

From St Mark's House

Dear friends

Pebbles', introduced elsewhere in this *Parish News* (see page 6), made the children of Englefield Primary School glad when he emerged from hibernation. Some were concerned that he had spent the winter in the fridge (as is appropriate for a hibernating tortoise). It is hard to tell the difference between a live tortoise and a dead one! The children were reassured by Pebbles' 'bursts of speed' and appetite for his favourite food as evidence that he had emerged into the land of the living. Bursts of speed, however defined, are not usually associated with tortoises but the term does bring to mind Aesop's familiar fable of *The Hare and the Tortoise*.

As you no doubt remember, the over-confident hare takes a nap during the race only to find that the tortoise crosses the finishing line first. Before we dismiss this fable as an instructive but fantastic tale, it is interesting to note conservation geneticist Taylor Edwards' reminder that in the Olympics you don't have just one race, but sprints and cross country, too ($BBC\ Earth\ 9/2015$). In a sprint the hare would win hands down. In an endurance race it might be more even. But once the course is prescribed, the results are likely to be different: hares tend to live in a particular area, do not venture too far away from their home territory and 'tend to run in circles, and not travel very far. To cross a finishing line, you have to go somewhere.'

Fascinating though *chelonians* may be (what a marvellous name for the tortoise and his kin), far more important are the truths the fable imparts: like the Tortoise, we have a race to run - it isn't a sprint, it's a life-long marathon in which we take one step at a time. Through perseverance the Tortoise finished the race; through pride the Hare failed to win. As we run, we are encouraged in the biblical letter to the Hebrews to 'fix our eyes on Jesus'. This Easter we have watched Him on His agonising way to the Cross where He took our place and bore our sins, until with His final breath, He cried triumphantly 'It is finished'. He had crossed the finishing line and on Easter morning he rose as Victor over sin and death. Now he cheers us on along the path he has blazed, to ensure that his followers will share his victory and finish the race.

Pebbles encourages us, as winter ends and spring buds, to awake from spiritual hibernation and follow the Lord Jesus on whom our faith depends from first to last.




Notice of the APCM





Women's World Day of Prayer at St Mark's




This is an annual event, each year written by women of a different nation, and forms a great wave of prayer encircling the globe - starting as the sun rises in Samoa and ending some 36 hours later as the sun sets over American Samoa. The form of service is translated into over 60 languages and 1,000 dialects and celebrated in 170 countries and islands. Next year, weather permitting, it will be on Friday 1st March and will be written by the women of Slovenia on the theme: 'Come - Everything is Ready'.

Battle's Over

One hundred years on from the Armistice, on **Sunday 11th November** this year, bells will ring out in unison from churches and cathedrals all across the country. The organisers of Battle's Over, an international event marking the Armistice, want to see more than 1,000 churches and cathedrals participate by ringing their bells simultaneously at 7.05pm on the night of 11th November. It is hoped to recruit 1,400 ringers to represent the 1,400 bell ringers who fell in the Great War.



Future of Theale Primary School

A parish poll was held on March 15th. A total of 2,357 Theale residents were eligible to vote. The result was 499 residents in favour and 440 against the proposal to release land on the North Street playing fields to build a new primary school. The poll was only advisory and Theale Parish Council, which holds the lease, will now make a final decision.





News from the School

As the cold weather tries to leave us and the spring takes hold, the pupils and staff at Englefield Primary School are making the most of every opportunity to enjoy the outdoors. Our younger children have continued to enjoy weekly outdoor-learning sessions in the woods throughout the term. Mrs Sheppard's and Mrs Carney's classes had a fabulous day out at Rushall Farm. After an exciting tractor and trailer ride to the farm buildings, they spent the morning learning about farming today and in the past. A particular highlight was getting to hold a

lamb. In the afternoon, groups enjoyed pond dipping, learning about bees, looking for signs of spring in the woods and even dissecting an owl pellet! The staff at Rushall Farm were delighted by the children's behaviour, knowledge and questions.

Our Year 3/4 class went to Ufton Court for the day as part of their topic on the Tudors. They dressed up and learned all about life in Tudor times, including playing games from that period. Our Year 5/6 pupils had a wonderful opportunity to go to a classical music concert at The Hexagon which was put on by the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra for local schools. They were fascinated by the range of instruments and greatly enjoyed the variety of music on offer.

Recently we enjoyed Book Week which included a dress-up day, a poetry-performance competition and workshops by one of our parents who is a writer by trade. During the week, every child in school participated in producing their own book. Following that, we had a science day, organised by Mrs Postles and our House Captains. The pupils worked in their house groups, visiting four workshops on 'Confusing Cans', 'Bubbles', 'Colour Factory' and 'Pond Investigators'. Everyone enjoyed working in mixed-aged groups and developing their science skills whilst having a lot of fun.



Finally we have been busy on the sports field, achieving a great deal of success along the way. We have taken part in cross-country events, netball matches and football tournaments. Our Year 1/2 football team topped the tables by winning the recent Elstree Football Tournament which was attended by 11 different schools...a superb achievement!

Rail closures

Works have started to electrify the railway line between Reading and Newbury which will mean a series of four-day closures between Pewsey and Theale from now until November The first full closure was in March and the following are confirmed: Monday 23rd to Thursday 26th April; Monday 14th to Thursday 17th May; and Monday 4th to Thursday 7th June. Other dates throughout 2018 are apparently still to be decided but several more are listed on the GWR website: www.gwr.com/Newbury2018. You can also call the 24 hour national helpline on 03457 11 41 41 or email crwest@networkrail.co.uk for more information.

There will be replacement bus services between these stations and season ticket holders are permitted to travel from Didcot, Whitchurch or Overton instead. Several stations will lose some parking spaces to allow Network Rail to store equipment and machinery and for the replacement buses. The GWR website shows 85 spaces being removed at Theale so check before you travel. The top two floors of the multi-storey car park at Reading station are also closed for maintenance until around the end of May.

The good news is that the electrification of the line, together with new Intercity Express trains, will ultimately mean quicker journeys and more capacity.

From winter into spring

Winter in a garden can seem a barren place but it is a time to appreciate the structure of Englefield garden such as the ornate 19th century balustrades, the natural looking stream built in the 20th century and the bare branches of the woodland trees.

Many shrubs are in flower and a few have a sweet scent to them. The flower on the witch hazel looks like orange peel and if you bring a twig close to your nose a very strong scent can be enjoyed! The stems of the dog woods and the berries on the Skimmia japonica 'Rubella' stand out in the winter sunshine as do the flowers on the camellias. Bobbing heads of hellebore flowers line the drive and snowdrops, aconites, crocus and primroses and the first of the early daffodils are just some of the plants you can enjoy at this time of year.

In the autumn of 2017 after spending two years preparing the field off the main drive and adjacent to the Old Rectory, we were finally able to sow it with perennial wild flower seed. I am pleased to see that it is now showing rosettes of leaves of the primrose, ox-eye daisy and achillea. I am confident that many more wildflowers will start to appear as spring progresses.

The garden really is a busy place to be in and not just for us! We often see squirrels, rabbits and many birds such as song thrush, wayfarers, wrens, gold crest, robins and blackbirds. Always present are the kites and pigeons with the odd pheasant taking cover!

News from Rushall Farm

How do you continue with school visits to Rushall Farm when the wind chill is minus two degrees? We were expecting the phone call from the lead teacher of the Holt School, Wokingham, on the Monday morning at 7.30am. 'What contingency plan did we have in place?' Knowing that many children coming here are likely to be inadequately



dressed, our first job was to encourage them that, although it may be 'COOL' not to zip their coats up, the consequences today would be that they would be very cold. Lindsay had also made very sweet oatmeal biscuits and flapjack in quantity with an urn ready for hot drinks of chocolate or squash. We were faced with over 100 children coming on each of three consecutive days but were determined to do our best. The girl who suffered from epilepsy on the first day was rescued from a muddy field but soon recovered by a warm fire at Rushall House. However, the lights in the toilets tripping out at peak demand added a sense of drama to the occasion.

Two extra Rhino radiant heaters made the Black Barn look quite festive for a session on organic shop and input and output processes, but sadly not much warmer. But it all worked out, digging through frozen ground to compare real clay with bright yellow sand and acceptable loam, the sort you would want in your garden. Then a short walk, being mobbed by four very lively Shetland ponies on loan from David White, one donkey and two alpacas, followed by a viewing of the newly landscaped exposed chalk face boasting its regionally important features. It was the chickens next but sadly two less male turkeys, sentenced for beating up their 'up till then' brother and best friend. At last into the lambing shed with new-born twins and triplets everywhere and lambs to cuddle.

Somehow nothing else seemed to matter, including the cold, as weary shepherds Steve and Elizabeth look with patience and forbearing at this interruption to their exhausting work schedule. Machinery next, then cows and calves, so adorable and yet how unfair that a cow has four teats for its mainly single offspring while triplet lambs have to fight over two teats! There is still land use studies to do, and rotations, maybe even a glimpse at Farmer Steve's day book. Then the home trail, removing mud-laden boots, washing hands and back on the coach. Certainly, a day full of learning experiences although the most profound one could have been 'That it is not very COOL to be cool when it really is freezing'.






Book Review

Being Disciples: Essentials of the Christian Life by Rowan Williams (SPCK, 2016)

This is a remarkable book which, although short, repays constant revisiting to fully grasp its insights. Based firmly in scripture, it starts by looking at how the gospels depict the relationship between Jesus and the disciples and underlines the importance of listening and of seeing the significance of the situation in which they find themselves.




As Christians today, we need to listen in our prayers to what Jesus and the Holy Spirit are saying. The life of Jesus is a model for us and, as God's son, gives us an insight into the Father himself.

From the importance of seeing, we learn how to engage with society. Society is constantly changing and Williams writes, 'We are most commonly perceived as people who are anxious about who they should say no to. Jesus of course engaged with some of the most despised in society and we may similarly be called to welcome those to whom we may want to say No.'

This does not mean we should be uncritical but as society changes we may need to be ready to argue firmly but without rancour and above all to be patient both with society and in the political arena. In line with St Paul in his letter to the Galatians, Williams argues for a virtue-led ethics (love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness and self control), rather than a rule-led ethics which can become judgemental.

This small book is based on a number of talks which Williams has given to lay people both at home and abroad. It has been acclaimed by a wide range of Christian leaders of all different doctrinal points of view. I commend it to you.

Reflections

Thoughts for the week

These reflections are just some of the short commentaries that are compiled by Aldo Guiducci each week on the readings in church. They are all available, week by week, on the pew sheets and on the church website.

'For whoever wants to save their life will lose it, but whoever loses their life for me and for the gospel will save it' (Mark 8 v 35)

These are strong words! Jesus doesn't say 'might', or 'could possibly' – he says 'will'. There are no shades of grey, or potential mitigating

circumstances here. Jesus is setting out the blunt truth of the gospel message; that all people need rescuing by him. The only way a person can be saved is by turning to Jesus, and the good news (gospel) of the salvation he offers – losing their life' (in the sense of surrendering their drives and ambitions, not ceasing to physically live). The alternative – saving their life in the sense of rejecting Jesus' claim to be pre-eminent in that person's desires, drives and focus of living – ultimately leads to death. If we are at our core trusting in anything other than Jesus, if our lives are founded on status, money, personal networks or anything else, Jesus warns us that we are heading for disaster. The question is, what are we living for? And in the long run, is it worth it?

'On reaching Jerusalem, Jesus entered the temple courts and began driving out those who were buying and selling there.' (Mark 11 v 15a)

Jesus' clearing of the temple is an episode that some people want to gloss over, as it contradicts the idea of "gentle Jesus meek and mild". In these verses we see Jesus get angry; angry enough to start physically remonstrating with people in the temple, and cause quite a scene. Uncomfortable as it may make us feel, the truth is that there is a time for righteous anger. To stand by and do nothing in the face of wickedness is not a godly response to wrongdoing. There will be times when it is right – even necessary – for those who belong to God to feel moved to take action against injustice or blatant sin. But we must be careful to ensure that our anger, when it is roused, is righteous anger. It is much more likely that we will be angry for the wrong reasons than it is for us to fail to become angry for the right reasons. When we become angry, it is vital to check whether we are angry because we feel personally slighted, or because God is being dishonoured.

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'Truly I tell you, anyone who will not receive the kingdom of God like a little child will never enter it.' (Mark 10 v 15)

What is Jesus saying in this passage? Some have thought that Jesus is talking about innocence here – that to enter the kingdom of God a person must be a good person, not a guilty one. But anyone who actually has children will quickly realise this reasoning is flawed – wonderful though they are, little children are often guilty of all sorts of things. The key characteristic of a child is not innocence, but dependence. He or she will unashamedly come to a parent asking for something, with no pretence or expectation that they will have to pay for it or earn it. It doesn't occur to a toddler that a parent would expect something in return for providing breakfast – they just ask for it. Jesus is reminding us here that God's kingdom is based on grace, on God's undeserved favour, not on our works. He warns us that to think we can earn our place in the kingdom is totally wrong, and that those who try will find that they aren't able to enter. Pride in our own abilities is completely misplaced, and will lead to ruin if we ignore what Jesus is saying, rather than trust him to provide the rescue we badly need.
