### Pastoral Letter #44

20<sup>th</sup> January 2021

Dear Church Family,

I don't know about you but I always enjoy having flowers in the house. Martyn frequently complains when I add a bunch to the weekly shop (regarding it as a bit of an extravagance) but seeing flowers, for me, is a real pick me up. As I sit with my coffee during a break in the middle of a busy morning, I notice the colours. I notice how far they have opened, how long they might have left, the intricacies of their leaves and petals. I also notice when it's the right time to say that they've come to their end, and then I take them out to the green bin to add to the compost.

Part of the loveliness of flowers, I find, is that they don't last forever, so their presence is a statement of hope and finding pleasure in the 'here and now'. Having flowers reminds me to live one day at a time, and to appreciate the beauty I can see, whatever else is going on.

Jesus told his disciples not to worry, but instead to 'consider the lilies' as the Bible translates it, or 'look at the flowers'. He said that flowers don't strive anxiously and God provides beautiful clothes for them. We all know that worrying doesn't help us. In Matthew 6: 34, Jesus says, *'Therefore do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own.'* We probably would all agree with that last sentence, but it rarely stops us from worrying. But, to help pick me up when the daily news gets me down, I'll carry on looking at the flowers, with joy and gratitude, and greet each day with hope.

I'm really pleased to say that David Woodcroft is now out of hospital and recovering well at home. Dave, Brenda and Connie thank you for your prayers and support. Please continue to pray that he makes good progress. Other needs for prayer include:

- Parents who are juggling work with home-schooling
- Those with little contact with family who are feeling lonely, particularly those in our

local care homes

- All those with responsibility of leadership during this pandemic, locally, nationally and across the world
- The US as they swear in a new President, for a calm and orderly transfer of power.

This week, as a thanks for their hard work during the pandemic and to let them know we are thinking and praying for them, we will be delivering a box of chocolate treats and a card to our local schools and care homes. I was in Cottenham Court last week visiting a resident receiving end-of-life care, and saw first-hand how well they are managing such difficult circumstances. I'm sure they will appreciate knowing that we value and care about them.
