#### **Take Action**

In June the UK will host the G7 Summit in Cornwall. It's a crucial opportunity for some of the richest and most polluting nations to take action for climate justice. As we can't be physically present in Cornwall to raise our voices, we need to make sure the Prime Minister gets the message another way. Send Boris a postcard representing where you live to show the breadth of support for action on climate justice. Here's a suggested message for you to include:

*Dear Prime Minister,*

*I can't be in Cornwall for the G7, but I call on you to make this summit a success for climate justice. Please - Increase climate finance to the most vulnerable communities around the world. – Cancel unfair debts so that countries can tackle the climate crisis and other urgent priorities. The futures of millions of people depend on a just finance deal.*

## St Ives Eco-Faith Book Resources by Sally Runham

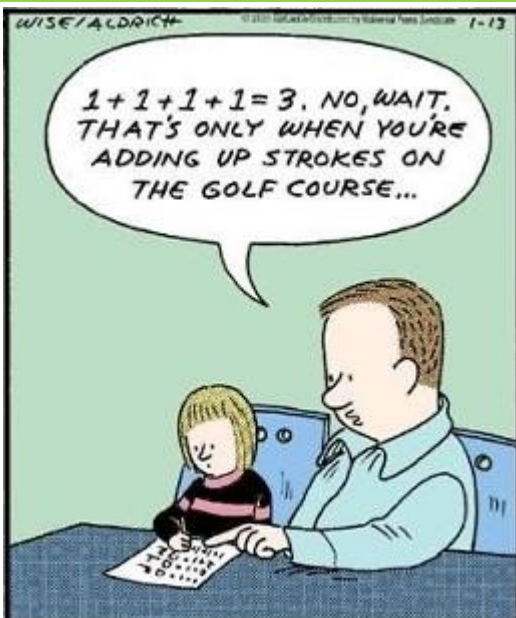
This group is meeting regularly and getting to know each other and to share ideas. Representatives from several churches attend including from Churches Together St Ives (CTSI). The group links closely with St Ives Eco Action group.

A study group at St Ives Methodist Church is working through *Jesus and the Earth* by Bishop James Jones. Revd Heather Walker kindly wrote the following review, "The book of Genesis describes God's delight in creation in all its aspects and there are plenty of Old Testament references to how the land and the products of creation should be used. Bishop Jones sets out to show that Jesus Christ came to redeem the whole of creation and the implications that has for us as Christians. He uses sound theological argument based on New Testament material. Each chapter challenges the reader to take a wider view of what it actually means to pray, 'Your kingdom come, your will be done on earth as it is in heaven'.

Others are reading *Rewilding the Church* by Steven Aisthorpe, who finds inspiration in the ecological concept of rewilding, an approach to the environment that allows nature to break free from the dulling effects of strategic control and bring wonder back into our lives. Applying this thinking to the Church, Steve Aisthorpe imagines what might happen if we put less faith in our strategies and plans, which inevitably depend on our own capabilities and resources, and allow the Spirit to lead us beyond our capacity to imagine. The book explores afresh the compelling invitation of Jesus to 'Follow me' and the call to 'throw off everything that hinders and entangles'. It poses provocative questions and issues a call to contribute to the great rewilding of the Church – and to be rewilded ourselves. The same human instincts that have disrupted our natural environment have also constrained and domesticated the Church and this *book* recommends a rediscovery of the adventure of faith.

St Ives Eco Action group itself is spearheading a Nature Recovery Plan and aims, with the help of local conservationists, to map local wildlife areas such as churchyards and then look at measures to protect, enhance or restore such spaces. There is an assessment of churchyard diversity planned for 5<sup>th</sup> to 19<sup>th</sup> June.

I remember one incident when my sister and I were 2 and 4 ( so I suppose I was told about it). John Bunyan wrote:

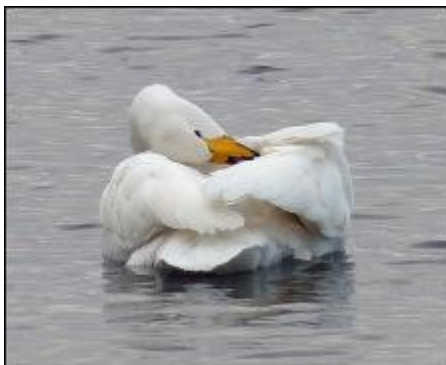
This pretty bird, oh how she flies and sings!
