



Christmas was only a couple of weeks ago and I am already planning for Lent. Thank you for your support over Christmas. It started really well with the visit of Bush Hill Park primary school for their two nativity services. The church looked really good, having been decorated ready for Christmas. With many people participating, our services were well attended. However, my favourite is always the Christmas Eve communion. There is

something special about Christmas Eve and the anticipation of Christmas day.

As we look forward to Lent and Easter it is often a time when people 'give something up'. Lent is more than this. I have mentioned before that the 40 days, not including Sundays, was a period of preparation and study for those who would be baptised on Easter Day. The members of the church would also join in this preparation as a sign of unity. There are four aspects to lent.



The 'giving up' or more particular 'fasting' is only one. Preparation, Giving, and Prayer are the others.

We are suspending our Second Sunday Study to begin a home group meeting each Tuesday starting on Tuesday 19th February at 8pm and finishing on 27th March. Our study will begin with a short service for Ash Wednesday at 8pm on Wednesday 13th February and end with our Maundy Thursday Communion on Thursday 28th March.

The 40 days of Lent are a reminder of 40 the days Jesus spent in the wilderness.

Jesus Is Tested in the Wilderness

¹ Then Jesus was led by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. ² After fasting forty days and forty nights, he was hungry. ³ The tempter came to him and said, "If you are the Son of God, tell these stones to become bread." ⁴ Jesus answered, "It is written: 'Man shall not live on bread alone, but on every word that comes from the mouth of God.'"

May the blessing of God, who creates, redeems and sanctifies, be upon you and all you love and pray for this day, and forever more.

What is the point of temptation?

'Happy is the man who doesn't give in and do wrong when he is tempted, for afterwards he will get ... his reward....' James 1:12 TLB

Temptation becomes a stepping stone rather than a stumbling block when you realise that it's just as much an opportunity to do the right thing, as the wrong thing. Temptation just gives you the choice!

It's helpful to remember that God develops the fruit of the Spirit in us by allowing circumstances in which we're tempted – to express the exact opposite quality! For instance, he teaches us to love by bringing unlovely people into our lives. It takes no character to love people who are lovely and loving you. God teaches us joy in the midst of sorrow by causing us to turn to him for comfort and strength when all our other supports are gone.

He develops peace within us, not by making things go the way we planned, but by allowing times of chaos and confusion. Peace comes when we choose to trust God in situations where we're tempted to worry or be afraid. Likewise, patience is developed through circumstances in which we're forced to wait and are tempted to be angry or have a short fuse. You can't claim to be good if you've never been tempted to be bad; or be faithful if you've never had the opportunity to be unfaithful.

Integrity is built through defeating dishonesty; humility grows as you refuse to give place to pride; endurance develops as you reject the temptation to give up. The truth is that each time you defeat a temptation, you become more like Jesus.



Book Club

The Great Gatsby by F Scott Fitzgerald



This so called 'foremost pieces of American fiction of its time' was read in January and was certainly a change from other novels in the past year.


It is written in the eyes of Nick Carraway, a young man from Minnesota who moves to New York in the summer of 1922 to learn about the bond business. He rents a house in the West Egg district of Long Island, a wealthy but unfashionable area populated by the new rich, a group who have made their fortunes too recently to have established social connections and who are prone to garish displays of wealth.

Nick's next-door neighbour in West Egg is a mysterious man named Jay Gatsby, who lives in a gigantic Gothic mansion and throws extravagant parties every Saturday night.

It is slow; the characters are so unlike people we know today, or are they? Life changes through the decades by way of dress and life-style but do moral attitudes? At the end of the story Nick reflects that just as Gatsby's dream of

Daisy was corrupted by money and dishonesty, the American dream of happiness and individualism has disintegrated into the mere pursuit of wealth. Though Gatsby's power to transform his dreams into reality is what makes him "great," Nick reflects that the era of dreaming—both Gatsby's dream and the American dream—is over.

Watch for the film, it is out shortly. Next month we tackle a thriller set in Scotland – Stonemouth by Jain Banks.

Love is all you need... set your heart on secret good turns

Valentine's Day is coming. It's the traditional day for sending cards, chocolates and flowers to our sweethearts (real – and hoped for!). Traditionally, such tokens of affection are anonymous. Hand-writing is disguised, or a different post office is used.

Sending a message of love, unannounced, is a good principle for living – even if you don't happen to have a sweetheart. Simple acts of anonymous kindness, or kindness given in an understated way, can have a profound effect upon another person. Jesus approved of anonymous good works: 'When you give to the needy, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing' (Mt 6:3). The needy are not just the materially poor, but everyone who is in need of something, perhaps some kindness that only you can give them at that moment in time.



So this Valentine's Day, don't worry if you haven't got a current sweetheart of your own to love. Show your love, through an act of unannounced kindness, to someone else. Think of your neighbours, your friends, your church.... who would benefit from some simple compassion and support this month?
