A Time....

I received an e-mail after Denis' last service on Sunday evening. 'The newsletter is going to print -Would you be able to put something together?

I could not remember when I was last asked to write the bit for the front. So I thought I'd better have a look. I have kept almost everything I have written for the newsletter. The earliest I found was August 1992 and I commented on my first year as Associate



Minister. In particular thanking people for their support and prayers and encouragement and putting up with me learning 'on the job'. I really can't believe how time has passed.

When I listened to Denis' last sermon, it sounded very familiar. Having looked at the last contribution for the newsletter in January 2008 I realised why. It began '*There is a time for everything*, and a season for every activity under heaven: a time to be born and a time to die, a time to plant and a time to uproot, a time to kill and a time to heal, a time to tear down and a time to build.....

The passage ends with 'a time for war and a time for peace.'

There have been several interesting documentaries recently marking the 70th anniversary of the Battle of Britain. Some of the few who remain that were involved in the battle over Britain's skies. There is the realisation that there are now few people who remember the two great wars that killed so many people. Around 662,000 British soldiers were killed in the First World War and 140,000 were listed as missing, presumed dead. It is important that we take time to remember those, and not just in the past, who have made the ultimate sacrifice for human kind.

It was some months ago that I had the privilege of meeting Jack Otter. He was serving in Afghanistan in the 2nd Battalion The Rifles. His patrol entered an area littered with IED's. If I remember correctly, Jack and a colleague entered a house and there was a huge explosion. Jack's colleague was killed and Jack lost both legs and an arm.

In contrast I have been reading a book I bought Viv some time ago. It is called 'The Last Post'. The final word from our First World War Soldiers. Thoughts and memories of those who were in the trenches, Henry Allingham, Harry Patch and many others. The effects of war have not changed in nearly a hundred years.

Typing


Is anyone able to help Sylvia with some typing work?



Operation Christmas Child - Shoeboxes

Can you help?

The church is once again preparing to send out shoe boxes to Operation Christmas Child for our Christmas charity. This year we hope you will help us by supplying items to fill the shoe boxes which will be collected and sent to children across Africa, Eastern Europe and Central Asia.

If you can help this good cause please bring any items to the church by Sunday 14th November. Or you may like to fill a shoebox yourself and bring it to the church by 21st November.

The items required are:

TOYS bears, soft toys, tennis ball, finger puppet, jigsaw (small), yo-yo, building blocks, small musical instrument, trucks and cars for boys and dolls, necklaces and bags for girls.

Educational Supplies: felt pens, pens, pencils, pencil sharpeners, erasers, colouring books, notepads, picture or puzzle books, chalk, pencil cases, stickers etc.

Hygiene items: toothbrushes, toothpaste, hairbrush, comb, hair clips, bar of soap, flannel etc. No shower gel or liquids.

Clothing: only gloves, scarf, cap, hat, bangles and socks.

Sweets: with a sell-by date of at least March 2011 - no chocolate

Please Note: nothing which has sharp edges, mirrors, guns or soldiers, food other than sweets, books in English or medicines can be accepted.

We also like to include a card with a picture and a message on it and we also need to send $\pounds 2.50$ per shoebox to cover transportation etc. So any donations of money can be used for this purpose.

Finally, we will also require empty shoe boxes and wrapping paper to cover the boxes with so please bring those along before Sunday 14th November too. Many thanks

On the 14th the German Luftwaffe bombers virtually destroyed the city of Coventry, including the medieval cathedral. The following night the British bombed Hamburg. On the 16th, the Nazis sealed off the Warsaw Ghetto from the outside world – 400,000 Jews were trapped in 4 square kilometres. Hungary, Romania and Slovakia all joined the Axis Powers later that month. 70 years on, we remember with sorrow, respect and gratitude all those who died for the sake of freedom.
