Although it is still cold outside, as I went into my garden today I saw buds on the roses and small green shoots of snowdrops and hyacinths that will soon be out. So, even though it is the middle of winter, there are hints of spring in the air.



An Update from our CWM Intern—Sandy Nunn

The past three and a half months have flown by! 111 days have passed as I write this since I began my time as the CWM Intern and I've had a productive three months, links have been made and relationships developed and formed. I don't want to just list off the things I've done and leave it at that; while that's informative it only says so much. Plus I wouldn't read just a list so I don't expect you to either!

I've been very lucky to have been in contact with one of the part time teachers at the secondary school not long after I started here. Pauline Zahner (who preaches occasionally at Fenstanton URC) has been super-helpful in introducing me to a few teachers who are either Christians or interested in Fairtrade and Eco issues, as well as the head of R.E. I've been along to the Christian Union every Tuesday of term time since then and have led a few sessions in the hope that I've been able to give them a good example of how to lead a brief 'God-talk' type of session, with some interactivity to keep everyone awake! I have noticed that the CU will be leaderless next academic year and I hope I can encourage them to think about that soon so they have someone to keep it going after I've moved on.

I've also been busy on Facebook and have made a 'St Ives Free Church' page and posted the café services as well as the Christmas services. It's gained quite a bit of attention given how new and unadvertised it is which is a good sign that people outside the Church are looking at what we're doing! It needs to be well maintained to look attractive of course but it's a very positive start! On the subject of Facebook I'm also doing the same for Churches Together in St Ives to have a platform for the churches in the town to shout about what we're doing altogether.

The Mission Planning group has been hard at work putting together a questionnaire for us to find out the profile of the Free Church and what we can do to make most use of the Church (building and people!) for St Ives. It is online at this point but we plan on dropping it out to the Yes Estate who have heard from us

The past 3 and a half months I've given a lot of attention to building on and creating relationships with several communities and I aim to continue to do so. 10 months in one place doing community work is a very short period of time and what I don't want to happen is for me to go in August and a large amount, of what I was a part of, fall apart and cease to be. I'm aiming to make joint ventures with various communities more tangible and start a few small but meaningful and sustainable 'projects'. In effect, I'm talking myself out of a job! These are some of the 'bigger' things I've been involved in but I'd be more than happy to talk about it all more, just ask!

You may remember a visit last year from a speaker from Compassion UK. As a result of that visit a group from the Free Church got together to jointly sponsor a child in a developing country, to help that child escape from poverty.

As a group of members from the Free Church we wanted to share with you what has been happening since we first made that decision. We have got together socially a couple of times to see how we could make this work for us. We have now been given the name and details of the child we will be sponsoring. Her name is Shima Bhattacharjee, pictured right. She is aged 13, and lives just south of Chittagong in Bangladesh. As she speaks Bengali and we do not, our letters to and fro will all be translated by Compassion UK and it will take a few months for our letters to reach each other as she lives in such a remote place, and her letters are collected and delivered by someone from Compassion UK.



As a result of our sponsorship she will go to school, receive nutritious food and health and hygiene education as well as a uniform and shoes and other benefits. And her family will also receive support from the school.

Are you ever short of things to pray about? The URC produces a variety of useful materials. For the last few years I have been using the URC diary. Each month, it helpfully sets out important and special days. In February, some of the important dates include the following: There is 'World Health Interfaith Harmony Week' beginning on Wednesday 1st February. World Cancer Day is on Saturday 4th February. Monday 6th February is the 'International day of zero tolerance to female genital mutilation'. On Monday 20th February, we have 'Together ethnic and minority URC World day of social justice'. And by 3rd March we have the Women's



World Day of Prayer. I am grateful that the diary reminds me of these special days and challenges me to think about these issues about preventing harm and promoting good.

This month's Inspire also tells us about our new St Ives URC Facebook page. As you read and pray around these issues, when you have something useful to share why not let us know and we can post something in a timely manner on our new Facebook page.

I recently did a 2-week course on 'Improving health in resource poor settings' where I met people who were working internationally. The scale of inequalities in the world rather shocked me, and made me aware of the importance of praying into these real and difficult situations.

On a practical level, we can be grateful for the contribution from the 'Just Sharing' shop which has an international reach on reducing world poverty and creating jobs and opportunities for those less well off. It will be good to join with them as they celebrate their 25th anniversary with a special service on Sunday 5th February at morning worship followed by a thanksgiving meal.

I certainly will research these important days and think about how we pray into these situations in chapel prayers. I also plan to write for the East of England synod website in February. Another helpful aide is the 'URC prayer handbook 2017 – Feasts and Festivals'. This is produced annually and has weekly prayers linked to the lectionary. A copy can be found in our chapel when you go in there to pray. Also, everyone who leads chapel prayers has a copy, and I am sure they would be happy to share with you. So, there is plenty for us all to think about, to pray for and to action in February.

Once a year the team of Mary Anthony, Val Bush, Chris Curtis and Keith Cakebread meet to draw up the schedule of publication dates and corresponding deadline dates; they also work out who will edit each edition. Then it's down to you to provide the articles and adverts to fill the pages. Catherine and the Church Secretary provide regular articles but we also welcome articles from anyone involved in the life and work of the church. Sometimes the editors turn into reporters and interview people about specific events or on-going events in our corporate life.
