My Walk with God

I've been asked by the editorial committee to introduce myself a little more to the Wesleyan Reform Union. First of all, let me say a big 'thank you' for your very warm welcome towards me, especially as I am not from a WRU background. I am a Bristolian (and my accent is still there in places!) and I made a decision to follow Christ during Billy Graham's visit to Bristol during Mission England '84.

My life immediately went from being purposeless to purposeful and although I had failed all my O levels that particular summer, with no job prospects on leaving school, the Lord went before and I found a satisfying job in HR (or Personnel as they used to call it). I retook my exams after a year of night school and day release and passed them all the following year.

There then followed several years of technical college and business school before feeling the call to train for ministry which I did at Mattersey Hall Assemblies of God Bible College near Doncaster. I met my future wife, Deborah, who is American, during a summer mission trip in 1990 with Operation Mobilisation in Belgium. She studied at Emmaus Bible College in Iowa and after both of our graduations, we married in the States in 1993. After the wedding we returned to the UK and we pastored my home church in Bristol for 4 years before pastoring a small church in Stroud, Gloucestershire. I was

then asked to join the faculty of Mattersey Hall where I worked for 18 years as a lecturer and eventually Vice Principal of the college. During this time, I also gained a Masters degree with Sheffield University and a Doctorate with Chester University.

After some changes at the college I left and took on a position as a Missions Director with OneByOne and had the joy of seeing a children's home established in Lahore, Pakistan for 60 child brick slaves. During this time we were also able to see several sewing businesses start for widows in Sri Lanka.

During the pandemic, my position came to a mutual end and I began an itinerant ministry of preaching and teaching in the UK and writing. In 2022, I visited Mexborough Life Church for a couple of Sundays and was asked if I would consider becoming the pastor. We have been with the church for almost two years now and it has been wonderful to see the Lord's blessing upon the church and community.

Activities have started, the church has been restructured, a number have joined us and several have found Christ! I am ably supported by an excellent team of elders and trustees and faithful people. We look forward to all that the Lord has for his people in this needy area of South Yorkshire.

In addition to my church



responsibilities, I have served on the board of Pioneers UK as Vice Chair for over 10 years now. We are in the process of merging with Arab World Ministries, based in Loughborough. I have been so pleased to see the way that the Lord has brought this union together at this time and it's been good to work a little with Helen from AWM who is supported by the WRU.

A final word about my family, I have now been married to the lovely Deborah for 31 years and we have two fine boys who are both married, and both going on in their relationship with the Lord. What a joy for any Christian parent! Our eldest son lives in Lancaster County, Pennsylvania and he is in law enforcement. He and his wife are expecting their first child, a son, in November 2024, so we're going to be grandparents for the first time.

Looking back over 40 years (this year) of following the Lord, I thank him for his faithfulness in the past. I also believe some of my best years are ahead of me and I remain excited to be living 'at such a time as this'.

5. That the Lord Jesus Christ offered Himself as the substitutionary sacrifice for the sin of the whole world, He was raised from the dead, ascended into heaven to be our Advocate and Mediator, and that He will personally return in power and glory.

A little white lie here, a bit of gossiping there – we can so easily trivialise and talk ourselves out of being a real sinner. But if a single episode of the News, can't convince you that sin is the greatest problem we face, then reread the statement above, and see how serious God considers the sin that separates us from Him.

The word 'SIN' is not a measurement of wickedness or to give us a scale for judgment. Only one link in a chain needs to be broken, for the whole chain to be broken and if it was a bracelet, it could be lost forever. The effects of doing wrong things, lying, stealing, abuse or violence all have their consequences and we judge these rightly by the effect they have on others. The Old Testament used a phrase "an eye for an eye"; in other words, our deeds have consequences and some create greater consequences than others.

But the word "SIN" describes our rebellion against God. It describes a spiritual consequence of breaking our relationship with God by rebellion. The links of the chain if you like could be lying, stealing or murder and morally these each could hold different consequences of judgment and effect on those involved. But once the chain is broken, we are cut off from God, we have rebelled against His authority and will, we have sinned and are a sinner. In fact, we started life as a sinner, not because we had done anything wrong, but because

the whole human race exists in a state of rebellion against God its creator. Right from the beginning when Adam rebelled, we have all followed his path.

So why hasn't God abandoned the human race? Because we were made in His image and although that image has been wrecked by our rebellion, God sees something in us that is worth redeeming, putting right, even making new. He first loved us, despite our sin. So, He sent Jesus (the only perfect human this world has ever known) to represent the human race as a substitute. He died in our place, taking the punishment we deserve. On the cross Jesus asked, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" No longer referring to God as His Father, He had become Sin for us, and God punished Him in our place.

Did his death work for us? Yes!! He rose from the dead and ascended into heaven. Now we have a human being, seated in heaven as our representative, to mediate on our behalf.

The question is – What have you done with Jesus? Do you believe He died for you? Do you accept Him as your Saviour? Do you reject sin by repentance and turn instead to follow Jesus as your Lord and God?

It's interesting that the word 'care' was used in these job titles in times past.

Do we care any less now? Or do we use the word 'care' in a different way?

We care for all sorts of things: people, places, the environment...

We care for relatives and loved ones. We care about what we look like (well some of us do!)

We care about ethical issues surrounding food/fairtrade/clothing. We care about our country.

We care for those in need. We care about who we are and where we're going.

We care about ourselves, our faith, church, Jesus, Christianity, making Jesus known... Do we care about those we don't like... even our enemies?

Maybe we're all called to be 'Caretakers'?

We might take our responsibilities very seriously when it comes to cleaning the building, ensuring all the chairs are in their correct places and the heating is on. But this is not what I mean and must never be a priority or substitute for what we are truly caretakers for: The souls of those around us and the story entrusted to us.

We are 'Caretakers of the Word' in an ever-increasing world where scripture and the power of the Word of God is being diluted and minimised to suit agendas, branding and ideology.

We are called to do it and may need to do it, at the expense of our buildings if they are no longer fit for purpose – this will be hard, but if we are to truly be 'caretakers' in a new missional way, it will mean putting people before premises and protecting and caring for that which is sacred and really needs to be our priority.

SHARING AND CARING AT WORSBROUGH COMMUNITY CHURCH

I was asked to write an article on the theme Caring and Sharing so I immediately thought about our Pantry.

For many years the fellowship at Worsbrough had prayed about how we could reach into our community. We had tried leaflet drops, special services etc, but none had really worked. At the beginning of Covid we could feel a need to provide food in some form. We discussed the Food Bank idea, but we wanted weekly contact with the community, that's when the pantry idea was formed.

In November 2020 God answered these prayers when we opened the Community Pantry. It began in the

middle of Covid, so we started in a small way, but we now have 70+ regular members, thankfully they haven't all turned up on the same day! But we do however average out at about 35 members per week.

Through this ministry we hope to show God's love in a practical way, through the food provision. But also, as the members become friends, they are beginning to feel comfortable talking to us about their fears and problems.

We have a couple of pantry members who are now part of the small volunteer base who help to run the pantry each week. In a world that doesn't seem to care, we offer them a chance to see that people do care for them.

One of our members, who has many problems, hadn't been to the pantry for a number of weeks, we sent her a card to say we were thinking of her and hoping all was well, she was so grateful that someone would care so much. A small thing to do but it meant so much to her.

We pray that God will use us to reach these people and that He will give us the strength to carry on running the pantry, week after week.

A day of interactive workshops exploring different ways of bringing our communities closer to Jesus, led by Cassie Biggin and her team.


