

Harvest

I mentioned last month about writing the front page of the newsletter in France surrounded by farmland. By the time we had arrived, the wheat had been harvested and fields were full of straw drying in the sun. In the two weeks we were there most of the straw has been baled and in the barn. In fact we could hear them working into the night as we had some mornings with dew on the ground. The other two main crops that are

grown in the Charente, apart from grapes, are maze and sunflowers. Neither of these two had been harvested as many had been planted later than usual because of the bad weather. I don't know if vou watched the series on the harvest with Greg Wallace. I only saw some of it, but I was amazed by the technology involved in farming and the vast difference in choosing the right time to harvest the crops. It was also interesting to see how labour intensive farming was only a few years ago. Families would travel from farm to farm as the different crops were ready for harvest. The modern harvesters even drive themselves using satellite navigation without the need for someone telling you where to turn.

We know that Jesus told many stories about farming and fishing

and using the earth's resources. It is good for us to stop and remember and acknowledge where our food and resources come from. Working on the allotment is rewarding, but it is also hard manual work. I was not happy, when, having grown cabbages and sprouts from seed, popped over the allotment one evening to find the netting that was protecting them from the birds had come off and most of the young plants had been stripped of all their leaves.

Jesus also spoke about another harvest. A harvest of lives. Jesus went through all the towns and villages, teaching in their synagogues, proclaiming the good news of the kingdom and healing every disease and sickness. When he saw the crowds, he had compassion on them, because they

were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field." Matthew 9:35-38

We look around our community and see many people in need. Who is going to help them? We look around our church and there is much for us to do, but who is going to do it? The answer is in Jesus response to the disciples, prayer. Something we seem to find so difficult, to spend quality time together in prayer as a church. Our bible study and prayer group has the same few people every month. Even Sunday worship has seen a drop in regular worshippers.

There will always be something else to do, as many of us have busy lives and we do need some time for ourselves and our families. It is a question of priority and balance which is always difficult. There have been many times when church has come first. I am not saying this to boast, but to encourage. The time that I have given has nearly always been 'made up' with interest. I'm sure that when it hasn't, it is when I have done something with a bit of a grudge.

David Wilkerson was reflecting on the dilemma facing the early church. The church leaders were praying over the harvest in Antioch (Acts 13:2-6). David says, "The same is true today. We are to be about the work of praying for the harvest, just as those godly men in Antioch did. The fact is, while we're praying, the Holy Spirit is searching the earth, putting an urgency in the hearts of those who desire to be used of the Lord. He's touching people everywhere, setting them apart for

his service."

Collecting firewood

So the minister went back to his community and ordered them to collect every scrap of firewood they could find. Two weeks later and still concerned, the minister called the Bureau again. 'Are you absolutely sure that the winter is going to be very cold?' he asked.

'Absolutely,' the man replied. 'It's looking more and more like it is going to be one of the coldest winters ever.' 'How can you be so sure?' the minister asked. The sky didn't look any different to him.

The weatherman replied, 'Our satellites have reported that the Aboriginals in the north are collecting firewood like crazy, and that's always a sure sign.'







This was an interesting book which received a mixed reception, some found it distracting because it kept sweeping from one story line to another, spanning a period of 50 years.



16 Boys' Brigade News

We had our first meeting back on Monday the 9th September with the Anchor boys starting back on Friday 6th September. It was good to start back, with a fresh year planned and all the lads turned up eager and ready for the Badge class we have got planned for this term.

Our 2nd year boys are starting the off with some craft, making a scale models of WW2 Spit Fire plane. The plans are made from plastic parts that will be moulded and glued together to form the shell. The model will then be painted in authentic paints and should be an exact replica of the real thing (at a scale of 1:75)

Our Year 9 boys have been split into two groups. One group is starting on a physical badge class and will be learning Gymnastics. They will cover ground work, the parallel bars and the vaulting horse. One of our old Seniors (Charlie) has come back to help us out. Those of you who saw the awards night will know that he is probably the best person to help demonstrate anything that has gymnastics in it.

The other half of the Year 9 group have started doing cooking. Their first week saw them make calamari and melted mozzarella cheese as a starter. They will be doing a main course next week and a dessert the week after.

After 3 weeks, the two groups will swap and the badge classes will be repeated.

Our senior boys are now starting work on their Bronze D of E award. As part of this they will start to be taught in detail everything they need to know about expedition - the main focus will be on their map work and navigation skills (which they will need to learn if they are to undertake their bronze expedition in May!)

We have a 5-a-side football competition coming up in a few weeks' times, which will be the first football match since the end of the season. Let's hope the boys have not sat about playing computers to much over the summer!

One of the big changes this year is that Junior Section has now moved to a Monday night, from 6:15pm - 7:45pm. They started back on Monday 16th September, with almost a full turn out. With the help of Mr Hall, the new Officer in Charge is Mr Cutts. The first week ran very well and we are planning to carry out some recruitment campaigns over the next few weeks to boost numbers even more.

We will also be going back to Thorpe Park again this month for their 'Fright Nights' events. The park is open later (till it is very dark) and there are all sorts of wired goings on. There is a range of rides like colossus (the 10 looping rollercoaster) and Nemesis inferno (an inverted rollercoaster) and not forgetting Stealth, the rocket coaster that has been altered to go even faster, accelerating you from 0 - 80mph in under 2 seconds.
