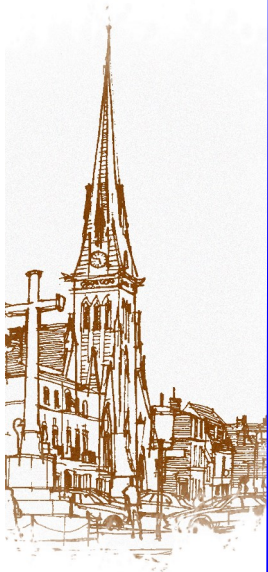

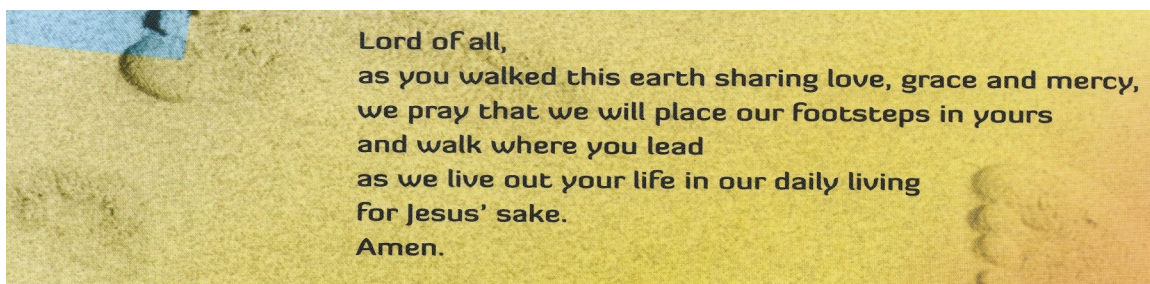
## ***From the Church Secretary***

A new approach within the United Reformed Church is just beginning. This is known as 'Walking the Way: Living the life of Jesus today' It's the umbrella term for the United Reformed Church's focus on lifelong Christian discipleship and mission. I introduced this in the notices at a recent Sunday morning church service. We are all invited to be part of a season of preparation and prayer from September to Advent. There are various materials being prepared that we will keep you informed about. A candle lighting liturgy for the four Sundays of Advent is downloadable from the URC website and, in early 2018, a ten-module resource based on Andrew Robert's book, looking at the ten holy habits of discipleship, will be available, as will Lent resources. The literal meaning for 'disciple' is 'one who learns as they follow'. There are introductory handouts and bookmarks on the landing.

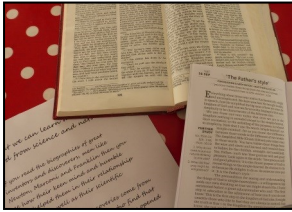


## Battle of Britain Sunday

## ***News from the church eco-group***

An article from **Triodos Bank**

### **Everyday banking with values.**

### **Cheap food may be costing us the earth**

Every apple, pear or lemon we buy comes with a backstory, a cost that isn't factored into the price at the checkout. A new report, welcomed by HRH Prince Charles, scrutinises food supply chains, uncovering the true cost of our everyday shopping habits. The results are surprising: organic food is less expensive than you may think, while regular products are far too cheap.



When we buy an orange or pineapple in the supermarket, we imagine that the price shown reflects the costs involved in producing it. This logic leads us to believe that intensively farmed and low-welfare food items are cheaper to put on the shelf. However, new research from organic trading company Eosta and financial consultants EY, co-sponsored by Triodos Bank, reveals that the social and environmental implications of production make the 'true cost' of food much higher than you may think.

The study, titled 'True Cost Accounting in Farming and Finance' and released in June 2017, considered the impact on health and society, as well as the detriments and negative impacts on our climate, biodiversity, water use and soils. By considering these six elements, the researchers were able to build a broader picture of how food systems operate in the wider context of production.

For example, while organic and non-organic apples were found to be broadly similar on many facets, the difference in impact on health was dramatic. This difference is attributed to the heavy use of pesticides, particularly at a late stage of growing, having negative health consequences for pickers during harvest. From these stats, Eosta were able to calculate that buying organic apples would save 27 sick days, per hectare per year, meaning a 17p (19 euro cents) per kilo advantage for organic apples. They also identified some other surprising impacts in their research, including:

***Buy one organic pineapple and save 125 litres of greenhouse gases***

***Buy organic pears and save 6m<sup>3</sup> of fertile soil (per 1000sqm and year)***

***Buy organic grapes and save 14.708 litres of water (per 100sqm and year)***

Long-term organic advocate HRH Prince Charles welcomed the study, highlighting that a concentration on the financial bottom line would only derail efforts to maintain and improve our agricultural land to provide sustainability and food security. As Eosta CEO Volkert Engelsman pointed out, "The report makes clear that organic food is not too expensive, but rather conventional food is too cheap."

Providing a measure of what these costs are and their social and environmental consequences would equip consumers with enough information to make informed decisions that reflect their values. This is a major step in empowering the consumer by providing transparency and reflects our own commitments to providing full transparency around where our customers' savings and investments are lent.

When it comes to food and farming, Triodos Bank recognises the impact that certain food systems can have on our planet and the people who are part of the production cycle. For this reason, we only invest in organic, sustainable farming as we believe it recognises the relationship between our environment, our health and the food we eat. Organic farming avoids the use of pesticides and chemical fertilisers and maintains the highest standards of animal welfare which, ultimately, means less strain on the ecology of our planet.

In the future, the true cost of products should be on clear display. As consumers we vote on the world we want to see through the daily purchases we make. By making hidden costs transparent and informing the customer, we can allow people to make an informed decision and spend or save their money in a way that reflects their values.

## The Free Church Spire Repairs

The 150-foot Free Church Spire, a prominent landmark in St Ives market place, is currently undergoing renovation work with the help of money from many people and organisations in the town and surrounding villages. The spire urgently needs stone replacement, repointing and weed removal.



Rodells, specialist church conservation steeplejacks, and Helen Axworthy senior conservation architect with RH Partnership, inspected the site on 2<sup>nd</sup> July. By end of July, scaffolding was erected and renovation work started in earnest. The Spire Appeal for £55,000 stood at about £28,000 by mid-September. The appeal team has been overwhelmed by local support.

In early September, Corona Brass Quintet, a local and highly gifted brass ensemble, performed a fundraising concert in the Free Church, raising over £600. The concert was organised by Val Bush and James Stygall of Corona Brass. See Val's article on Page 5.

A grant of £2,000 was received recently from the Huntingdonshire District Council Community Chest, also supported by St Ives Town Council. It has given the Free Church and its many user groups a huge boost.

Thank you very much for your continued and ongoing support to save our spire.

## Plaudits for the United Reformed Church at Greenbelt Festival!

The United Reformed Church made itself 'More than Welcome' at sun-kissed Greenbelt during the August Bank Holiday Weekend; attracting many a compliment for its thoughtful, thought-provoking presence and wide-ranging activities.

The URC's 'More than Welcome' theme for 2017 proved to be fertile ground for conversation and action during the festival of arts, faith and justice. From a knitted food treasure hunt through to intentional conversations, cake and debate, poetry, storytelling, a panel discussion and much more, the URC based its programme on the question posed in Luke 14:15-24: 'Who's missing from the banquet?' This led to further questions: 'Who's missing from our conversations, our communities, our churches?' The challenge was then thrown down: 'Jesus invites everyone. Do you? What will you do to fully include others – and allow them to replenish and change you?'

Hundreds of adults and children responded to the challenge in various ways. One of the most popular of activities was the knitted food treasure hunt, all made possible by 80 churches from Fraserburgh to Southampton and including Fenstanton. Knitting and crochet fans contributed a staggering 2,800 items for the event.

### ***Did you know?*** (courtesy of Stewart)

The Free Church building was opened in 1864 and cost £6000 (£700,000 in today's money). Essentially a brick "gothic style" building clad in stone apart from the spire above the clock face which is all stone. Height to the top of the spire is 150ft.

At the opening, the building was described as providing accommodation for over 700 people, when it had a much larger rear gallery.
