



You may remember me saying that I had read a few of books on holiday this year, this was one of them. I bought this book for Viv some years ago, partly because I thought it would be a good read, and it is. Max Arthur captures the memories of the last few remaining survivors of the Great War. Some of the names are well known. Henry Allingham who served in the Royal Naval Air Service and Harry

Patch who served in the Duke of Corwall's Light Infantry. However, there are others whose names I did not know. Cecil Withers, Tom Kirk, Bert Clark, to name just a few. The last veterans living in the UK all died in 2009, Bill Stone, Henry Allingham and Harry Patch.

The book tells their stories in their own words. From growing up going to school, learning a trade or going to work. Going to war and returning home and their life after the war. Ordinary working people living ordinary lives. Their accounts of life during the war have mellowed with age. The suffering and the effects of the war that they recall have changed little in 90 years. Many of these men returned to responsible and rewarding professions, doctors, engineers draughtsmen and designers.

Some played an important role in the Second World War.

The books has accounts from 21 veteran's, many of them draw very similar conclusions. Harry Patch's account closes with these words. "Why should the British government call me up and take me out to a battlefield to shoot a man I never knew, whose language I couldn't speak...but still we send our young men and woman to Iraq.

As we approach Remembrance Day let us remember those



Prisons Week - 21st - 27th November

Here are some sobering statistics:

There are 84,522 people in our prisons throughout England and Wales. About half of them have a reading age of 11. Four-fifths lack basic numeracy skills. Within one year, 47 per cent of them will be reconvicted. The number of women in prison is currently 4,274. Two fifths of them have previously attempted suicide. The number of young adults (18 to 20) in prison is 9,775. Nationally, 160,000 children have one or both parents in prison.

Our prisons are full of some of the neediest people in the county. Their lives are in chaos. Their crimes have badly hurt their victims, their communities and also their own families – so many lives have been damaged. No wonder Christian prison ministry is so important! So what should our response to prisoners be as Christians? Why should we care? The Prison Christian Fellowship says that we should care "because Jesus did. Jesus calls us as Christians to love the unlovable. Everyone is loved by God and can come into a relationship with him. God never gives up on people so neither should we. Everyone is redeemable."

Prison Fellowship has 1,400 volunteers in the UK. Through them, there are now 120 prayer groups around the country, praying for specific prisons. They also run a scheme called Sycamore Tree - a Restorative Justice course based on the story of Zaccheus, where after a conversation with Jesus, he took responsibility for his crimes and then made amends to the community. This course allows offenders to hear from a surrogate victim who explains how the crime affected them.

For children whose parents are in prison, Prison Fellowship runs Angel Tree, a scheme which gives practical help to children by raising money and buying presents for them at Christmas. Last year Prison Fellowship gave almost 4000 presents. Finally, Prison Fellowship has a letter writing scheme, where volunteers build a relationship with prisoners, many of whom have no other contact with the outside world.

What you can do? Several things. You could help by joining a local Prayer Group for prisoners. Prayer really does change things! You could help raise money or wrap presents for Angel Tree. You could even consider visiting your local prison. Visit: www.prisonfellowship.org.uk for details.

God on your ceiling?

500 years ago this month, on the 1st November 1512, Michelangelo finished painting the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel – more than 5,000 square feet of it. If you have ever seen the Sistine Chapel, what overwhelms you is the sense of God inter-acting with mankind. The scenes are huge, full of colour and movement, and show the creation, Adam and Eve in the garden, and the great Flood. On one of the walls Michelangelo later added The Last Judgement.

The God of Christianity is not 'out there' and unreachable; he is very much involved with mankind. From the dawn of Creation to right this minute, he is there for us. Perhaps not many Christians paint their experiences of God on their ceilings, but many do keep spiritual journals, or highlight verses in their Bibles that have been the means of God speaking to them.

November is the month of remembering, of looking back and taking stock of our lives in the face of our own mortality. When you look at the bigger picture of your life, how have you encountered God? Is there a most memora-

ble experience that you might want to record - in prose, poetry, song – or even art? (Though perhaps not on your ceiling!)



Lord, prop us up!

There is a story of an old farmer who always prayed the same prayer at his church meeting. 'Lord, prop us up on our leanin' side'. After hearing this many times, his minister asked him one day quite what he meant.

The famer replied: "Well, it's like this... I've got an old barn out in one of my fields. It's been there a long time, and gone through a lot of storms. One day a few years ago I noticed that it was leaning to one side a bit. So I went and got some poles and propped it up on its leaning side, so it wouldn't fall. Then I got to thinking about how much I was like that old barn. I'd been around a long time, and seen plenty of storms in life. I was still standing, but I was also leaning a bit. So I decided to ask the Lord to prop me up, too, on my leaning side.

Our 'leaning side' is where we are weakest in ourselves. Sometimes we get to leaning toward anger, bitterness, bleakness in life. Then we too need to pray for God to prop us up, especially on that leaning side. He wants us to stand tall and free, in him.

Boys' Brigade News

The last six weeks have flown by, with our regular Monday nights running very smoothly. We have been very strict on lateness and also uniform which has had a great effect. All the boys now turn up in full uniform and they make an extra effort to be on time.

Our newest members, fresh up from Junior section, have had an action packed six weeks, covering first aid, fire safety, knots, cooking and night walks. They can look forward to another six weeks of fun and learning. After half term they are going to start work on making a magazine. Each of them will be responsible for a section in the mag.

The large group of Year 8 boys have spent the session since September learning a brass instrument. They are all doing really well and are practising hard. Mr Ward and Mr Cutts give them lessons each week. It is hoped they will have their first public performance at the November Church Parade.

Also another three boys come early on a Monday evening for additional brass instrument lessons with Mr Ward. That makes a total of nine lads all learning on a Monday.
