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Dear Everyone

The past 6 months have been unprecedented, you don't need to be reminded of what we have gone through! Yet even on the bleakest of days there has been many blessings, some of which we might not have noticed. In Blandford Forum where I was based 25 years ago the Lunch Club would regularly include a sing-song. One of the favourites was, "Count your blessings".

Each day throughout Lockdown nationally we had safe running water in our taps, energy to heat, cook and light our homes whilst the media kept us informed. Our dustbins and recycling bins were emptied. The NHS provided sterling work for those in medical need. Within the local community assistance was offered for shopping, there was a support phone line for people needing prescriptions, and a great sense of community. And there were so many other blessings as well - if we just pause and reflect.

Within the Church the blessings were many: pastoral visitors sought to keep in touch with everyone. We have phoned, emailed and prayed for each other. Services were emailed or delivered so that people could worship at home. On Easter Sunday we started having Zoom services which those with internet could join in with. Then there have been the online Bible Studies. Church Council members have tirelessly worked so that we can have hold physical services in church. So many have gone "the extra mile" in Lockdown to provide blessings - and we are so grateful.

On a personal note I would like to express my sincere and genuine gratitude for the prayers offered for my two days a week working within the NHS Chaplaincy. Ministering to patients suffering with Covid-pneumonia has been extremely demanding and emotionally and spiritually challenging, but your prayers have given such strength - yes there have been many times when I have been frightened, but throughout it all I have felt so supported - thank you.

Despite the challenges there have also been numerous blessings - that came in a variety of ways, from a local public school canteen making sandwiches for staff, to people sewing scrubs for us to wear.

The past six months have affected us all in so many ways, but there have been many blessings. As we face the future, with all its challenges and hopefully opportunities, we likewise look for blessings and also hope to be a blessing to others. In Church there are now direction signs - many of them include at the bottom these words, "The best of all God is with us." Whatever the future, we trust in the love and presence of God and recall Jesus' words at the end of Matthew's Gospel, "I am with you always"

WARMINSTER LINK SCHEME

The Warminster Link Scheme was set up some twenty years ago, when many Local Community Transport schemes were also set up because many people are unable to use public transport for various reasons relating to their health, mobility, and costs. This was to provide a useful valuable service to the community, with volunteers driving clients to various appointments. Warminster Link Scheme helps people in the community with transport to various hospitals and surgeries, and for other appointments, as well as sometimes undertaking shopping, dog walking and befriending. The volunteers use their own cars for transporting clients to the various locations, which provides an opportunity for interesting interaction between driver and client, as well as enjoyable driving to various different locations. Access to the service is via a phone number, followed by a response from a coordinator, who will liaise with the client, taking details of the journey and appointment time before allocating to an available driver from our list of volunteers. The driver receives a mileage rate for the journeys they undertake for Link, which is funded by donations and various fund raising events. Before accepting volunteers they are required to undergo a DBS check (Disclosure and Barring Service), but otherwise need no special training. Our scheme undertakes about 900 journeys, covering 35,000 miles, every year. We are always looking for volunteers so if you are interested please contact us on 01985 211655 or warminsterlink@icloud.com and join us in providing this service to the community.

To: Boris Johnson “End the use of UK Export Finance to fund fossil fuel projects overseas.” In light of rapidly increasing global temperatures and the materialising dire consequences of the climate crisis, it is imperative that the UK government takes drastic action to ensure that the 1.5°C target of the Paris Agreement is met. As host of COP26, the UK has the opportunity to be a world leader in the transition towards a more sustainable future. We are therefore calling on you to end the damaging use of UK Export Finance to fund oil and gas projects overseas. This spending is at odds with commitments to lowering emissions. We ask that it is instead used to fund projects that are in line with the Sustainable Development Goals. The UK has the chance to lead the transition away from fossil fuel extraction. To do so, funding must stop by 2021. Will you ensure that the UK’s overseas energy spending aligns with the commitments made in the Paris Agreement and Sustainable Goals?
