The Guild

The Guild has thoroughly enjoyed its February meetings. On the 1st, Alison Murison gave a fascinating description of how Saughton Gardens have developed, from the time the estate was purchased by the council in 1900, the 1908 Scottish National Exhibition, 'digging for victory' in WW2 when the formal garden was dug up to produce vegetables, to the recent major redevelopment with its community involvement, café, Rose Garden, Winter Garden and so much more. This was all illustrated by excellent photos. The Guild members are now very keen to pay a visit.

On the 15th there was another excellent talk about a new development, this time in a very different setting. 'Kazunzu Village of Hope', is a Vine Trust Project which the Guild is supporting this year.



Kazunzu (above) lies on the shore of Lake Victoria in Tanzania and will eventually be a settlement with 40 individual houses each housing a family and fostered children. The

first two compounds of four houses are built and the families have moved in. Sixteen Guardian parents with their own children and 37 orphaned children have moved in. Work has started in communal areas; a village hub is under way, a fish farm has been set up (22,000 tilapia fingerlings), planning and work on the schools and medical centre continue. We hope to have a fundraising event for it shortly.

Our meetings in March should be good as well. On the 1st we will be hearing about 'Haggis Breeding!' This meeting was scheduled for last year and has been postponed twice so this is third time lucky. We have no idea what it will be like, but we had very enthusiastic reviews from other Guilds. The meeting on the 15th is 'Eavesdropping at Balmoral' which should be fun. The last meeting this month is on the 29th when we have our ABM and hope to have a Community Police speaker to advise on personal and internet safety. To make up for the missed meetings this session we hope to have an extra meeting in April, but that is still to be confirmed.

Thought for the Month: March

“Church is community and Greenbank has been such an excellent example of that,” said a lady in the congregation to me recently.

This *Connections* issue coincides with the second anniversary of the start of the most turbulent chapter in our modern-day lives: not an anniversary we’ll be rushing to celebrate. Rarely have we been more aware of the value of community and indeed our **need** of it.

Psychologists and sociologists will have much to write about in future from these two years but, for us now, we deal with their aftermath.

As a former Nurture Teacher in a primary school – with the psychological, social and emotional needs of young folk at the centre – I’m reminded now that these needs exist in us all, no matter our age, and they are perhaps more acute than pre-March 2020.

Community is inter-connectedness. *“We are wired to be caring for the other and generous to one another. We shrivel when we are not able to interact ... We depend on the other in order for us to be fully who we are,”* wrote Archbishop Desmond Tutu (1), reminding us of the African concept of **ubuntu**.

Father Richard Rohr (2) teaches that we are transformed by our suffering – not by bearing it apart and alone – but by recognising our universal connectedness with each other and God. *“Almost all people*



are carrying a great and secret hurt, even when they don’t know it” and “Shared struggle somehow makes us one – in a way that easy comfort and entertainment never can”.

We are the living stones of 1 Peter 2:5: not meant to be on our own but designed to be together. Given the current upheaval within our national kirk, the words of 1 Thesalonians 5:11 also speak loudly, *“Therefore we encourage each other and build each other up, just as you are doing”.*

In this season of Lent, as we walk alongside each other, may we pray for each other and reach out to each other, continuing to sustain our Greenbank community.

Fairtrade

Fairtrade Fortnight runs from 21st February to 6th March this year and the message is “*Choose the World You Want.*” Look out for the Fairtrade logo on the goods you buy and support our stalls. We will have another Fairtrade Stall, which will include items for Easter, after church on Sunday 27th March and we will also offer some Fairtrade goods at the outdoor event planned for Saturday 12th March.

Partner Churches and Tropical Storm Ana

Following the deadly cyclone that affected Madagascar, Malawi and Mozambique in January, partner churches have been in touch with the Church of Scotland asking that we keep their communities in our prayers. Climate change seems to be having an impact on the frequency and severity of these weather events. The BBC reported that in Mozambique, cyclone Ana destroyed 10,000 homes and dozens of schools and hospitals. In Malawi, 44 emergency camps were set up to deal with displaced and injured people.

Partners at Mulanje Mission Hospital report on the impact in southern Malawi where a vast area has flooded, affecting a large number of the country’s hydro-electricity stations and causing widespread

blackouts. Near the clinic, crops and trees have been washed away, roads and bridges destroyed, and there is concern that populations are vulnerable to disease due to toilets having collapsed and wells being contaminated. You can find out more about Mulanje Mission Hospital at www.mmh.mw
