






Politicians at Westminster seem to be dreaming up various ways to undermine parents. They are foisting LGBT propaganda on our children without their parents' knowledge. The astonishing claim is made that children are not born male or female, but can choose to become a boy or girl if they feel like it. Activists are even pushing for schools to make all toilet facilities "gender neutral"!

Campaigners are pushing the LGBT agenda wherever they can get a foothold. In the new "Relationships education", a number of M.P.s have expressed concern that the lessons will be used to "stigmatise traditional marriage and promote alternative lifestyles to children against the will of their parents". In a recent consultation document, the CESA committee rigorously upheld the right of all parents to withdraw their child from all lessons and assemblies where unsuitable teaching is taking place, in accordance with their legal rights.

Servicemen and women were recently required to raise the LGBT "rainbow flag" in an army campaign, and in so doing replaced the unique regimental flag!

This is only one issue: there is the rise in people living on the streets; changes in benefits have meant that many people are really struggling to exist; knife crime has risen at an extraordinary rate; trusted sports coaches have been abusing young people and so it goes on.

We give thanks that God is always in control! He always has been and always will be. Praise His name!

We thank God for the organisations which reach out to help those in need and we are grateful that because of the generosity of our people, we have been able to donate £500 to "Caring for Life". We were challenged

The decline in membership is about the same as last year and is averaging 3.31% per annum. If we continue at this rate, we will be below 1000 members before 2023 and will be at zero by 2040. Our average attendance is lowest since we began to record this figure. Sunday School Teachers are the most stable statistic of all. There are 74 less devotional meetings than last year, and the number of young people had fallen yet again. The overall picture is one of decline.

Our Administration Manager reminded us that God has a plan for us -plans to prosper and not to harm us, plans to give us a hope and a future. We were urged to focus on God and regain a perspective on His plans. It was pointed out that two churches have left the Union and therefore, the figures break even if they are discounted. It was considered to be a positive year even though the figures do not actually show it. The Report was accepted unanimously.



24. Home Missions and YPD Report Report by

Most of our effort in the past year, rightly or wrongly, has been in attempting to recruit one or more Regional Workers.

Our original plan was to place an advertisement on a national Christian web site in order to reach the widest possible potential audience.

This was partly successful in that we received six expressions of interest, all of whom were then sent application forms and detailed job specifications. None of these expressions of interest were taken up into formal applications.

At our next committee meeting it was agreed that we would wait until the beginning of this year before we re-advertised.

During the early part of this year there was an enquiry from another WRU circuit of churches into the possibility of recruiting for them. This made three potential worker posts.

At our last committee meeting, we discussed the best way forward and it was agreed that we would look at liaising with each church group as to identifying a more local way of advertising, in the hope that candidates from the immediate area might show interest.

At present this plan had been shared with two of the areas, one via a meeting and the other via correspondence.

To date there has been no further feedback.

The process of recruiting an area worker has seemed to be slow. This has been due to the difficulty in recruiting. There were some suggestions that the churches that have expressed an interest in an area worker should be encouraged to advertise locally. Subject to approval of the committee these adverts will be sent to the local areas. We are seeking God's will in what we do, looking to support and embrace the work in our local churches.

Development and Outreach Consultant (DOC) report: The DOC would like to come round to visit the churches and meet with the leaders. He recently visited the churches in the Bradford area. He gave a report on the work that is going on in the Birely church where they have started a meal and service on a Thursday evening which is proving to be a blessing to the church and the community. St Mary's in Sheffield now have a Chinese church meeting on their premises which is proving to be a great blessing. The DOC brought the book "A good old age" by Derek Prime as a resource that can be used in discipleship It could be used for personal study or as part of a bible study. It teaches on how to encourage people to be involved in the local church. The DOC is going to be visiting Beacon and Birely church and will be running a holiday club at Elistown in August. If this is something that any church would be interested in they should contact the DOC. The Barnsley Circuit set up a Pilgrims progress event that can be used as a way of engaging the community.

The combined report was proposed and seconded. The report was carried.

26. Safeguarding issues

by CEO of the Churches Child Protection Advisory Service (CCPAS), who focused on what they do and how they do it - but mainly why they do it. He emphasised the importance of protecting vulnerable people. He further spoke of creating safer places and seeing the Church as a safe place. He shared an example of good practice. We need to leave a positive legacy for the next generation. They have four key departments: Disclosure, Policy and support (incorporating a 24/7 -365 Helpline), Training and Consultancy.

He asked, "What is our Biblical mandate?" and spoke about Proverbs 31:8, "Speak out on behalf of the voiceless and for the rights of all who are vulnerable". (Common English Bible).

They use a ten standards base approach, which is featured in the booklet – "Staying safe and secure." This booklet moves from polices to working safely, from communication to partnership. The whole Church needs to be informed and be aware. We are all dealing with life and life throws many things at us; we all need to be prepared.

27. Ministers' Provident Society Report


b. Report by

As always, it is a privilege to be able to report to Conference on another year of work by the MPS. This department was set up in 1924 to support Ministers and their wives in retirement. It also provides a gift on the death of either the Minister or spouse to help towards funeral expenses.

The past year has once again been one where our outgoings have exceeded our receipts by a large amount. Around 15 years ago we were blessed with a large legacy which enabled us to give very generously and we believe that we have used this in accordance with the desires of the donor. However, that has now largely been used and this meant that at Conference last year we had to take the difficult decision to reduce the amounts given in annuities for this year and in future years. We have also had another year of low interest rates and although donations this year have increased by 25% for which we are very grateful, the overall balance has reduced by over £10,000. If the receipts continue at the current level, the Officers and Board Members will need to consider prayerfully and carefully how the fund will be financed and administered – the reductions mentioned above in annuities will take us through the next three years but then the legacy will have been used and our only income will be donations and interest received.

We are currently supporting 8 retired ministers and 6 widows who are very thankful for the gifts they receive each quarter. On many occasions it seems that they arrive at just the right time to meet a particular financial need.

We want to thank individuals and churches who have supported us this year both financially and in prayer and we ask that you consider the Ministers' Provident Society when arranging your giving to the Lord's work.

GDPR is designed to give individuals more rights and control over how their data is held and stored in a digital age. Data is any information that is personal to an individual that identifies them. There are Six legal reasons for holding data.

Consent is required for holding information such as, name, phone, address, financial information for Gift Aid etc. Consent is also required for information that we pass on such as financial information to HMRC for Gift Aid.
