

The Feast of the Epiphany, 6th January



On 6th January we celebrate Epiphany – the visit of the Wise Men to the baby Jesus. But who were these Wise Men? No one knows for sure. Matthew calls them 'Magi', and that was the name of an ancient caste of a priestly kind from Persia. It wasn't until the third century that they were called kings – by a church father, Tertullian.

Another church father, Origin, assumed there were three – to correspond with the gifts given. Later Christian interpretation came to understand gold as a symbol of wisdom and wealth, incense as a symbol of worship and sacrifice, and myrrh as a symbol of healing – and even embalming. Certainly Jesus challenged and set aright the way in which the world handled all three of these things.

The story of the coming of the Magi grew in the telling. By the 6th century they had acquired names: Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar. By medieval times they were considered to be kings. Whoever they were, we do know from Matthew that they brought three gifts to Jesus.

What about their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh? While we cannot know for sure what was in the minds of first century Magi, one Victorian scholar has offered a possible explanation as to the significance of their gifts. He was the Rev John Henry Hopkins, an American Episcopalian minister, who in 1857 wrote his much-loved Christmas carol, 'We Three Kings of Orient Are'.

Gold, said John Henry Hopkins, was a gift that would have been given to a king. Frankincense had traditionally been brought by priests as they worshipped God in the Temple. Myrrh was a spice that the ancients used in preparing bodies for burial.

If that is true, then you could say that the Wise Men, in choosing their gifts for this infant, honoured Jesus with gold because He was King of the Jews, with frankincense because He was to be worshipped as divine, and with myrrh, because He would also become a sacrifice and die for His people.

The Wise Men were the very first gentiles ever to worship Jesus. What faith they had! They travelled for months over difficult terrain, they never saw any evidence of Jesus' kingship, His divinity or His sacrificial death. They worshipped Him through faith in God's promises about Him. Isaiah foresaw this response to Jesus: 'Nations will come to your light, and kings to the brightness of your dawn.' The Magi's eyes of faith saw clearly and far into the future.

Compare that with the High Priest and religious leaders whom the Wise Men saw in Jerusalem when they first arrived. These head priests knew all about the prophecies of their own coming Messiah, but NOT ONE Jewish religious leader travelled to look for Him in Bethlehem. And it is only six miles down the road!

Bishop Debbie Sellin visits Long Buckby and the Brixworth Deanery

Bishop Debbie began her Deanery visit at Welford Truck Stop (near the A14) where she had breakfast with Revd Graeme Anderson (Rural Dean), Revd Tom Grant (new incumbent of the Naseby Group) and Chris Banks (Deanery Lay Chair).

We were the only non-truck drivers having breakfast – it was a good opportunity to show how the major trunk roads,the M1/A5 and A14, run across the northern and western boundaries of the deanery.

Long Buckby was the next stop where Bishop Debbie presided at the monthly midweek communion service in St Lawrence. The local team was delighted to welcome colleagues from across the Deanery who swelled the normal congregation. Afterwards Bishop Debbie saw the Community Shelf which has provided food and other essential household items in the past year to local people struggling due to rising costs and prices. Church members and residents work together to supply all the items.

Bishop Debbie and Chris Banks were shown around Spratton CE Primary by Mrs Liz Crofts (Executive Head) where there are very good outside facilities for the children. After the act of worship, which included the team at St Andrew's Spratton enacting the story of feeding the five thousand, the children enjoyed questioning Bishop Debbie about what a bishop does. There was great engagement between the children and the Bishop.

The Deanery Clergy joined us at St Andrew's Church for lunch. The food was excellent and plentiful, which helped the conversation flow as Bishop Debbie gained greater insight into parish ministry across the nine benefices. Brixworth Deanery is entirely rural and encompasses 43 villages with a combined population smaller than that of Daventry. Only Long Buckby (4,700) and Brixworth (6,000) have populations in excess of 2,000.

Bishop Debbie and Chris attended the After School Club at Yelvertoft Primary School at the invitation of Revd Jo Ognanovic. Jo has formed an excellent relationship with the staff at this non-Church school. We participated in colouring rainbows with the children before Jo read a bible story about the Tower of Babel and asked them questions about the key aspects. Then we had great fun making our own versions of the Tower of Babel using cardboard boxes and tape.

In the evening, All Saints Brixworth hosted a social event for us at the George Inn, which was attended by more than 70 people from across the Deanery. This enabled Bishop Debbie to meet a good number of Church members and interact with people in a more informal setting.

Bishop Debbie told us her impression is that it is a happy deanery with real potential to reach out to its rural communities.
