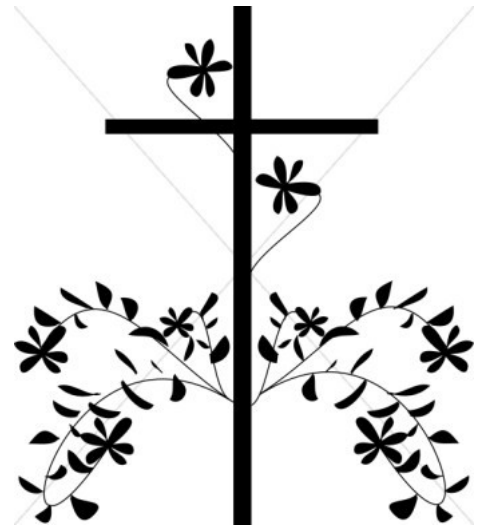


**Night Prayer At Home,

Church of England Lectionary Bible reading for Sunday 22 August 2021, Evening Prayer

Hebrews 13.16-21

Do not neglect to do good and to share what you have, for such sacrifices are pleasing to God. Obey your leaders and submit to them, for they are keeping watch over your souls and will give an account. Let them do this with joy and not with sighing—for that would be harmful to you. Pray for us; we are sure that we have a clear conscience, desiring to act honourably in all things. I urge you all the more to do this, so that I may be restored to you very soon. Now may the God of peace, who brought back from the dead our Lord Jesus, the great shepherd of the sheep, by the blood of the eternal covenant, make you complete in everything good so that you may do his will, working among us that which is pleasing in his sight, through Jesus Christ, to whom be the glory for ever and ever. Amen.

Short talk

...with joy

and not with sighing...



Obey your leaders and submit to them, for they are keeping watch over your souls and will give an account. Let them do this with joy and not with sighing—for that would be harmful to you.

It seems likely that this letter to ‘the Hebrews’ was written to Jewish new Christians living in Rome. It was a dangerous and uncertain time. The Emperor Nero blamed Christians for political unrest and many were killed. These new Christians would meet in private houses. Their leaders usually earned a living in non-religious jobs. There were no ordained priests or church buildings yet. Small groups were finding ways to support each other and to keep true to their belief in Jesus as the risen Christ.

Their leaders were taking on a lot of responsibility. If they lost heart, lost their ‘joy’ and took to ‘sighing’ (the Greek word actually translates more as ‘groaning’), everyone else in the group was affected.

That's always been the reality of leadership in faith groups. Being constantly joyful for others, every day and in every city, town and village, is exhausting, even for the most wonderful rectors, vicars, curates and ministers, and even with no Emperor Nero round the corner!

Clearly in many countries today there are armed forces out to kill peaceful Christians, peaceful Muslims and their families.

So what can we do? Prayer is always very much welcomed by people who are being persecuted for their faith. Prayer that is persistent, prayer that faces up to realities. We can influence our own Government and our own communities to welcome refugees.

We can also enhance church life by not 'sighing' or 'groaning' about trivial matters. It's up to all of us, not just ordained leaders, to focus on joy, life and hope. It's that simple.

Chai (חַי) is a Hebrew word and symbol that means "life," "alive," or "living."

Be with your Church, we pray, that we may offer the light of hope in places of despair, the warmth of human company in places of loneliness and the refreshment of peace in places of chaos and war.
