Pastoral Letter #15

24th June 2020

Dear Church Family,

It's been lovely to open the church each morning and know that All Saints' Rampton is open too. There have been visitors each day to enjoy the quiet and tranquillity that the space provides. Thank you for leaving the little cards on the chairs so we know which ones to clean.

This morning I listened to a new song by John L. Bell which he has written to reflect our current experiences of physical separation and isolation. It's called 'We will meet' and the words are:

We will meet when the danger is over,
we will meet when the sad days are done;
we will meet sitting closely together
and be glad our tomorrow has come.

*Until then may we always discover
faith and love to determine the way.
That's our hope and God's will and our calling
for our lives and for ev'ry new day.*

We will join to give thanks and sing gladly,
we will join to break bread and share wine;
and the peace that we pass to each other
will be more than a casual sign.

So, let's make with each other a promise
that when all we've come through is behind,
we will share what we missed and find meaning
in the things that once troubled our mind.

You can listen to the song at www.iona.org.uk and I'll try to include it during one of our online services. New guidance is due shortly following Boris' announcement that church services can resume in our buildings but we are unlikely initially to be able to share communion in the usual way or sing. I attended a leadership webinar last week called 'Leadership in Lockdown' which sensibly advised us not to rush back to worship if it ends up being much less than we can do online. PCC will be considering this when it meets tonight at 7.30pm.

As the easing of lockdown now enables socially distanced garden visits, I'm very happy to visit people at home if this is something you'd like. Just let me know.

Sun 28th June at 11am – coffee and chat after the service using Zoom. Do join us and catch up with one another.

Sun 28th June at 6pm – Evening Prayer using Zoom led this week by Cheryl Lowe. If you want to join, please let Cheryl (cheryl@cynewulf.co.uk) know, and she’ll send you a link to the service. This week, we conclude our sermon series on The Lord’s Prayer by looking at the word ‘Amen’.
