THE PAROCHIAL CHURCH COUNCIL

BACKGROUND

Ewhurst with Okewood & Forest Green PCC is a corporate body established by the Church of England and operates under the Parochial Church Councils (Powers) Measure 1956. It has the responsibility of co-operating with the incumbent, Rev. Clare Shepherd in promoting to the ecclesiastical parish the whole mission of the Church: pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical. It also has the maintenance responsibilities for the Church and the Church grounds. The PCC is registered with the Charity Commission.

MEMBERSHIP

Members of the PCC are either ex-officio or elected by the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) in accordance with the Church Representation Rules. During the Year the following served as members of the PCC:

REPORT

The PCC, drawn from members of the three churches within our parish, meets every other month. The Leadership Team meets regularly with Rev. Clare and the church committees meet on a regular basis: the 'In Church' committee deals with all matters within the Church, including worship, music, rotas, provision of refreshments and education; the 'Outreach' committee has the remit of bringing the church to the wider community; the Fundraising committee has the task of raising much needed funds for the church.

The PCC comprises our incumbent, four Churchwardens, three Deanery Synod representatives, twelve elected members, and the secretary. The Licensed Lay Minister also attends.

Rev Clare took up her ministry in October 2018. In April 2019 she suffered a heart attack, consequent surgery and following this post surgical depression. Clare returned to work on a part time basis in September, and resumed full time work in January 2020. In March 2020 our weekly worship moved online due to the Covid-19 pandemic. This move has provided us with plenty of opportunities to reach out far and wide to new congregation members and to develop our technical resources. PCC meetings have had to take place online via Zoom.

The method of appointing PCC members is set out in the Church Representation Rules. All church attendees are encouraged to register on the Electoral Roll and to stand for election to the PCC.

ELECTORAL ROLL

- The total number of people on the new Electoral Roll is 162 (last year 163)
- This is made up of 102 people at St Peter and St Paul Ewhurst (last year 101)
- 52 people at St John the Baptist Okewood (last year 54)
- 8 people at Holy Trinity Forest Green (last year 8)

FROM REVEREND CLARE

This has been a year unlike any other. Once again, our parish has been through a year of many challenges. This time, we have been going through these challenges with the whole world. Covid-19 and the subsequent lockdown procedures have led to us interacting with each other in a wholly different way. This has been a challenging time for many.

However, this year has also led to some very positive outcomes. We have had to embrace technology in a new way. I am impressed at how many people have learnt to use Zoom for meetings and encouraged by how we are using free technology such as Facebook to engage with people who might not usually come to a church service. It is wonderful that we now have wifi in our churches in Ewhurst and Okewood. This will serve us well in the future.

Our leadership team has been expanded to include our four parish church wardens, Jan Moir and Joanna Cadman. Along with Michelle Matthews, this group comprises our Standing Committee. We meet on a regular basis to support and lead the whole parish. This team act as 'critical friends' to me, ensuring that we are leading the whole parish in the right direction. This group is in turn guided by the Parochial Church Council. I expect everyone on the PCC to be actively involved in the life and worship of our whole parish. There are many differing perspectives within our PCC and we are learning to listen to each other. With the help of other members of our parish, the Standing Committee and PCC are continuing to work on vision and values for the future of our whole parish. The working ideas focus on our aim of being a generous and hospitable parish centred around Jesus.

On the 24th of April some members of our PCC are participating in an online PCC away day. I hope this will take us further on the journey towards those values of generosity and hospitality centred on Jesus.

Our parish is a relatively new enterprise. We are really still getting to know each other. We have had two and a half very challenging years. However, even through these challenging years, we have seen a lot of positive change. We have seen relationships forged and deepened. I hope and pray that this next year brings us a little bit more stability. I hope that we will be able to spend time in each other's company. Will and I were just starting to make plans to have parties and meetings in our garden when lockdown happened. I am amazed to see what Will has managed to do in our garden. I hope to see things growing in our parish in the same way I can see our garden taking shape.

This year has seen the formation of the Friends of St Peter and St Paul, a charity which will focus on raising money for the maintenance of the church building and graveyard. Thank you to all who have helped this to happen. This brings Ewhurst in line with the churches at Okewood and Forest Green, each of which has a similar charity. We very much need to find people willing to step up to be part of the church leadership on behalf of Holy Trinity Forest Green. Generosity of giving is still very important in the mission and ministry of our parish if we are to flourish in the

future. This includes generosity of time and skills as well as financial generosity. Thank you to all who have already been so generous, and we trust in God's provision for the future.

The work of the PCC and Deanery Synod will become very important in the near future. Changes are afoot in the wider church which will necessitate smaller rural churches working together. We want to see this happen in the best and most informal way possible. This will only happen with good relationships in our parish. I pray for all of us in church leadership as we commit to maintaining good open relationships within our PCC this year.

Being the incumbent of this parish is a great privilege. Church only works if it is truly centred on Christ through prayer and relationship. I have been especially blessed by praying regularly with you on Monday mornings and in Night Prayer online. It has also been good to have the email Prayer Space where we are able to share with those in the parish who wish to pray together. I hope that this will continue this year, and that we will find other new ways to centre our parish on Jesus together as we grow in generosity and hospitality.

FROM THE CHURCHWARDENS

CHURCH LIFE

Church activities have been inevitably constrained by the ebb and flow of the pandemic, as we have learned to adapt to its demands. Church life has largely moved online, to the thrill and excitement of some and the understandable disappointment of others. We are indebted to Will Shepherd for his dedication and tech wizardry that enabled us to present the Sunday services and daily night prayers online, originally directly from the Rectory with just Clare & Will, and then later in the open air services.

Our buildings are now mostly broadband capable, affording us the ability to livestream to every part of the globe - a challenging prospect to those of us more accustomed to addressing those we can see, touch and feel. For much of this we can thank our new Churchwarden David Steel, a vibrant replacement for the departing Peter Bennett, whom we also thank for his many years of service. As a group, we wardens are learning to adapt to life in the new masked world. In many ways, life is much the same: lighting fails, keys get lost, boiler rooms flood, tree branches still grow to far too fast. On the other hand, our combined all-weather socially-distanced services in the Rectory's driveway - the 'car-park services' - with their track-and-trace welcome and gazebo bandstand were probably unimaginable by most just a few months ago. Given that all this was navigated around a blizzard of ever-changing directives from the Diocese, it's a small miracle that they took place at all, were enjoyed by so many, and brought the whole parish together as one congregation. We are thankful that little rain fell over Ewhurst on Sunday mornings throughout the summer.

A number of initiatives and exciting ideas had reached the final stage before launch only to be sadly nipped in the bud by the late autumn return of the virus. Nevertheless, Will Shepherd and Eleanor Hurley's imaginative response to an inevitably scaled down Remembrance Sunday resulted in a remarkably professional movie of the service, available on YouTube, as is most of the audiovisual output of the church. The advanced planning for three Big Parish Sings came to nothing in December, but it is hoped these will be re-staged on a more propitious occasion in 2021. Around the Christmas period, two further films were produced, one featuring Jess Hogan Smith's wreath workshop, with the Ewhurst Village Festive market popping up to remind us to buy local and the other was a multi-part nativity featuring a number of children. We are blessed indeed to have the services of Will Shepherd, throughout all this, in solution to all manner of digital and physical technological problems thrown up by the shift in the parish's direction of ministry. We trust that later 2021 will see us in calmer waters.

APCM Report 2020-21

OKEWOOD

2020 marks the 800th year since the founding of St John the Baptist, Okewood, and we were hoping to celebrate this with a number of events through the spring and summer of the year. However these were further casualties of pandemic that has affected us all so much. We hope that some of these can be arranged once the pandemic restrictions are eased. Then in September, in the lull between the pandemic enforced closures, one of the ceiling panels collapsed, dropping plaster over where the congregation would have been sitting. We suspect this was triggered by a low flying helicopter over the church which occurred whilst we were at an open air service in Ewhurst.

The church did open later in the year briefly, with socially distance spacing, which although was uncomfortable, it was great to see each other in person again. Sadly at the time of writing, we again have been in lockdown, but we look forward to a time of meeting in the church again soon.

Some ongoing work at the church and churchyard continue, and we are grateful as ever to Mairi Inglis-Jones for her tireless work in the churchyard, and to the Friends for financing certain maintenance activities such as clearing the blockage in the culvert and repairing the damaged road surface above, removal of some dead and dying trees and maintaining the fences around the perimeter.

- 3. Canon Woodhams reported that the Deanery Synod elections would take place on a date to be decided in 2021.
- 4. A discussion followed regarding churches opening or not during the "shutdown" followed by Parish plans for Services in the run-up to and including Holy Week and Easter.
- 5. The next Deanery meeting is hoped to be held in person in July.

VIRTUAL COFFEE MORNING



Altogether, the course provided another forum for fellowship in the isolation of lockdown, as well as growth in our Christian understanding.

YOUTH TEAM

This year's youth ministry in the parish has been challenging and slightly different due to the pandemic. However, the youth team has worked really hard to ensure some youth ministry has continued during these difficult times. We have maintained our regular youth team meetings via zoom and have set up a WhatsApp group enabling us to communicate quickly and easily as we cannot meet face to face. This time last year we soon realised the youth work within the parish was not going to be able to continue in its usual format. The holiday club was cancelled for the summer of 2020 and sadly this remains the case for 2021. Focussing on the positive, the following is what we have been able to achieve:

- At the beginning of lockdown in 2020, we filmed a few services for the youth which included a Easter Fun Family Easter service. This comprised our youth using puppets, an Easter story by Clare, craft, prayers and songs.
- In April 2020, the children sang a
 wonderful version of Be Still for the
 Presence of The Lord and was recorded
 and shared on Facebook. This was followed
 with a rousing rendition of My Lighthouse.
- One family also took part in a recording of 'The Blessing' featuring children singing around the world which again was shared to Facebook.
- We also recorded a fun family Pentecost Service in six parts. This was uploaded to Facebook and included the story of Pentecost, a puppet show, a craft activity, prayers and music which was a song sung by all the children in the parish.

- Outdoor Services were held during the summer of 2020 and some children took part in the music and singing.
- We held bible story sessions called JAM –
 Jesus and Me which were live on Facebook
 at 6pm.
- Recorded assemblies have been created for Ewhurst School and more recently Clare is leading weekly assemblies. The school has been very appreciative for this continued regular contact. Several parents of children in parish have commented how much they have enjoyed the activities and the connection the youth team have provided during the pandemic.
- Christingle bags were compiled and handed out to Ewhurst School and the children in the parish. Many thanks to Sarah and Michelle for putting these together. A muddy Christingle footprint trail was also put up around each of the church grounds for families to participate in. The posters and activity sheets were available via the church website for families who where self-isolating or unable to visit for any reason. Therefore, expanding our outreach further.
- Several of the children took part in a
 wonderful Nativity production filmed
 around our villages which the older
 children really enjoying participating in
 and was a great success. This was
 broadcast on Facebook across the 12 days
 leading up to Christmas Eve.
- The Nativity Posada usually is a physical nativity set which visits many families

around the parish, however due to Covid this was not possible this year. Instead Nativity colouring sheets were completed by different members of the parish and displayed in their windows and photos were taken and uploaded to the church Facebook page, which created our 'Nativities Around the Parish'. Colouring pictures were available from the website and were also put up at each church for people to collect if they did not have access to a printer.

Continuing from the success of the Christingle bags we compiled Easter Bags for 2021 which were distributed to our parish school, the two nursery schools and about 25 other parish children. These included a small chocolate bunny, an egg colouring prayer sheet, an Easter booklet appropriate to their age and a craft activity. The bags included a leaflet inviting them to make an Easter Garden and send pictures of their creations which are being uploaded to Facebook.

During the year we said a few fond farewells.

Sue Godby was a huge part of the Youth Team for many years at Okewood and more recently was a pivotal part of helping unify activities across the new parish. We said our goodbyes and thanks in a special service as Sue and Tony have now moved to be nearer their grandchildren.

Catherine Strange has decided to step back this year and we would like to acknowledge all her hard work on the youth team over the past few years. The Sparks family have moved churches and we would like to thank them for all their hard work and commitment at Forest Green especially their involvement with Messy Church.

During the year ahead we would like to hold some face-to-face sessions with our youngsters when it is appropriate to do so. However, many of the above ideas have been popular and some we will continue going forward. One of the big positives is using Facebook as way of communicating which seems to have been well received by our older youngsters and families. It would be lovely to be able to have messy church services again too but for the foreseeable future we will continue adhering to Church of England guidance regarding the pandemic.

BABY & TODDLER GROUP

At the present time we have nothing to add to our previous report due to the group being closed due to Covid.

I have been telephoning some of the families to offer support during this very stressful time.

Mary and I have both had our "jabs" and once we have had our second ones we are keen to restart the group once we are allowed. We believe it has been very hard on families with new babies, plus families with pre-schoolers and school age children.

The social isolation has been particularly hard for first time mums because mixing with other mums enables them to gain confidence with what is "normal" with the friendly support the group is able to offer. There is an awful amount of conflicting advice on the internet, plus the amount of "guilt" about doing the supposed right thing.

At least there is now light at the end of the tunnel and hopefully we will be able to resume soon.

SAFEGUARDING

Safeguarding is a priority in our parish. The role of the Parish Safeguarding Officer is to support the incumbent and PCC in ensuring relevant polices are implemented.

SAFEGUARDING TRAINING

Just as a reminder, all PCC members need to complete Basic Awareness of Safeguarding training. This can be done online. There is currently no face-to-face training.

As congregations return into churches and activities restart post Covid, we should take the opportunity to review safeguarding training requirements of all roles.

DBS

We continue making sure that all DBS checks are in place for relevant roles. Making sure people know who to contact regarding safeguarding concerns or queries - PSO contact details are on the Pew Sheet, parish website, on church noticeboards and in the parish magazine News&Views.

SAFEGUARDING MEETINGS

Periodical meetings with Rev Clare to discuss the continual development of implementing the Safeguarding policies in our parish.

Safeguarding Audit notification of this year's requirements have not been received but it is expected that the safeguarding Audit will be required. It is good practice to complete anyway as we return to face to face services.

SAFER RECRUITMENT

To do this effectively as a parish we need to have job descriptions for all roles. We also need to ensure that references are obtained for all those entering new roles and that DBS checks and relevant safeguarding training is agreed to be undertaken and that people are supported in training. This is an area we are still working on developing within the parish.

RISK ASSESSMENTS

As we return to services and activities, Risk Assessments will need to be reviewed and updated if needed. Risk Assessments are to be reviewed annually.

Adoption of Church of England, Promoting a Safer Church Policy Statement, House of Bishop's Practice Guidance and support the Diocesan safeguarding protocols for the Year 2021/2022 – this needs to be agreed and adopted at the first PCC meeting following the AGM

EWHURST CE INFANT SCHOOL

At Ewhurst School, this academic year continues to be very different as we live in a pandemic. We are creative and innovative to support the education for the children attending Ewhurst School whilst mitigating the risk of coronavirus.

On Monday 8th March, we were delighted to welcome all the pupils back to school after eight weeks of learning at home. During the National Lockdown 3 (from 5th January), the school remained open to children of critical workers, vulnerable and SEN children which resulted in nearly 40% of the children attending school daily. The teaching team co-ordinated remote 'live' lessons through Microsoft Teams for those learning at home as well as teaching the children in school. As a school community we stayed well connected to families at home through a range of

platforms. I led an act of worship for those at home each Friday afternoon via Microsoft Teams that was very well attended. The use of technology soared during this last lockdown along with everyone increasing his or her skills for the benefit of those children learning at home.

Throughout this year, we have continued to maintain our Christian distinctiveness enabling children to flourish. The Christian calendar is actively followed. In December, during Advent we had an exciting filming day and created a

We also held an end of term candlelit service for families, staff & governors on zoom. The children really enjoyed the individual Christingle packs made by the children & youth team and a number of families joined the live national service. In school, we still managed to hold a number of traditional events such as 'Christmas Secrets' online ordering of presents from the PTA and a Christmas party lunch with an outdoor visit from Father Christmas!

For the Spring term, we have valued the collective worship material provided by Guildford Diocesan Education Team on the theme of 'Kingdom Living'. Sadly, the plans we had hoped for increased contact via Microsoft Teams with Clare and the children and youth team has been very limited for a number of reasons. We are very grateful for the videos that have been made and shared in school by the team.

We still await our statutory inspection for Anglican and Methodist schools (SIAMS)

The school continues to be in need of financial support from the local community. Funding for schools from the DfE is based on a set amount per pupil, which causes great challenges for very small schools, such as Ewhurst, experiencing a lower number of pupils. PARISH VENUES

THE WILSON ROOM

The Wilson Room at Ewhurst is a fabulous resource for the wider parish. It has a beautiful oakbeamed, large communal room, a fully equipped kitchen, disabled toilets and is home to the Parish Office. As such it is a warm, attractive place to welcome people and hold host of church-focused events and meetings. The Wilson Room has allowed the church to broaden its ministry with a range of activities and groups: informal services; bible study and fellowship courses; Treasure Seekers (Sunday School); SNAK youth group; Lent lunches; Baby and Toddler groups; social and fundraising events; PCC meetings. Like many other church halls and venues the Wilson Room has not had much opportunity to be used this year.

THE ARK

The Ark at Okewood is where 'Megazone' (Sunday School) and other church activities regularly take place. It is also available to churches seeking a venue for away-days, quiet days or retreats. We continue to have repeat bookings from various churches who love to come to our beautiful, peaceful setting. The poor condition of parts of the road surface up to the Ark is giving some concern and investigations are underway to find out the extent of the repair work required. The Ark continues to function, but would benefit from a dedicated team of people willing to devote some time and energy into developing its potential. Again, ideas for how to further use this unique woodland venue will be worked on and any inspiration is very welcomed.

FUNDRAISING

The Fundraising Group was set up in Ewhurst in 2010 to cover the extra parish costs incurred once the Diocese stopped paying towards ministry costs. Jan Allen, Jackie Avery, Jane Harry, Phil Henry, Jackie May, James Meyer, Martin Lockwood and Colin Stewart were in this original group. Later, Clive Ward joined in 2017 as we became involved with the Roof Repair Team. In 2019, the group was joined by Barry Thompson and Peter Bennett from Okewood and Forest Green as two of the fund raising events became more parish based. Sadly, James Meyer died in 2014 after helping launch the Group and Phil Henry died in 2019 after nine years of carefully managing the Gift Aid for Ewhurst and our finances. Whatever was happening, he was always there to help. Clive Ward kindly took on the Treasurer's job for us.

Over the years, the group has raised over £70,000 towards church funds, as well as making the church a focal point for village activities, involving as many people as possible from the wider community. The Ewhurst Fundraising Group then became instrumental in fundraising with the Roof Repair Team, which included Clive Ward, to raise urgently needed funds for the chancel repairs at St Peter and St Paul, Ewhurst. Together, the two teams have raised over £270,000 in grants and fundraising for this vital work.


The main Heritage Lottery Grant of £220,000 comes to an end in June 2021. To ensure funding for church repairs continues, the Ewhurst part of the parish fundraising group have now joined with the Roof Repair Team to set up a new charity the Friends of St Peter and St Paul (FSPSP), whose objective is to raise funds for this purpose.

The Ewhurst part of the Fundraising Group resigned from the group in September 2020 to focus on working for the new charity. This is in line with the other two churches in the parish, St John the Baptist Okewood and Holy Trinity, Forest Green who have had their own "Friends" for over 6 years. Parish fundraising is now covered by the parish Finance Group and is focused on Ministry.

Members of the Ewhurst Fundraising Group would like to thank the many organisations and people who have supported them over the past ten years with donations of goods and money, giving up time to help and always being there at the events. We could not manage without you – and hope you will embrace our new Friends charity in the same way.

BUILDING MAINTENANCE

ROOF REPAIR PROJECT TEAM, EWHURST

Four years ago in January 2017, part of the chancel ceiling collapsed due to water ingress and our epic journey began. A full inspection showed that the whole roof structure was in need of repair with, the chancel being the most damaged. This work is almost finished but a new beginning lies ahead to address the rest of the church building.

Most of the repair works to the chancel and bell tower were completed in 2020. However, the team was able to persuade the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) grant managers that some of the unspent grant money could be used for additional repairs to the church. The first of these, the minor roof repairs to the south side of the nave were completed last year. The additional stonework repairs to the bell tower buttresses are now completed, as is the beautiful repair to work to the west porch.

In December 2020, these repairs, along with the original work to the chancel and bell tower, were all given their final inspections by the church architect, Rena Pitsilli Graham. The few "snags" noted during the inspection will be dealt with before April this year.

During her visit in December, Rena noted that there were loose or missing roof slabs and slates on the north roof of the nave and the east roof of the vestry. Again, the team applied to HLF to use HLF money for these additional repairs, which was granted. The work was not part of the original Faculty, so the team, with permission from the PCC applied for Archdeacons Permission for the repairs, which has also been granted. The work will be done by BJN roofers, who worked on the chancel roof.

The educational side of the HLF grant is also nearing completion. Ten large vertical banners, each showing how parts of the church appeared in the past are now ready to be used. They are designed to go up in the church for people to see how the church has changed to what it is now. Questions and information on the banners help to give insight to the changes. The Team, along with the new charity Friends of St Peter and St Paul (FSPSP), plan to use these for adult tours of the church, along with visiting school groups of varying ages who will also have specifically designed worksheets.

Part of the education funding is for a storage unit for education equipment. Roser and Elms, the Ewhurst joinery firm, have been commissioned to make a bespoke light oak coloured wheeled storage unit to go at the back of the south transept. The cupboard should be ready by June. We look forward to inviting schools and adult groups experience the new information as soon as possible!

Although HLF gave us £220,000 the actual cost was over £280,000. The Team would like to thank all the local and other organisations plus the many people from near and far who have helped us raise the additional funds needed for this work. You gave us donations, goods to raffle or sell, gave us help at events and most important of all, gave us support and encouragement – we could not have done it without you.

BUILDING MAINTENANCE Cont'd

The Heritage Lottery funding finishes this June but the Team is well aware that the church is still on the "At Risk" Register. To safeguard future funding for repairs, the Team have joined with the Ewhurst fund raising group to set up a new charity, the Friends of St Peter and St Paul. (FSPSP) We do hope you will give the new charity the same support as you have shown us.

FRIENDS OF ST PETER & ST PAUL, EWHURST

This new charity has evolved from the Roof Repair Team and the Ewhurst Fund Raising Group with the sole objective to continue to raise funds for the repair and conservation of our beautiful and historic village church. Its full title is Friends of St Peter and St Paul Ewhurst but is abbreviated to FSPSP.

Although the objective is to raise money, the charity will also foster the educational and historic importance of the church and it place at the heart of the village to promote Christian worship and values. We see the charity as part of the wider life of the village and plan to involve other village organisations in all we do. As with the Fundraising Group and the Roof Repair Group, we want to involve the village as much as we can and hope you will support us and our events.

The FSPSP is an independent charity from the PCC but was set up in consultation with it. Adopted Resolutions are in place to make clear the relationship between the two charities on how repair work is done and the use of parish facilities.

The setting up of the Friends of St Peter and St Paul, puts Ewhurst church in line with St John the Baptist, Okewood and Holy Trinity, Forest Green who have had their own "Friends" charities for over six years.

The FSPSP held the Inaugural Meeting of the Founder Trustees in February. Personnel and posts are as follows:

A Trust deed, in accordance with Charity Commission guidelines has been drawn up and signed by the Trustees. We are in the process of applying to the Charity Commissioners for Registered Charity Status. Information about the new charity has been sent to various village organisations explaining how we would hope to benefit them and asking for their support. We also need the support of individuals and will be sending an information flyer to all Ewhurst households before the end of the summer and a new website will be set up to help us spread our message more

widely. Once we have Registered Charity status we plan to appoint three more Trustees to better reflect the village community.

In the meantime, FSPSP have set up a bank account and are able to receive both one-off donations and monthly payments to help preserve this beautiful building which has been at the heart of the village for so many centuries. FRIENDS OF ST JOHN THE BAPTIST, OKEWOOD

2020 will be long remembered as an extraordinary year. Whilst the Covid 19 pandemic placed major constraints on our activities, three trustees meetings were held during the year and progress made in a number of areas.

As planned the road surface pot-holes in the lower car park were filled and a major blockage of the culvert, which had caused an area of flooding, was cleared.

A quinquennial report was prepared by Peter Williams FRICS of PWA following an inspection in March which concluded that no critical repairs are required apart from redecoration of external rainwater pipes and routine repairs. However, the quinquennial report was subject to an addendum prepared later in the year following damage to a number of ceiling plaster panels caused by a helicopter hovering above the Church in September.

A number of ceiling panels were replaced by a specialist plasterer and our Quinquennial Surveyor has recommended that 20 further panels require reinforcement or replacement at a cost of £8,000.

The trustees are concerned with the condition of a number of ash trees adjacent to the access road to the "Ark" which are exhibiting evidence of "ash die back". Three trees were felled by APK Tree Services in the Autumn and further felling is expected in 2021.

The pandemic forced us to defer the octocentenary celebrations but it is hoped that this can be held in 2021.

During the year Tony Godby resigned as a trustee in view of his move to Petersfield and we are most grateful for the significant contribution he has made to the charity over the years. We were delighted to welcome Phil Waller as a trustee in October and he is spearheading an update of our charity's website.

TREASURER

What a year we have had. Due to the pandemic and shut down of a lot of what we do, our income was falling. The newly formed Finance team put together a stewardship campaign. This campaign raised an extra £12,000 of planned giving with some able to tick the gift aid box this alone help bridge the huge deficit we were facing at the beginning of 2020. With this and savings we made and a grant from the diocese to reduce the Parish share by £3,000 we ended an unusual year of a deficit of £371.84.

With this we also received a substantial donation restricted to Ministry. Clare and the leadership team have some plans which you will soon see.

This year we put together a finance committee, this committee is responsible for reviewing and monitoring financial policies. It reviews and monitors the annual budget and assist the Treasurer with stewardship and financial management of the Parish.

We are incredibly grateful to our Independent Examiner Jill Wright FCCA Hon. Treasurer Frensham PCC. EOFG have joined a small group of churches in the diocese, and we are examining each other's accounts for free. I examine Goldsworth Park.

RESERVE POLICY

The Finance Committee of the PCC conducts an annual review of the level of reserves by considering risks associated with the various income streams, expenditure plans and balance sheet items. This enables an estimate to be made of the level of reserves that are sufficient to continue to meet its objectives.

Risks and issues considered in making this judgement included:

- The over dependence on any single source of income or likelihood of downturn in income
- The period of time required to re-establish income streams or downsize activities
- The adequacy of control over budgets
- The requirement for a reasonable level of working capital

The PCC has agreed that we should hold unrestricted funds equal to at least a minimum of three months' budgeted unrestricted expenditure.

The PCC has in addition restricted funds totalling £289,362. The purpose of these restricted funds is detailed below.

The Parish of Ewhurst with Okewood & Forest Green PCC is a corporate body established by the Church of England and operates under the Parochial Church Councils (Powers) Measure 1956. It has the responsibility of co-operating with the incumbent, Rev. Clare Shepherd (from 01.10.18), in promoting to the ecclesiastical parish the whole mission of the Church: pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical. It also has the maintenance responsibilities for the Church and the Church grounds. The PCC is registered with the Charity Commission.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in notes to the accounts and comply with the charity's governing document, the Charities Act 2011 and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard FRS102.
