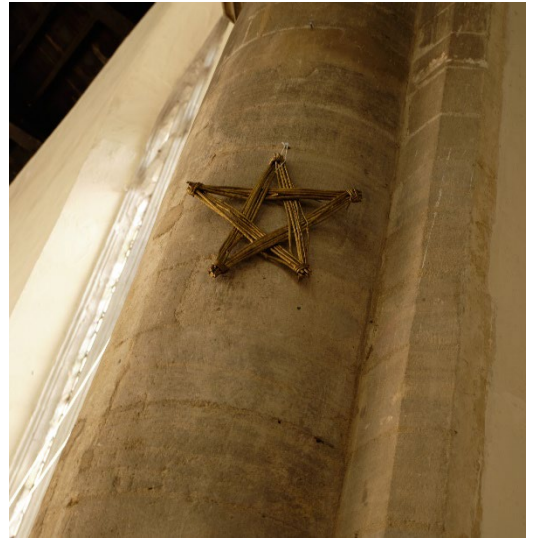


**Night Prayer at Home,

Hebrews 2: 16-18

¹⁶ We also know that the Son did not come to help angels; he came to help the descendants of Abraham. ¹⁷ Therefore, it was necessary for him to be made in every respect like us, his brothers and sisters, so that he could be our merciful and faithful High Priest before God. Then he could offer a sacrifice that would take away the sins of the people. ¹⁸ Since he himself has gone through suffering and testing, he is able to help us when we are being tested.

Short talk

This last week has been a rough one in so many ways. There have been catastrophic floods in Germany, Belgium, Austria and the Netherlands, with many lives lost. In my own country, I have watched while riots, protests and looting have taken lives, livelihoods and put many people on the brink of starvation. And here at home, we have seen infection rates rising steadily and we are told that this wave will not peak for another 8-10 weeks. And yet tomorrow, Stage Four of coming out of lockdown goes ahead with the protections that have made us feel safe no longer mandatory. How can we talk of 'returning to normal' in a world that seems to be on a path to madness? Am I the only one who feels a little anxious of what tomorrow holds, who feels they have no control?

Yes, I do feel anxious. But I take great comfort from the words in our reading this evening. *"We also know that the Son did not come to help angels; he came to help the descendants of Abraham"*. And *"Since he himself has gone through suffering and testing, he is able to help us when we are being*

tested". I am reminded that I don't, **we don't**, wake up tomorrow alone.

Every day, every time we feel that anxiety creeping in, we can return to Jesus Christ. We can renew our trust and faith in Him. In doing so, we know that whatever happens, whatever befalls us, He will be with us. And because He has lived on earth as man, we are reassured He can help us and carry us through. Our return to him can be through prayer, through Scripture, through acts of service and love to others. And in returning, we are reminded of His great love for us.

Even in the face of the uncertainty of the coming days and weeks, return to the Lord, reach out to each other, and bow your heads in prayer.
