

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## Minister's Letter

### Dear Friends



Since I last wrote, things have been pretty dramatic in the Ritchie house! As many of you will know, my wife Sarah contracted Guillain-Barré Syndrome after Christmas, which resulted in a ten day hospitalisation. Fortunately her case was not as severe as it might have been, and she is now well on the road to a full recovery. We are both very thankful for all of the care that she has received from medical professionals and for the incredible kindness and generosity of the people of Greenbank Parish Church. From food parcels on the doorstep to flowers, cards and good wishes, and the folk who have provided puppy sitting for Knox, the new manse Hungarian Vizsla, we are truly grateful.

Our autumn *Explore Faith and Life* programme created lots of opportunities to explore different dimensions of faith life together. Building on the momentum, we have pulled together some more for the spring. You'll find a pull-out centrefold leaflet with this issue of *Connections*. Take

a look, and feel free to pass on the details to friends, family, and neighbours.

The **Community Bible Experience** is a chance to dig into the New Testament with the help of user-friendly editions which are presented more like a novel, and extra online resources. of the Last Supper in words, art, music, and silence in our various spaces here at Greenbank.

**Deepening Commitment** is our all-embracing title for a spring series that offers the chance to seek Baptism and Confirmation/Profession of Faith. We've put together a series of Sunday night sessions which are open to anyone, whether you're at the beginning of your journey or looking for a refresher after many years of commitment. Themes and dates are in the centrefold, and I'll be very happy to speak to anyone who'd like to discuss potential baptism and/or Confirmation/Profession of Faith with me.

As part of changes in the way that Communion is served, Martin Ritchie sought a flagon from which the wine could be poured into the common cup at the Communion table. As he was thinking about asking “121” whether they had any in store, Vivien Hutchison (Convener of the Communion Elements Committee), who knew of Martin’s search, was doing a stocktake of property. At the back of a cupboard in the basement, she found an unassuming cardboard box containing a handsome silver flagon, inscribed “*Greenbank United Free Church 1900*”. It would have been presented as part of Greenbank’s original Communion silver when the congregation was founded that year. It’s now in use every Communion Sunday. Better than cash...

## Fire Evacuations

When considering the subject of fire evacuations, our Minister shared his experience as manager at Theatre Royal Glasgow, where successful fire evacuation procedures depended on the training of the front of house stewards. Following this principle the Congregational Board has endorsed training the Beadle, Welcome Teams and Leaders to manage fire evacuations.

In the event of the fire alarm sounding at Sunday worship, the Welcome Teams will direct you to the fire exits, which are the Main Church and North Transept doors, and then on to the muster point at the Braidburn Valley Park Gates.

The area in front of the Church must be kept clear for the arrival of the Fire Service. Leaders will take children in Young Church through the west door of the Centenary Hall directly to the muster point.

So if the alarm sounds and the red light above the vestry door flashes, it is NOT a practice. Leave the Church immediately by the Main Church or North Transept door and make your way to Braidburn Valley Park Gates. Children will be brought across by leaders.

## Emergency Appeal for Refugees in Winter Storms

*January 2019*

This winter is the worst ever for refugees in north Lebanon. Two powerful storms in January have caused widespread flooding and wind damage to the tents of thousands in the Bekaa valley, while above the valley those in the remote town of Arsal have been overwhelmed by deep snow, with night time temperatures remaining below zero.

The storms have been largely unreported in the UK media, but google 'Storm Norma Lebanon' or 'Storm Miriam Lebanon', and you will find plenty about them.

As soon as the seriousness of the situation became apparent, Maggie Tookey of *Edinburgh Direct Aid* flew out to help and co-ordinate relief work in Arsal. She has been reporting increasing numbers of appeals for help from destitute refugees living in remote camps. Many are now having to share cramped tents with their neighbours, as their own have collapsed under

the weight of snow or are leaking in the slow thaw. Travelling to collect or deliver the aid on untreated icy roads is difficult and dangerous.

Edinburgh Direct Aid has set up an emergency appeal fund that is being spent on the most immediate needs – oil for stoves, food, and wood and tarpaulin to mend or rebuild damaged tents. All contributions will be used at once to provide life-saving support. **We need your help.**

## Thank You for the Presents

Greenbank received an invitation to the HMP Edinburgh Prison Visitor Centre for a coffee morning on Saturday 9th February. This was the first time that they had tried this as a way of thanking everyone involved in the Christmas gift collection. Angus and I were pleased to go along as we have had a long standing connection with this project. Other churches were also well represented.

The children had made a great effort with thank-you cards (*see front cover*). One of the most poignant was from a mother of a nine year old boy who had written to his mum, telling her how excited he was to take his presents home and put them under his tree.

The Visitor Centre is external to the main

prison; it is a very bright, open and welcoming space. There is room to play with a good variety of toys set out, as well as a quiet room and craft room.

The prison service now works closely with Barnardo's, whose staff run the Centre. They explained the importance of it being a welcoming place, so that the children and their family members can de-stress ahead of any prison visit.

Many children are well known to the staff and are happy to stay and play while their adults go into the prison itself. Consequently, one of the staff said they were able to personalise the Christmas gifts which they received from the gift collections. Popular items were Lego, dolls, craft kits, books, board games but clearly the staff

were delighted with all the contributions, as were the children.

Over one hundred children on average use the Centre each week. (Some of these are repeat visits.) The age range is 0–16, mostly younger children. Bonding Visits play a part in Barnardo’s work where prisoners are able to play on the floor with their young children in an informal environment. (By contrast, a Social Visit means that the prisoner must stay seated all the time.) These visits are really appreciated by the children and their parents.

The large toys in the play area are well used but in very good condition. If anyone is clearing out larger toys such as play kitchens or Fisher Price forts or garages, they would be very welcome in the Centre. Children’s clothing is welcome too.

The Centre is open nearly every day in the year, and Leonée and Shona from Barnardo’s would give you a warm welcome.

## Food Box/Reverse Advent Calendar

This is just a quick note to thank everyone for your continued support for the Food Box and for your support of *Reverse Advent Calendar* throughout Advent.

The food that you leave in the *Food Box* goes to the following organisations, all doing great work to help some of the most vulnerable in our community:

- *St Catharine's Convent Homeless Project* offers friendship and practical support to homeless and disadvantaged people, providing morning and evening meals, toilet and shower facilities, and, perhaps more importantly, a warm welcome, a listening ear and a place to call 'Home'. The project supports up to 200 homeless people a day.
- *Four Square* provides crisis accommodation for young women aged 16-25 at Stopover, where there are 4 self-contained flats that can accommodate up to 16 young, vulnerable people.

- *The Streetwork Crisis Centre*, Holyrood Road, which supports homeless people and those at risk of homelessness.

To these three, a fourth beneficiary of your generous food donations at Christmas was added:

- *The Richmond Craigmillar Food Co-op*, which runs on a Thursday morning, offering a great deal to their community. Food donations received from various supermarkets and other donors are available during their Food Co-op. The food is free and anyone is welcome to share it.

All of these organisations are extremely grateful for your support. Thank you again – please keep the donations of food coming, all non-perishable please.
