We need your help!

All being well, by the time you read this article we will have had a spell of plentiful rain. However, a very dry April, with only 34% of the long-term average rainfall, served as a reminder of our community's reliance on the Estate borehole to serve the majority of the parish.

We would gently remind everyone in the parish to use water as carefully as possible please. If we all save a little bit of water now, given the limits upon the volume that can be abstracted from the borehole, this could help avoid restrictions should there be a drought this summer. Advice on how to save water is available from various bodies such as www.waterwise.org.uk/.

In particular, we would please ask residents on the private water supply not to use sprinklers and to use hosepipes very sparingly whether washing cars, filling paddling pools or watering the garden.

Water is a precious commodity that cannot be taken for granted anywhere but especially at Englefield. The Estate, as your water supplier, has a part to play too by dealing promptly with wastage or leaks in the distribution system. If you or one of your neighbours spots a leak, please report it immediately and we will fix it as quickly as we can. Many thanks.

Safeguarding at St Mark's

At St Mark's church we take safeguarding very seriously. We are very grateful to Susannah McBain who has been Safeguarding Officer for the last few years. She stepped down at the APCM and Lucy Roper has now taken over as the designated contact, in the first instance, should any concerns be raised.



Lucy has been a member of the congregation at St Mark's for several years. She has experience with safeguarding through her current employer, University College of Estate Management, Reading, and also held the role of Welfare Officer for Reading Swimming Club and Thames Valley Triathletes.

The latest guidance from the NSPCC defines the role as:

Promoting the welfare of children and protecting them from harm:

Child protection is part of the safeguarding process. It focuses on protecting individual children identified as suffering or likely to suffer significant harm. This includes child protection procedures which detail how to respond to concerns about a child.

Safeguarding means:

- · protecting children from abuse and maltreatment
- · preventing harm to children's health or development
- ensuring children grow up with the provision of safe and effective care
- · taking action to enable all children and young people to have the best outcomes

Nick endorsed Paul's blessing, 'I commit you to God and the word of his Grace which can build you up and give you an inheritance among all those who are sanctified'.



From Englefield Primary School

'Sowing the Seeds for a Flourishing Future'

Hooray for the sun! It has been great to finally enjoy some sunnier weather of late and it has meant that the children are

now able to use the school field. It is so lovely to see the children enjoying a game of football or playing tag and making use of all our space.



We have recently had a new multigym fitted on the school field. The new gym is aimed at encouraging the children to stay active whilst also having fun. It also means that those children who may not like particular PE lessons, can take part in a different type of fitness. It is very popular and the children are excellent at lining up and waiting for a turn.

The children in KS2 recently took part in Archery sessions in school. The Year 3/4 class learned the

techniques of archery and did target practice. The Year 5/6 class also learned techniques, but then played a game of archery tag, where they were split into two team and hid behind giant inflatables and had to try to hit the other team's target. The bows that were used were all safety ones with soft ends that looked like giant marshmallows!

Mrs Watts has come back to Englefield to restart her bee-keeping club. Six pupils from Year 5/6 donned their protective suits and joined her on a visit to the bee hives. They even held the queen!

Our school Wendy House has undergone a revamp. It was first donated to school by the PTA in 1997 and has since then been a much loved

playtime activity for the children. It has over the years had various repairs, but was recently starting to look a bit worn out again and in need of some new equipment. With funds donated from our PTA we were able to buy a new play kitchen, toy food, a table and chairs and a new doll and crib. Mrs Latimer and Mrs Carney came in over the Easter holidays and painted inside and out. It once again looks lovely and is getting plenty of use.

The summer term means only one thing here at Englefield, school band for our KS2 children. Every Wednesday afternoon the children all join together in the school hall and under the conducting skills of a music teacher from Berkshire Maestros, rehearse as a school band ready for a performance at the end of term. Children are welcome to bring in their own instruments or one supplied by school. We have a mix of guitars, pianos, ukuleles, drums, flutes and percussion instruments. The children and staff are really enjoying playing together and we are all looking forward to their concert.



Finally, on Friday 13th May we said a very fond farewell to Reverend Nick and Harriet Wynne-Jones in a special school assembly. Both have supported the school throughout their time in Englefield and will be greatly missed by us all. We presented them with some special gifts to remember us by and they both spoke beautifully, inspiring us for the final time.

Rev Tom Ekin RIP

Many will remember with great fondness Tom Ekin, Resident Priest at Englefield from 1994 to 2004. He passed away peacefully on 7th March 2022. He was 92 years old.

Tom Croker Ekin was born on 19th August 1929. During the war, he was evacuated from school in London, enjoyed a varied career including doing

national service, working as a salesman for a well-known drinks company, and serving in the colonial police in what was then Tanganika in East Africa, before attending theological college in Lincoln.

He was a curate in Learnington Spa before taking up his first parish in Ilmington, Warwickshire. He then left for a post in Durban, at St James' Church, from 1970 to 1977, before returning to the UK to take up a parish in Moreton-in-Marsh and Batsford, in Gloucestershire, after which he came to St Mark's. While at Englefield, Tom married Liz, in 1996, which proved a very happy partnership. Together, they presided over a flourishing ministry at St Mark's, making many friends and drawing many to the church. The picture below was taken to mark the millennium and Tom and Liz can be seen in the centre.

Tragically, after their move from Englefield to the parish of Redhill in North Somerset, Liz died in 2009 from an aggressive form of cancer. Redhill was to be Tom's final post. After he retired he moved to the neighbouring village of Wrington, and then to Sandford Station care home after a severe stoke in November 2018.

He leaves behind three loving sons, Charlie, Simon and Jono, who organized a moving celebration of their father's life at All Saints, Wrington, on Friday 18th March, attended by many family and friends.



Bluebells at Rushall Farm

I first met Rose Tocock at a Harvest Lunch we hosted for Reading MS sufferers. At the time my sister was very ill, and being looked after in a Cheshire Home near Norwich, so it helped me to be doing something locally. Rose's husband Dave had MS, and she worked for Philip Green. When Dave died she retired and became chairman of the Reading Branch. She has run it in a no-nonsense way and received an MBE for her efforts.



With an ageing workforce of twenty volunteers the prospect of getting the MS support group up and running again after covid was daunting. But what a relief and joy it was for us all to be hosting the Bluebell Walks for the MS Society again. And what a response! We were mindful of global warming and the changing effects on seasons, but stuck to the last two weekends in April for this year's events. Two things happened: the weather was good and dry and the paths were not muddy, so a lot of people came, and the bluebells were at their peak. They were not alone because there were still clumps of primroses, beds of celandines and wood anemones, wood spurge, some early orchids and yellow archangel just emerging. With the trees coming into leaf and birdsong filling the air, the countryside delivered 'rest for the soul' and fresh air and exercise for the body. Of course, that could all be undone by the bacon butties, burgers and homemade iced cakes being delivered in the barn to refresh weary walkers. And what a boost it was to those gallant helpers. Some were a little sun burnt and all definitely tired, but there was a sense of achievement they all had in helping this worthy cause. Around $f_{12,000}$ was raised, and will be used to support those in the Reading area with MS.

There was just one mishap. A man had wandered off the beaten track in his rough terrain wheelchair and toppled over into a ditch. He had previously had a stroke and so was very heavy, being paralysed down one side. We found him in the middle of the woods with his wife. As we were trying to work out how to get him back on his vehicle a lady appeared and said, 'I am a physiotherapist. Now listen to me.' So, we got him safely back on his vehicle and thanked God for His provision.

Come in Number 13

To see rows of houses missing a number 13 is quite common and is usually down to triskaidekaphobia, the morbid fear of the number 13 and its supposed connection with bad luck. That's not the case with Englefield Street, though, for there was a 13 until it was pulled down in about 1892. Number 13 was one of a pair of cottages (with the original number 12) that stood opposite the Timber Yard entrance where there is now a shed, and both were certainly there on April 5th 1891, for the census return of that year numbers the houses in Englefield village for the first time and has them both, numbered as such, with the old schoolroom and schoolhouse, two separate dwellings, numbered 11 and 11a, just up The Street, and numbers 14 and 15 (a fairly recent replacement for the old Chantry Cottage) further down, immediately before Elmfields, home of Clerk of Works William Rhind.

When the houses were first numbered is unclear, but it was certainly before 1881 for the census enumerator for Sulhamstead Bannister in that year has numbered two of the Mayridge Farm cottages as 61 and 62. The other two appear, unnumbered, in the Englefield census so there was clearly some confusion as to where the parish boundary ran as all four were actually in Sulhamstead Bannister at that time. Ten years later all four appear correctly under Sulhamstead and are numbered, as today, 59 to 61.

The new school opened in 1863 but in 1871 and although there are no numbers given in that census, it is clear that it was still then a single dwelling occupied by gardener George Swadling, his wife Sarah and their two children, with William Horne (also a gardener) as a lodger. Ten years later in 1881, George and Sarah Swadling were still in part of it (and still with William Horne as a lodger) but the building had been divided and was shown as two properties for the first time, though one of them listed as unoccupied.

The Ordnance Survey six inch to the mile map surveyed in 1877/78 shows the garden to be divided into two so it would appear that the numbering of the houses must have been carried out before then but probably only very shortly before because number 8/9 appears to have been built after the 1871 census but before the map was surveyed and without it the numbers in 1891 would not work out.

The upper floor was probably added to the schoolroom, therefore, between 1871 and 1877 and the house then divided in two to produce a classic 'L-plan' Englefield house in the style of the new ones built during the early part of Richard Fellowes's time as Squire. From the road, the later addition of this upper floor is clearly visible on the gable end.

By the time of the 1891 census, William Horne had moved to lodge at the old number 12 with Edward Leavy, who looked after the steam engine in the Timber

Yard, and his wife Hannah. Next door at 13, carpenter and joiner John Chamberlain also lodged with widow Martha Trinder, a garden labourer. In number 11 in that year was David Horne, a painter and decorator, with his third wife Mary and two children but 11a was shown as unoccupied.

Less than a month after the 1891 census date, the Rector noted in the parish magazine that 'David Horne has removed to No 11a and George Fisher will shortly be in the old 'Mission Cottage' which really is No 11'. It was about this time that the new 'wing' was added across the back of the property so perhaps it was after that was completed that David Horne moved from the smaller front part to the now larger rear. Certainly, in the 1901 census David and Mary Horne (now with six children) are listed in number 12 and Parish Nurse Jane Fair is in 11 with her daughter and niece. There is also a note that there is now no number 13, it having been demolished soon after the 1891 census along with the original number 12.

Thoughts for the week

Reflections

These reflections are just some of the short commentaries that are compiled by Aldo Guiducci each week on the readings in church. They are all available, week by week, on the pew sheets and on the church website.

When they had finished eating, Jesus said to Simon Peter, 'Simon son of John, do you love me more than these?'... The third time he said to him, 'Simon son of John, do you love me?' Peter was hurt because Jesus asked him the third time (John 21 v 15a, 17a)

Jesus had already met with his disciples twice after he had risen from the dead; on this third occasion he corners Peter after breakfast and asks him what on the surface looks like a simple question. But there are some barbs in it. By three times addressing him as 'Simon, son of John', Jesus deliberately avoids using the name which he himself gave him: Peter, the Rock. By asking if Peter loves him 'more than these' Jesus is drawing his attention to the boastful assertion Peter made before the arrest in the garden that he would stick by Jesus even if the others fell away (see Mark 14:29). Finally, in asking the question three times, Jesus deliberately echoes the three denials that Peter made during that awful night before the Crucifixion.

That Jesus drew Peter's focus to his failure was important precisely because it showed Peter that Jesus knew everything. Nothing was swept under the carpet, where it could fester and cause Peter angst later on. And after all this, when Jesus finishes with 'Follow mel', it shows Peter that their relationship is completely restored. So it is with us. To all who look to him, Jesus says in effect 'whoever you are, whatever you've done – come home. All is forgiven!'

'A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another.' (John 13 v 34-35)

What is the hallmark of a Christian in the world of today? Is it selfrighteousness? A holier-than-thou judgemental attitude? In these words, Jesus tells his followers what they should look like – people who love one another.

In case we are tempted to think about watering this down – what the minimum threshold for this love might look like – Jesus spells it out for us: his followers must love one another 'as I have loved you' (v34). This is a love which doesn't count the cost. A love which doesn't hold back. Jesus' love took him all the way to the cross for the sake of those he loved. And that is what he calls us to – a radical way of living which flies in the face of our individualistic, self-focused age. Soon after his death and resurrection, Jesus' followers set the world on fire with this radical way of living. The church was unique in that people from every social level and background, with nothing in common except for their faith in

Jesus as God's triumphant King, loved one another in a way which set them apart from the society around them. People on the outside noticed the change that Jesus had made in the lives of those who followed him, and were deeply challenged by it. Do we provoke the non-Christian world around us to think again about Jesus and the difference he can make?

Jesus replied, 'Anyone who loves me will obey my teaching. My Father will love them, and we will come to them and make our home with them. Anyone who does not love me will not obey my teaching.' (John 14 v 23-24a)

The heart of the Christian faith is having a heart for Jesus. In this passage, Jesus describes the wonderful reciprocal relationship of love that exists between Jesus, his followers, and God the Father. Those who love Jesus are loved by the Father, and both the Father and Jesus will dwell with them. What does that mean?

Jesus is clear: those who love him are those who obey his teaching. Conversely, those who do not love him do not obey his teaching. His words are a rebuke to those who would say they are Christians yet show no interest in finding out what Jesus approves of, nor do what Jesus says. Loving Jesus involves finding out what he teaches, and putting it into practice. This is why Bible study is so important: it is through reading the Scriptures that we learn what Jesus says, and so getting into a habit of daily Bible reading is a great discipline to develop to help deepen our love for him. If we don't know what the Bible says, how can we be sure we know what Jesus teaches? And if we don't know what he teaches, how can we obey him?


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
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
