England on July 19.



Making the announcement in the Commons, as part of the wider lifting of restrictions, Mr Javid addressed worship directly and said: "There will be no limits on the number of people who can attend life events like weddings and funerals and there will be no restrictions on communal worship or singing," he said.

There were noises of approval from MPs. In a press conference Monday evening, Boris Johnson also confirmed face masks and social distancing will not be a legal

requirement in England when the coronavirus restrictions ease further.

The Prime Minister's also said limits on capacity for live entertainment will go - as will the rule of six in homes.

Labour's called the plan "reckless".

The PM said he expected the final step to lift England out of lockdown would go ahead on July 19. This will be confirmed on July 12, after a review of the latest data.

The Government's top scientists have pledged to wear face masks in some situations as Boris Johnson said they would become voluntary from July 19 across England.

England's chief medical officer, Professor Chris Whitty, said he would wear a mask "under three situations, and I would do so, particularly at this point when the epidemic is clearly significant and rising."

He told a Downing Street briefing: "The first is in any situation which was indoors and crowded, or indoors with close proximity to other people."

He said he would also do so if he was asked by any "competent authority" and thirdly, as a "common courtesy" if others felt uncomfortable.

The news comes on the day findings were released of a poll carried out by Savanta ComRes showing that almost 60 percent of people supported a campaign by Premier Christian Communications (PCC) to overturn the ban on singing in churches across the country.

The poll found out of those questioned that by a ratio of well over 2:1, 57 percent to 24 percent, the public supported the campaign.

Peter Kerridge, CEO of PCC said: "It was thanks to your support for Premier's 'Sign to Sing' Campaign that this has been achieved. Thank you for making your voice heard!"



## Churches receive almost half a million in funding to explore relationship between science and faith

Twenty-two churches in England and Wales have been awarded funding totalling £400,000 to delve into the relationship between science and faith through the church engagement programme 'Scientists in Congregations.'



Each church has received grants of up to £20,000 to spend over the next 18 months. The churches involved will host a range of outreach activities, building on the expertise of scientists within their congregations, focusing on topics from climate change to mental health, with the aim of showing how engaging with science can lead to a deeper experience of faith.

'Scientists in Congregations' is a programme run by the research project Equipping Christian Leadership in an Age of Science (ECLAS). The ECLAS project is led from St John's College, Durham University in partnership with the University of York and the Church of England. Its directors include the Revd Prof David Wilkinson and physicist Prof Tom McLeish.

Revd Prof David Wilkinson, Project Director of ECLAS and Principal of St John's College, Durham University, told Premier more about the programme: "It's a very exciting project, and this is money from the Templeton religion trust, to encourage churches and projects across the country, to engage with scientists within their local community. This may be scientists in that congregation, or it may be in a local science project within that community. And this is to break down some of the fear that exists between science and faith, but also to affirm the vocation of those within churches who are science teachers, or engineers, or working in technology, or doing research science.

"There's a lot of folk who worship in Christian churches, who are scientists, or teachers of science, or technologists or engineers. And sometimes the church doesn't see this as a Christian vocation. And so some of the vision behind the project is to encourage those who are already within the congregation, or those who are sympathetic to questions of faith in the community to get together and to use their gifts for the benefit of both church and community."

One successful project, cited so far, is St Mark's Church based in Wrexham, which has been awarded a grant of £19,965. St Mark's and the local science activity centre Xplore! will jointly run Sunday afternoon activity sessions and a holiday club for local children, giving them the opportunity to encounter key science and faith concepts.

## Has there been spiritual awakening in lockdown?

Leslie Francis and Andrew Village examine how the first months of the pandemic affected churchgoers' faith



THE pandemic offered both challenges and opportunities for theological reflection. The Christian conceptualisation of the nature of God is sophisticated, complex, and diverse. Some aspects of the Christian understanding of God may be more resilient to the

challenges of the pandemic than others.

Those who build their faith on an all-powerful creator God who intervenes powerfully and decisively on the stage of human experience might be driven to proper and serious lamentation, or to serious repentance in sackcloth and ashes. Indeed, some might drift further from belief in such a God.

Those who build their faith on a compassionate and suffering God who revealed solidarity with the vulnerable human condition, who accepted impoverished birth in the manger and humiliating death on the cross, may be driven to deep and sincere appreciation. Some may draw closer to belief in such a God.

ONE of the theories that the *Coronavirus, Church and You* survey was designed to test was the thesis that committed churchgoers (those likely to respond to the survey presented by the *Church Times*, or through some Roman Catholic dioceses) would experience the initial days of the pandemic as a time of spiritual awakening. In our research, we argue that spiritual awakening occurs as a function of changing human experience (in this case caused by the pandemic), interpreted through the lenses of lived religious tradition.

We tested this theory by including the Lewis Index of Spiritual Awakening (LISA). This index contained just four items, and asked people how they would rate the effect of the lockdown on four aspects of their spiritual experience: prayerfulness; closeness to God; closeness to the Church; and personal faith. Was the effect positive, negative, or neutral?

To address this question, we drew on data provided by 3678 lay people (who identified as Anglican or as Roman Catholic, living in England or in Wales) who had not been involved in offering ministry during the pandemic, but who had participated in online services. Of these participants, 2280 were Anglicans and 1393 Roman Catholics; 34 per cent were male and 66 per cent female; 11 per cent were under age of 40, and 57 per cent were aged 60 or over.

The data indicate that more participants experienced an improved sense of spiritual awareness during lockdown (a sense of spiritual awakening) than experienced a deteriorating sense of spirituality.

Thus, 57 per cent reported enhanced personal faith, compared with seven per cent who reported deterioration in personal faith; 50 per cent reported enhanced prayerfulness, compared with 12 per cent who reported less prayerfulness; and 43 per cent reported feeling closer to God, compared with ten per cent who reported feeling more distant from God. Perhaps as an inevitable consequence of being locked out of their churches, just 25 per cent reported feeling closer to the Church, compared with 37 per cent who reported feeling more distant from the Church.

Further analyses identified the kind of people who were more likely to experience spiritual awakening during the pandemic. Personal factors were important: women were more likely to experience spiritual awakening than men, and older people more likely than younger people. Psychological factors were important: intuitive types and feeling types were more likely to experience spiritual awakening than sensing types or thinking types.

Denomination was important: Roman Catholics were more likely to experience spiritual awakening than Anglicans. Geographical location was, however, not important: those living in rural areas or in inner-city areas were neither more nor less likely to experience spiritual awakening than those living in towns or suburbs.

How people engaged with online services also correlated with spiritual awakening. From the survey, we learned that, during participation in online services, 38 per cent prayed aloud, 34 per cent recited parts of the service, 24 per cent sung, 12 per cent lighted candles, six per cent typed in prayer requests, and six per cent took communion from their own bread and wine. Just two of these activities were associated with higher scores of spiritual awakening: lighting candles, and typing in prayer requests.

TWO main conclusions can be drawn from these findings. During the initial days of the pandemic, Christian theology, reflected in belief and practices, led to spiritual awakening rather than to loss of faith, among committed churchgoers. Forced to migrate from their local churches to online worship, committed churchgoers flourished best when they were actively engaged in preparing for and contributing to the service. Lighting candles and typing in prayers are emblematic of such active engagement.

The present data tell us how things looked by the end of July 2020. The current *Covid-19 and Church-21* survey provides the opportunity to update these findings. Please make your contribution by visiting the Coronavirus, Church and You website of York St John University.

### Creative and Reflective activities for All Ages

11<sup>th</sup> July 6th Sunday after Trinity

Read Mark 6.14-29

Discuss the choices Herod makes in the story

Read the story and ask people to note when Herod makes choices. Read the story again and pause at each choice Herod makes.

Think about why he makes that choice. Is he listening to bad advice? Is he following his feelings? Is he doing what is right? You might want to give a thumbs up or thumbs down to the choice. And if not sure then a horizontal thumb.

Finally, discuss what advice everyone would give to Herod.

You might like to think about some of the choices we make in everyday life and that choices can have consequences.

- people to pray for the relay, and for the world to wake up and take action on climate change and climate justice - everyone can do this, too


