

FROM OUR MINISTER - JUNE 2010

One of the terms we hear often in our modern lives is that we are considered to be a people who seek to be 'more spiritual.' For many, it is an imagined dreamlike quality – a mild anaesthetic to see you painlessly through the turmoil of an over filled life which seeks to balance work, family, leisure, home management, children's schooling and coping with aged parents. Others may see spirituality as a rare, spasmodic mystical experience; many 'celebrities' experience this with the help of mind-altering illegal substances. Some forms of spirituality rely on an ability to meditate in order to release the human potential bound up in our subconscious mind. Many in the church are afraid of a spirituality that is based in the 'gifts of the Holy Spirit' as laid out for example in 1 Corinthians chapter 12.

"Biblical spirituality is however concerned with bringing our body into an intimate relationship with the heart of God."1 It involves the concept of holiness that affects every facet of our living each day, rather than focussing on transient experiences. Developing spirituality requires discipline for without it we cannot live as disciples of Jesus. Meditation, scripture study, silence, solitude, frugality, fasting, contemplation [dwelling quietly in God's presence], intercession, submission, service, celebration and service are what it takes to live closer to Jesus. I know that it is hard to get that correct with the pressures in our modern lives.

St Paul enumerates the benefits

of this discipline: But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and selfcontrol. Against such things there is no law. [Galatians 5.22-231 These benefits aid us to reach a new vision of God. The Holy Spirit is the agent of the love of God that allows us to be led into these eternal truths. Finding these gifts is achieved in a community God chooses to call 'church' where love of ones neighbour is paramount and where we can find stillness and space to rest in the Lord.

In the words of a well-loved hymn; Bold I approach the eternal throne, we may feel as if we are about to arrive at a spiritual place. But this thinking is

flawed because before we can do that, we must have been broken and humbled by the experience of the Cross of Christ at Calvary. There may have to be a journey with Jesus that cries, Eloi, Eloi, lama sabachtani? [Mtt 27.46] which means, My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? My experience has been that in the seeking for a deeper, spiritual relationship with God, there comes a time when you seem to have lost your old life and where you have not graciously yet been moved into a closer spiritual place with God. It is lonely there!

As we journey together as church at Bush Hill Park URC, we have to become engaged to the task of making space to encounter God's glory in all we do. There is wisdom in the closing verses of the Book of Ecclesiastes 12.13-14: Now all has been heard; here is the conclusion of the matter: Fear God and keep his commandments, for this is the whole duty of man. ¹⁴ For God will bring every deed into judgment, including every hidden thing, whether it is good or evil.

This year funds are being used in Kenya in particular.


Thank you to everyone who delivered and collected envelopes on the street, to everyone who joined in with the beetle drive & to all who donated.



Amazing news! The new coalition Government have now published their agreed policy priorities and within the document is a commitment to "end the detention of children for immigration purposes". This is a huge step forward for the campaign and for every one who has helped demand this change. Thank you and well done!

This, of course, is not the end! We do not yet know the detail of their policy – how it will be implemented, what other proposals they may put forward, and crucially, how quickly they will stop locking up children in immigration detention centres.

In the coming days and weeks it will be vital that we hold the Government to its promise and demand that they make this change as soon as humanly possible. Please help maintain the pressure until we finally have an end to the immigration detention of children.


Yes before you ask, Mr Cutts was very competitive and was so serious about winning, that he was crawling over the floor and doing commando rolls (it had to be seen to be believed).
