

MOTHERS' UNION

As I drew back the bedroom curtains on the morning of 19th November I could not believe what I saw – a picturesque winter scene! This wouldn't have been a problem except it was the day of the Mothers' Union Diocesan Festival at Worcester Cathedral and members from the north of the diocese

were travelling there by coach. Several phone calls and cancellations later a smaller group of intrepid Mothers' Union members made their way to catch the coach for the journey to Worcester. A very obliging driver and a lovely warm coach made for a pleasant journey. On arriving we made our way to the cathedral café for a snack before taking our places for the service. It was a lovely service, led by Bishop Martin and Mthr. Victoria, during which our President, Judith Grubb, was presented with flowers and a garden voucher in appreciation of her time as Diocesan President. I share with you a verse from one of the Communion hymns we sang:

'All that I dream, all that I pray, all that I'll ever make, I give to you today.

Take and sanctify these gifts for your honour, Lord.

Knowing that I love and serve you is enough reward.

All that I dream, all that I pray, all that I'll ever have, I give to you today.'

It was lovely to welcome Jill Nicholls, who is an LLM at St Mary's, Kingswinford, to our November meeting, where she shared her journey of faith with us.

Jill was born with polio and her parents were told she would never walk. However, with her parents' support and her stubborn determination she proved them wrong. Despite a difficult time at school because she was different, having to wear a special boot and support, she became a nurse, had a family and undertook her Reader Training. She is also part of the hospital chaplaincy team at Russell Hall Hospital.

Throughout her life of ups and downs, including having cancer treatment, and the joys, with the birth of her beautiful granddaughter, Jill's faith has been a constant, supporting and uplifting her on her journey.

When Jill was asked to do a flower arrangement at the church's Flower Festival she chose to depict her life journey. We saw a photograph of her arrangement which consisted of two pedestals of flowers separated by blue material, on which was sprinkled sand, large and small pebbles and, placed in the centre, was a tiny child's boot. The pebbles represented the many difficulties she had encountered on her life journey and the tiny special boot, which she brought to show us, was the one she wore as a child.

To share Jill's journey was a privilege. As she said, 'When things are difficult, He is there by your side and what more do you need?'

Our support of the local Women's Refuge is very important to us and I wish to take this opportunity to thank you and members of the congregation who so generously support our collections during the year. I know that it is very much appreciated by everyone at the Refuge. If anyone still has ladies' gifts for the Refuge I will be taking them the week beginning 16th December.

Ladies Society - November 2024

In November our speaker was the highly-entertaining Dave Heeley and his beautiful guide dog Peter. Dave is known as "Blind Dave" as he was born with an eye condition which was eventually diagnosed, when he was aged 10, as retinitis pigmentosa. This is hereditary and his grandfather had the same condition.

Dave started by telling us how he has been supported by five guide dogs in his life. When he went to meet his first dog, he wondered what a dog could do for him. After three weeks of training with him his confidence had been boosted and his life enhanced. He realised that a dog is an ice-breaker – people talk to you when you have the dog with you. The first dog, Peter, was a labrador/retriever cross who was an absolute rogue but a hard worker. He was banned from many houses for eating cakes, gateaux and, on one occasion, goldfish!

Carla, the second dog, was also a labrador/retriever and the only female he has owned and she was faultless. Dave called her "my princess". She was a hard worker but died of cancer aged just 10.

His third dog was Wicksie, a German Shepherd/retriever cross and he was like a big bear. Dave described him as being so dopey that he often guided Dave into trees/vans/walls and so he was retired after 6 years. Seamus, his fourth dog, was a full German Shepherd and was more like a big donkey. He looked ferocious but was daft and very nosey. He loved to take Dave to the butchers so that he could get treats. He died in 2018 after 9 years from cancer.

Dave explained that, once your dog dies or is retired, it can take 4 years to have another dog. This impacts considerably on the blind person's independence. Dave eventually had Peter in 2022. He is a full retriever and works well and, as we saw at the meeting, loves biscuits! Peter is very quiet and so Dave has attached a bell to him so that he knows where he is.

When he left school at age 16 Dave wanted to be a soldier but, after doing the entrance tests, he was told that he was exempt. This made him feel bitter and upset and, for the next three years, he had a number of jobs and had several friends, but remained angry. At age 20 he began to realise that he could live for another 50 years and that "life was for living". He decided to concentrate on what he could do, not what he couldn't do.

Dave started to raise money for the charity Guide Dogs for the Blind. A man approached him and suggested that they run the London Marathon. Dave didn't own any trainers and had not been running for many years. 12 months later they ran the London Marathon – he has done 16 marathons to date.

Three years later Dave was listening to Sir Ranulph Fiennes on the radio – he had completed 7 marathons on 7 continents in 7 days. This inspired Dave and on 6th April 2008 he found himself at 11.58pm on the Falkland Islands ready to start the challenge. He and his guides then went to Rio de Janeiro, Los Angeles, Australia, Dubai and Tunisia in order to run marathons and they finished in London on 13th April. He was the first person (and the first West Bromwich Albio supporter) to complete the challenge. They had flown 35,000 miles and slept just 19 hours in the 7 days.

He had also met a physiotherapist who had encouraged him to have an ice bath after each marathon and this helped his legs to recover. Dave had been unemployed for 18 months by now but he quickly developed a career as a public speaker.

In 2011 Dave took on another challenge with the people who had now become part of "Team Blind Dave". They included his guide runner and physio. Dave had lost his dad to cancer and wanted to raise money for MacMillan Cancer Support in its centenary year and so they did the "Top to Toe" challenge. He describes the 10 days of cycling and running as "lots of fun" and he even added an extra 80 miles onto the route so that he could go to The Hawthorns. The team members were now keen to do more.

In 2013 the team did a tandem bike ride through 7 countries in 7 days – Switzerland, Germany, France, Belgium, Holland, UK and Luxembourg. His guide runner was on the front of the tandem and operated the steering and brakes whilst Dave was on the back and operating the gears.

The Marathon des Sables is a 7-day ultramarathon which is the distance of about 6 regular marathons. Entrants are totally self-sufficient and sleep in Bedouin tents which are moved each day to the next rest site. The runners are allowed 2 litres of water each morning and night to drink and wash with. They are followed by a mobile hospital and have strict medical tests. The runners carry backpacks with their food, sleeping bag, a compass and headtorch in – even though, as Dave pointed out, a torch wouldn't help him! The runners climbed 4 mountain ranges that week – at one point he was 2000 feet up on a one-foot-wide ledge. How brave.

In 2016 Dave was talked into doing The Escape from Alcatraz. This is a triathlon which includes a 1.5-mile swim in very cold water (with strong currents and sharks!) then a cycle ride and running. The only problem was that neither Dave nor his guide could swim and so they had to learn at the local swimming baths. They then had to jump off the top deck of a boat and start swimming – 1300 people jumped off the boat in 2 minutes.

Dave's next adventure was to complete – in partnership with the Albion Foundation - all of the "Great Runs" in 2017. He did 25 runs in total, starting in Edinburgh and finishing in Ethiopia. This was followed in 2018 by a 6-day walk along the Great Wall of China, accompanied by his family. 2019 saw Dave and his guide Tony take on his bucket list challenge – the Comrades Ultra Marathon in South Africa. This is a strictly timed event – you must complete 56 miles in 12 hours. Dave managed this within the time but Tony collapsed just before the end.

2022 was a year of difficulties for Dave. He rode 800 miles from Colditz Castle to West Bromwich, then had his right knee replaced, then walked Hadrian's Wall in 5 days and then had a new left knee.

The final challenge Dave talked about – and one that he found very moving – was the 1000-mile bike ride along the Western Front Way. He told us about the route through Switzerland and Belgium and the cemeteries and memorials that he saw on every corner. At the Menin Gate a former WBA player called Harold Bache is remembered and Dave took his WBA cap to the memorial.

This was a wonderful, entertaining and thought-provoking talk about how one man has triumphed through adversity. Thank you, Dave. Our meetings take place at 11.30am on the first Monday of the month and new members would be very welcome.

Times Past

CHESTER COURANT, Tuesday, December 29, 1795

STAFFORDSHIRE COLLIERIES

WANTED, in the Coal and Iron-stone Mines, in the parishes of Dudley, Tipton, Wednesbury, and Sedgley, SEVERAL HUNDRED MINERS, who will find constant employment at the said works.- Wages from two shillings and sixpence, to three shillings and sixpence per day, with two quarts of ale.

COUNTY EXPRESS, Saturday, December 25, 1875

SEDGLEY

CLEVER CAPTURE OF A THIEF. – At the Police Court on Monday, before Mr Isaac Spooner (Stipendiary), John Swaine, labourer, was charged with stealing turnips belonging to Mr Samuel Bannister, farmer, Sedgley Park, on the morning of the 19th inst. – Police constable Barton stated that recently robberies in the Sedgley rural districts had become very frequent, and on the morning in question, at about six o'clock, he was watching in a field at Sedgley Park, and saw the prisoner enter the field with a truck by breaking through the fence, after which he gathered about thirty turnips, upon which witness pounced upon him and caught him. Mr Bannister claimed Is. as the value of the turnips. – In defence prisoner said he did not steal any turnips, neither had he any intention of stealing them. – Mr Spooner said the turnips were found in his possession, and he should order him to pay Is., the value of them, and a fine of £5, in default of which two months' imprisonment.

BIRMINGHAM DAILY GAZETTE, Tuesday, December 22, 1914

EXTENSION OF HOURS

At Sedgley Police Court, yesterday, Mr.W.A. Foster applied on behalf of the local licensed victuallers for an extension of the hours of opening their premises from 10 to 11p.m. on Christmas Eve, Boxing Day, and New Year's Day.

Mr H. H.Ward (chairman of the Bench) said he thought the extension granted by the Bilston magistrates applied to Sedgley. In any event the Bench would ratify the decision of the Bilston justices.

The Challenges of Christmas

Christmas is a great time of year, but it's not without its challenges! After one family had put up 250,000 Christmas lights outside, they didn't dare boil a kettle for fear of blowing the system!

The challenge of over-indulging

We all remember the episode of the Vicar of Dibley, where she had to consume four Christmas dinners! Christmas is a time when we usually eat and drink far too much, the average person gaining six pounds in weight. But Christmas is not simply about gaining weight, but losing what weighs us down. 'Cast all your anxiety on Him, because He cares for you.' (I Peter 5:7). Whatever your concerns or worries this Christmas, bring them to God.

The challenge of overspending

In the rush to buy Christmas cards, a woman bought a pack of 50 identical cards. Without reading the verse, she hastily signed and sent them off, but for one. A few days later she read the message: 'This card is just to say a little gift is on the way.' Christmas is not about getting into debt, but God getting us out of debt. He spent exactly what was needed on the first Christmas night: 'You are to give Him the name Jesus, because He will save His people from their sins.' (Matthew 1:21).

The challenge is over too quickly

Christmas doesn't last very long, yet the effect of the first Christmas is long-lasting. 'For God so loved the world that He gave His one and only Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life.' (John 3:16). Jesus has come to bring us life in all its fullness, both for now and all eternity.

How do we face the challenges of Christmas? 'Yet what I can, I give Him – give my heart'.

Think twice before buying that goat in Ghana

What are you buying your friends for Christmas this year? If you are tempted by 'socially responsible' gifts that involve you NOT giving your friends anything at all, but instead giving your money to a charity 'in their name', you may wish to think again. Such gifts as goats in Ghana or chickens in Chad can make you feel virtuous, but may damage your relationships.

A recent study has found that people who buy others 'socially responsible' gifts can actually be considered to be self-serving and inconsiderate by the people to whom they give them. It seems that such givers often over-estimate how appreciative their friends will be to receive nothing. A study at the University of Southern California found that to be successful, a gift must make the recipient feel 'extraordinary, and special.'

f you suspect giving your various loved ones news about a goat won't achieve that, there is only one solution: instead of *giving* only socially responsible gifts, insist on *receiving only them*. Then your mantelpiece will be full of photos of happy goats and chickens, and your family and friends will enjoy your more usual gifts, and still be speaking to you.

What sort of a Christmas card person are you?

The time to send and receive Christmas cards has come round again – time for our annual shock at the cost of a coloured card, and disbelief at what the Post Office intends to charge us to deliver them.

Millions at breaking point as "shockingly low incomes" leave them hungry

Chronically low incomes are devastating the lives of millions of people who don't have enough income to afford food, essential bills and a safe home to live in.

That's according to the latest report by UK debt advice charity, Christians Against Poverty (CAP).

CAP's YouGov polling, which accompanies the report, shows that 11.8 million (22%) of UK adults say they currently have a deficit budget, which is when a person's income doesn't cover the cost of the core essentials they need to live on.

CAP's clients, on average, are £273 a month short of what they need to be able to cover their basics such as food, energy bills and rent

The report highlights that when CAP's debt coaches go into clients' homes, they find people living in cold properties and with empty fridges. Clients describe sitting in the dark with the lights off and curtains closed, often hiding in terror because they're afraid of bailiffs knocking at their door demanding money that they don't have.

The report reveals that almost half (47%) of CAP's clients have deficit budgets, even after an expert debt advisor has supported them to review their finances, and has worked through suggestions to maximise their income and cut out non-essentials.

Christians Against Poverty's Chief Executive Officer, Stewart McCulloch, said, "Our expert debt advisors, alongside local churches we partner with, are continuing to help thousands of people across the UK to become debt free.

"But it's frustrating for our team when they have the tools to help someone out of debt, but the person's income is so shockingly low that even when the burden of debt is removed, they still can't afford life's essentials.

It was 125 years ago, on 22nd December 1899, that Dwight L Moody, the famous American evangelist, died.

Moody was born in Northfield, Massachusetts, in 1837 and raised in the Unitarian Church. But his father died when he was four, and he had a hard upbringing as one of nine children. At 17 he moved to Boston to work in his uncle's shoe shop – a job he got on condition that he attended the Congregational Church of Mount Vernon. There he was converted to evangelical Christianity through his Sunday school teacher, Edward Kimball.

One of Moody's favourite quotes was "Faith makes all things possible. Love makes all things easy." He devoted himself to bringing the Gospel to as many people as possible. Unwilling to fight in the Civil War, he worked among the troops with the YMCA, and then built up a strong evangelical church in Chicago – only to have the building, his house and the homes of many in the congregation destroyed in the Great Fire of 1871.

Re-evaluating his priorities, Moody teamed up with Ira D Sankey, a hymn writer, and they made a number of tours to Great Britain, where he avoided divisive doctrines, preaching "the old-fashioned gospel". They drew large crowds, inspiring many local people to start Sunday schools for children and young people. News of this had a big influence in Sweden, though the Americans had no knowledge of Swedish.

Moody showed his fearlessness in going to Ireland, where Catholics and Protestants were at loggerheads. He ignored the sectarian divide and was welcomed by both, leading to revival there.

He had meanwhile returned to Northfield to live, and ten years after his death the Chicago church was renamed the Moody Church in his honour. President Dwight D Eisenhower, born in 1890, was named after him.

Sol Invictus, Emperors and how Christmas began

It was 1,750 years ago, on 25th December 274, that the Roman Emperor Aurelian founded and launched the cult of Sol Invictus as an official religion. He erected a temple and declared 25th December a national holiday, to be known as the Feast of the Unconquered Sun. In 336, after the conversion of the emperor Constantine, the Church in Rome began to celebrate Christmas on 25th December.

Aurelian, who was born in Moesia – the south-eastern Balkans – rose from modest beginnings to become a strong and successful Emperor at one of the most difficult times in Roman history. He defeated many attempts to destroy the empire from without and within, notably attempts by the Gallic and Palmyrene Empires, and improved the lot of the common people.

His idea in promoting Sol Invictus as the main divinity of the Empire was to try to give everyone a god to believe in without betraying their own gods. However, when Constantine the Great, who was born during Aurelian's reign, became Emperor in 306 and converted to Christianity, it was the beginning of the end for Sol Invictus – and the start of the dominance of Christianity in the Roman Empire.

The date of 25th December was taken over and celebrated as the birth-day of Jesus – and has been ever since, though scholars agree that this is an impossible date because flocks of sheep would not have been out in the fields in the dead of winter, and therefore shepherds would not have been out either. Other dates have been suggested, of which perhaps the most convincing is September 11.

It is a happy irony that in English, Christmas can be described accurately as the Feast of the Unconquered Son.

Hedgehog extinction fears grow as population plummets

The status of hedgehogs in western Europe has recently been downgraded to "near threatened", according to the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) Red List.

If European numbers decline any farther, hedgehogs will be listed as being at risk of extinction. Numbers have shrunk in more than half the countries where hedgehogs live – including the UK, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Belgium, the Netherlands, Germany and Austria. Some national declines have been as much as 33 per cent.

Our rural population of hedgehogs here in the UK has fallen by up to 75 per cent since 2000, although city-dwelling hedgehogs are doing a bit better.

But the combined pressures of intensive agriculture, domestic pesticides, garden strimmers, busy roads and urban development have taken their toll. An eighth of all hedgehogs in the UK die every year just as roadkill.

Now a national hedgehog conservation strategy has been launched by the People's Trust for Endangered Species (PTES) and the British Hedgehog Preservation Society (BHPS).

In place of cabbage

Teachers struggle with ill health

As you prepare for Christmas this year, spare a thought – and a prayer – for our teachers. Their job is even more demanding at this time of year, as school Christmas activities are added to an already over-crowded school curriculum.

Also, recent figures from the Department for Education show that, for whatever reason, our teachers struggle with some ill health. About 14,000 teachers in England called in sick every day last year, a recent analysis has found.

That means that overall, about 66.2 per cent of England's teaching workforce were off school last year because of illness. That means that a whopping 2.5 million schooldays were lost in 2022-23, as more than 326,000 teachers missed class, owing to sickness.

Problem solving



Dean Street - in the 19th century

While I was looking at the 1871 census for Sedgley I came across an entry for 4 Church Street – it's now called <u>Dean Street</u> - the street's name was changed in the 1870s.

Most surprisingly it was then described as a 'boarding school' with 8 girls and one boy, aged 9-17.

The property was occupied by Joseph Sherwin, a grocer, and his wife Eliza who was a Teacher, and their 4 year old son. An Assistant Teacher and a domestic servant were also listed at the property.

The pupils listed as living there were from various parts of the Midlands, with one from London.

The boarding school was a few doors down from the Sedgley National School, (now the site of Iceland and its car park), which would still have been going in the 1870s - Queen Victoria School didn't take over responsibility for village children's education until 1896, at which point the National School became All Saints' Sunday Schools.

Whether there was any relationship at all between the private boarding school and the National School, ie sharing facilities or even teachers, isn't known.

There was a substantial 3-storey building and an adjacent 2-storey building that are probably the only properties that could have accommodated a small boarding school – and both structures are designated as 'No. 4' on the 1883 Union Map of Sedgley which can be viewed at Dudley Archives.

Also, there is a 1890 plan at Archives showing the full extent of the National School with its boys' and girls' teaching blocks and playgrounds (as stated above, the area is now Iceland, and its car park).

The infant schoolroom recorded on the corner of Vicar Street and Dean Street had a curious dual role – it was once used for 'Vestry Meetings' ie for parish administration. This was before Sedgley UDC took over most civic responsibilities from the church in the 1890s.

Listed at 2 School Street (Dean Street) in the 1871 census was John Egginton, father of John Tertius Egginton. His occupation is given as 'Relieving Officer' which was a role at the Workhouse (by 1871 relocated to Shaver's End in Dudley) assessing clients' eligibility for the institution. His son John Tertius Egginton started the chemist's business in the Bull Ring at the turn of the 19th/20th centuries, where it remained until demolition in the late 1960s.

St James the Least



My dear Nephew Darren

So, you are excited about being invited to plan your first Carol Service. The dangers involved are only slightly less than being invited to judge the best cake made by the Ladies' Group. You seem to have no idea of the lifelong offence you will inevitably cause. In decades to come when you will either be a seasoned old clergyman – or more likely a double-glazing salesman – you will be remembered as "the Curate who offended Mrs Smith."

First, you have to decide which groups are going to be represented to give the readings. If the Brownies were asked last year, then it has to be the Cubs this time. But don't forget that every third year, the Boys' Brigade must be asked, or they will take their revenge and get their flag tangled in the nave chandelier come Remembrance Sunday. If someone represents the choir, then over a four-year period, all four voice parts must be called on — and if the organist isn't asked on the fifth year, then all hymns subsequently will be played at double speed and with one verse missing. Should one person have been invited to read for two successive years, then their annual appearance thereafter will be taken as an inalienable right for the rest of their lifetime — and probably longer than that. To drop them may well invoke legal proceedings,

Then there is the batting order to be considered. Someone from the church council will take it as a deliberate slight if they are placed lower in the order than a representative of the Men's Fellowship and no self-respecting bell ringer would voluntarily follow a brass cleaner.

If you do not specify where they should read from and how the readings should end, then a form of ecclesiastical inflation will happen.

If the first reader speaks from the chancel step, the next one will go to the lectern; after the sanctuary and pulpit have been utilised, the final reader will probably ask you to move so he can take your place. The variations on "Here endeth", "This is the Word of the Lord", and "Thanks be to God", are endless and will increase in length as the Service progresses. The final reader will probably end with a lengthy exeges on what he thinks the passage means, correcting whatever you said in your sermon.

I once made the mistake of not telling all readers which Bible translation to use. One, an Old Testament expert, therefore decided to read in Hebrew. Not to be outdone, another read her Gospel passage in Greek – apologising beforehand that it may not be a perfect rendering, as she was spontaneously translating it from the English. And some say Christians are not competitive.

You have two alternatives: either repeat last year's Service without any alteration, saying that it could not be improved, or design your own – and then take Christmas off.
