

## Christmas Thoughts



People may think or feel very differently about Christmas. Some look forward eagerly and with excitement - others with dread and sadness. In whatever way Christmas stirs our emotions, our feelings are very often reflections from past Christmases and events that have affected us in either childhood or adult life. As Christians we have reason for joy and celebration that has little to do with feelings and more to do with the fact of God's gift to the world, which is what we celebrate. Wesley described the incarnation in an unforgettable way - "our God contracted to a span, incomprehensibly made man". God became man in the form of a baby, the most dependent state of man. The provider of all became the most needy. The King of Kings was born in a place where cattle fed and slept not in a palace or place of privilege. His parents had no status or privilege but became the most remembered of all time,

wherever the account of the incarnation of the Son of God has been proclaimed. Not for God's Son the surroundings of a modern maternity unit – God could have chosen a more suitable time and place for the birth of His son! But Jesus identified with all human need and claimed no special rights when he came to earth.

I worked in the Norfolk and Norwich maternity hospital when it was first opened and 'sparklingly' new. I think it was there that I first realized the contrast between my modern surroundings and the place of Jesus' birth. Jesus identified with all human need and conditions in His earthly life. This enables all to feel included in God's love and understanding from the street children of our world to those in highest authority. Christmas is a time for the giving and receiving of gifts. May our hearts, minds and lives be open to receive the greatest gift of God's love by allowing Jesus and the knowledge of Him to grow in us. May we offer to the King of Kings our lives to be used to serve Him by serving the community and family He has placed us in. May we all experience the love and joy of Christ's presence this Christmas time and His grace to sustain us in the coming year.

#### MEDITATIONS ARE RETURNING!

Meditations on Christian themes will recommence on the second Tuesday of January (9th) at 2:30 pm at Fenstanton URC for the first month. This will be on the theme of "Renewal". The times and places of meditation sessions after that may well vary in the New Year so please watch out for notices about that.

I have been asked to suggest a Meditation for Christmas. Those of you who have been attending in the past will know how to begin. Those who have not, and would like to try, here is a suggestion of how you can begin. The form of meditation that we follow is one of relaxation and self-awareness so that body and mind are calm in order that we can receive more readily the words of scripture or Christian writings and contemplate their meaning. Do not attempt to meditate immediately after a meal.



TO PREPARE: Ensure that there will be no interruptions, e g switch off phones, etc, find the reading and have it ready by your seat. Sit as comfortably as you can in an upright chair, feet flat on the floor, hands on lap. Close your eyes and focus your thoughts first of all on the top of your head, then gradually move down the body, taking time to be aware of each part. When you eventually arrive at your feet, focus on your breathing. Study how the breath comes in and out, follow it, don't alter it unless you have to. Then, after a few minutes take up the reading. If you are distracted in any way by noises or disturbing thoughts, go back to following the breath for a couple of minutes. Imagine the sounds or thoughts are "passing clouds", observe them and simply allow them to pass. Don't react to them. Read the passage slowly and carefully, more than once, to get the full meaning. When you have done this, close your eyes once again and think over the reading several times. What did it mean to you? It's important to try and see what God is telling you through the reading. At all times remain in a calm state. The reading is LUKE Chapter1 verses 26 to 42.


### "Here's One I Made Earlier"

This well known 'Blue Peter' phrase could easily have been uttered by John Tarring, the architect of our Free Church building, when in the early 1860's he was approached by Potto Brown and the Minister and Elders of the Independent Chapel in St Ives, who were seeking a bold design for a new church building to stand on the most prominent site in the very centre of the town's market square.


In 1861 the Rev Thomas Lloyd had been called by the congregation of the Independent Chapel to be their minister. At this time the

Chapel was in the building in Free Church Passage, occupied today by local businesses. We know that on arrival in St Ives, Rev Lloyd 'found plans for a new church building well advanced. which included joining with the local Baptist congregation'.

There is no doubt that the Minister and Elders were determined to make a bold statement with their new church and with the wealth of Houghton miller Potto Brown at their disposal, they felt confident to search for an established architect who could create this for them. The architect they chose was John Tarring with a practice at Bucklersbury in London.



The Free Church, St Ives 1864




John Tarring was born in 1806 at Holborn near Plymouth and worked there as a carpenter or plasterer until moving to London in 1828. He studied at Brown's Academy in Wells Street and obtained a Royal Academy medal for measured drawing. He became a member of the Royal Institute of British Architects in 1845 at the age of 39. He worked principally in London, later to be joined by his son Frederick William who would succeed him .

Known as the 'Gilbert Scott of the Dissenters', Tarring was the first architect to design a spire for a non-conformist church in London. He is thought to have influenced the Baptists and Congregationalists to adopt the 'Gothic style' for their churches.

In seeking to employ someone for their creative skills, it would be very natural for Potto Brown, Rev Lloyd and Elders to ask to see examples of their previous work. There can be little doubt that one of the projects Tarring showed them was "one he had made earlier" for Tolmers Square Congregational Church in Euston, seen here on the left and completed in 1863.

Completed within 18 months of each other, the external similarity between the two churches is obvious and very striking. Not only would John Tarring be able to show the St Ives non-conformists the drawings of the Tolmers Square church, but it is very likely that he would have taken them to see the building in its early stages of construction. We cannot know for certain, but they surely must have been impressed by the Tolmer design, whose front was dominated by a soaring tower and spire which would exactly make the bold statement the St Ivians were seeking for the prestigious town centre site which was ready and waiting for their new building.

Following their visit and further consultations, it is fair to assume that Potto Brown. Minister and Elders from St Ives enthusiastically commissioned John Tarring to create their new 'Free Church' for St Ives - based on 'the one he had made earlier' at Tolmers Square.

This particular commission would have been good news for John Tarring on two fronts. First it would further enhance his reputation with the wider Non-Conformist church community. Secondly, the time taken to produce the working drawings for the St Ives building could be considerably reduced because a lot of the architectural detailing had already been resolved at Tolmers Square. Producing architectural drawings in the 1860's was a very time consuming and laborious process.

Work began on the foundations for the new 'Free Church' building in 1863, the foundation stone being laid in the October of that year. Remarkably, within 12 months the building was complete and opened in September 1864 to great acclaim and joyful celebrations. Sadly, the ensuing histories of the two churches could not have been more different. Within 60 years the Tolmers church had become a cinema which closed in 1972. Eventually it was demolished to make way for housing. In great contrast, the Free Church was to flourish during the next 100 years. In 1980 a radical remodelling of the interior enabled the church to broaden its outreach and ministry to the local community which continues today.

The fragile drawing on the right is one of a handful of surviving drawings by John Tarring from the early 1860's preserved in an RIBA collection housed at the Victoria and Albert Museum. In this cross section, are we looking towards the apse at the Free Church or the Tolmers Church? There are so many recognisable features of the Free Church in this drawing - the soaring stone arch; the roof detailing of the apse; the thin cast iron columns and the wooden tracery segments within the main roof beams. But this drawing is of the Tolmers Square Church. Remove the sloping gallery seating on each side and this drawing probably illustrates how our Free Church building looked on the day it opened in September 1864.
