2. Structure, Governance & Management

2.1 The Governing Documents

The activities of the Church are overseen by the Elders' Meeting of the Church in accordance with the provisions of The Structure of the United Reformed Church determined by the General Assembly of the United Reformed Church, and supplemented by the rules of the Church (dated 1994).

2.2 Trustees

The Church has two classes of trustees as follows:

2.2.1 Managing Trustees

The Managing Trustees of the Church are responsible for the day to day management of the Church's business in accordance with the Church's objects. The Managing Trustees are the Minister(s) and Elders (collectively known as the Elders) and are elected by the Church member's meeting.

- Elders are elected by the Church Meeting, normally in November, ordained to their office, and inducted to serve for a period of three years. An Elder may be elected to serve for further terms of three years. After nine years continuous service an Elder shall not be eligible for election until one year has elapsed.
- Minister(s) are appointed at Special Church Meetings and serve without fixed term. They can only be removed at Special Church Meetings.

The Elders meet approximately 11 times per annum to discuss a full range of matters relating to finance, fabric, general administration, the implementation of the church constitution, pastoral matters and responsibility for the keeping of the church membership roll.

None of the Church's officers receive remuneration from the church.

The induction process for any church member newly-appointed to the Elders comprises an initial meeting with the Ministers and receipt of copies of:

- the Church Constitution
- the most recent financial statements
- the Charity Commission's guidance 'The Essential Trustee'.

2.2.2 Holding Trustee

The holding trustee is responsible for holding the Church's land and buildings on trust for the benefit of the Church in accordance with the trusts applicable to URC properties.

2.3 Church Members

Church Membership is open to those who make a declaration of faith in accordance with the statement concerning the nature faith, and order of the United Reformed Church and section 21, Schedule A, of the Scheme of Union and have their membership application accepted by the Church Members' Meeting.

Church Members share in the responsibility for the finances, administration, maintenance and activities of the church and elect the Elders. Church Members meet at least twice per annum for business meetings, and receive reports from the Elders.

3. Objectives, Activities & Strategies

3.1 Objective

As a local congregation of the United Reformed Church, the Church seeks to advance the Christian religion through its activities and the facilities offered to the community by its building, and described more specifically in its mission statement as: Growing Christians through worship, fellowship and witness.

3.2 Activities

Bush Hill Park United Reformed Church is a vibrant urban multi-ethnic evangelical congregation with a membership of 53 plus 12 regular adherents. Sunday worship has average attendance of 45 including young people with up to 100 attending special services such as Brigade Enrolment and Christmas.

The Elders have given due regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit and, in particular, the specific guidance on charities for the advancement of religion. The Elders believe that the Church provides benefit to the public by:

- providing resources and facilities for public worship, pastoral care and spiritual, moral and intellectual development, both for the congregation and for anyone else who wishes to benefit from what the Church offers:
- promoting Christian values and service by members of the congregation to the community, for the benefit of individuals and society as a whole;
- providing facilities for local charities to promote their organisations;
- providing resources and facilities for use by the local community.

4. Achievements and Performance

Minister's Report

This past year has been one of consolidation following the sudden departure of our part-time stipendiary minister. We have maintained our calendar of Elder's meetings and have had Church meetings as required to keep members involved and informed and to seek approval and guidance on decisions taken by the Elders and me. We have been well supported in worship and have ensured that the sacraments have been administered if not by myself, by an appropriate person. The number of members and adherents attending worship regularly has increased. Our family parade service which includes our young people, has seen a significant increase in numbers. Pastoral care has been maintained by the Elders and the Minister. However, this has not been as effective when Elders and the Minister have full time work commitments.

Our premises continue to be well used for church activities and by the local community. We have strengthened our link with our local primary school. Unfortunately our ecumenical links have not continued following the demise of the Bush Hill Park Group of Churches Committee.

Elders have been involved in discussions with other United Reformed Churches in Enfield to begin the process of calling a stipendiary minister early in 2014 who will have oversight of other churches.

Secretary's Report

We met every Sunday morning at 10:30 for worship, and most second Sunday early evenings for Bible Study. Statistics are interesting in that although three people less in Membership this year our average at morning worship increased by four to forty-five. The Elders Meeting worked with four people and each of those was heavily engaged in other aspects of our church life. Attempts to find people to commit to Ordination as an Elder failed. This is perhaps typical of life at present when commitment to anything is so shunned by so many. Our membership covers a wide age range and there are those in the older bracket who were unable to attend worship this year; visits were made to them where possible.

Our non-stipendiary Minister, Revd Martin Legg, conducted thirty five services, including twenty five on Sunday mornings, with the others being taken by our own fellowship, visiting Ministers and lay preachers providing an interesting mix of ways to praise our Lord. Our Minister added to his work-load the special extra services of Easter and Christmas. This year again we welcomed the local Primary School for two nativity services these being very well attended by parents, carers and friends to make a full church both days.

Our continued concern is for the young people of our locality and we were delighted two families brought their children for infant baptism. We were pleased at increasing numbers of those attending Boys' Brigade Company section; although Girls' Brigade numbers fluctuated throughout the year. Parade Services are welcome once a month when numbers are boosted by parents and friends of the Brigade Companies; especially when the newly formed Brass Band plays. Our Sunday morning 'Bible Class' is open to both sexes over the age of eleven. It is well attended most weeks. There is a younger group called 'Sparklers'. We have some babies and toddlers who in the next year or so will be old enough to join the 'King's Club' (the overall title of the young people's work on a Sunday) at the moment they play with toys in the crèche area during worship.

This is a generous congregation which has been happy to support charities throughout the year, North London Hospice; Leprosy Mission; Christian Aid with regular sponsorship of two children one in Zambia and one in Bethlehem.

Our Interfaith links led us to welcoming Islamic friends to two services with a return visit by a few to The Baitul Futuh Mosque at Morden in Surrey.

Fabric Committee

We have had a very busy year keeping our building fit for purpose. Following our asbestos survey we ensured removal / making safe of asbestos within the church and connecting buildings. The high level windows on the west side of the church were replaced with modern ones (still retaining the lead panel look). Finally, new doors were installed in corridors to meet fire regulations, which also help to keep the heat in and stop cold draughts.

At the annual gas service one heater in the Church was condemned and another shown to be at the end of its working life.

We have started replacing our hall roof, as it was in a very poor condition and had several leaks. The hall is used widely by the church congregation and also the community, so it was important to have the tiles completely renewed. Our next focus will be to replace the hall heating, which is inefficient, and the wooden floor, which is damp and beyond economical repair and also look at the decoration of the hall.

When numbers of young people started to decline, we changed the time of the club, having a meal after church and then going into the craft activities and ending with a small act of worship, but numbers still did not pick up. We believe that if it were possible to run it as an after school club it would be more viable.

Baby & Toddlers

This Friday morning term-time group of parents and carers with children retained its numbers throughout the year – up to twenty children some weeks. The adults engaged in friendly chat over tea and coffee as the children played on or with the large numbers of toys available.

Boys Brigade

Our Boys Brigade Company has maintained its good membership throughout 2012. We have very healthy numbers across all 3 sections (Anchor Boys, Juniors and Company/Senior section). Our Anchor Boys meet every Friday and take part in a range of craft, games and Bible storeys. In March our Anchor section hosted an Enfield wide activity afternoon which was very well attended. They also entered the colouring competition.

Our Junior Section also meets every Friday and also has a full programme of activities. Additional competitions they have entered included the Skills Day. They also took part in the Activity Day, an afternoon of individual events. Next they went to the Hare and Hounds (cross country type competition) where the team won the event for the second year in succession. They also took a number of boys on a Battalion summer weekend camp at Felden Lodge. During the winter they followed the Junior section badge work, which is split into five activity groups, Body (fit for fun), Mind (think and do), Creativity (make and do), Community (me and my world) and Spirit (God and me).

The Company Section attracted 3 new members from advertising within the local library and meets on a Monday evening holding regular badge classes in a very wide range of activities including rocket making, cooking, bike maintenance, fire safety, first aid and golf club making. We also teach first aid on a regular basis. As well as the badge classes, Monday evenings also involves a uniform inspection (the boys and staff take the uniform aspect very seriously and it instils great pride and discipline into the boys), we do a drill session and also a large games session, before finishing the evening with a devotional period.

The Company also offers the D of E scheme to anyone of the correct age and currently has a number of boys enrolled on the Gold level of the award. In March 2012 we ran an expedition trip to Wales. On this trip the lads learnt about looking after themselves, as they have to cook for themselves and look after their own tents. They were also taught map work and navigation. We climbed Snowden on one day and spent another 2 days hill walking and exploring the great outdoors. The annual summer camp took place in August returning to the Isle of Wight. We took 23 boys away to live for a week under white canvas and had loads of fun. Luckily after the very wet months, their camp was very hot.

We try to encourage regular church attendance and this has been going very well, with the majority of members attending Bible Class most Sundays. Our monthly church parade usually has a good attendance from all members and is also attracting some parents as well. After church on most weeks, we hold an hour's pool / table tennis session in the hall, which has been a great success.

Girls Brigade

The year started very well having recruited more than 10 new girls into the Explorer section of the company. Unfortunately, a lot of them did not stay but the few that did have now been in the company for over a year.

In March, Ellie Wadden did her Young Leaders training and is now an Intermediate Young Leader. She will be doing her Advanced (third year) training in October 2013. The girls, who were promoted to Brigaders in May 2012, will be joining her in October to start their Foundation (first year) training. Our District Parade was moved to October, to allow the girls completing their Young Leaders Training to be assessed in time, and took place on 7th October 2012 at Trinity-at-Bowes in Palmers Green. We had a very good turn out with representation from all Companies. This was also the case in November when we took part in the Remembrance Parade Service in Enfield Town.

In May we had our annual display where the girls showed us what they had been doing during the year (Sept 2011 to May 2012). As part of their My Environment badge, the Seniors and Brigaders went over to Bush Hill Park to help with the Community Project there by picking up litter around the park.

The Juniors, Seniors and Brigaders went to Feldon Lodge for District Camp in June, which is held every two years. There, we meet with other Companies in our District and camp in tents for the weekend. This year was a particularly wet year and some of the girls woke up in puddles, but that is all part of the camping experience!

Our last Company Camp took place in August 2012 and we went to stay at Lynda's house in Aulnay, France, again. We did a number of activities, including devotions in the swimming pool, visiting the Monkey Sanctuary and making our own chocolates.

Lastly, in September 2012 we attended the Enfield Town show again and managed to recruit a few more girls into the company. And on the 14th October, the Girls and Officers of the Company, along with the Boys Brigade made their promises again at the Enrolment Parade.

5. Financial Review

5.1 Financial Activity and Financial Position

The Church is funded by the freewill offerings of members and others in attendance.

The Receipts & Payments Account and the Statement of Assets & Liabilities can be found on pages 11 and 12 respectively. The Church's net cash decreased by £5,661 during the year (2011 – increased by £3,345). The Statement of Assets & Liabilities shows total assets of £2,475,646 (2011: £2,329,248) and total liabilities of £34,080 (2011: £8,469). Thames North Synod have agreed a grant of £15,000 to be paid in 2013 and the balance of £17,000 will be covered by a loan.

Included in cash are amounts totalling £4,921 (2011: £2,015) which are restricted. These monies have either been raised for, and their use restricted to, specific purposes, or they comprise donations subject to donor imposed conditions.

5.2 Reserves Policy

The Elders have examined the requirements for free cash reserves, i.e. unrestricted cash funds. The Elders consider that, given the nature of the Church's work, free reserves should be equivalent to approximately 6 months' routine general fund expenditure, plus committed future expenditure on other projects, where funds permit. The Elders are of the opinion that this provides sufficient flexibility to cover temporary shortfalls in incoming resources and will allow the Church to cope and respond to unforeseen emergencies whilst specific action plans are implemented. At 31 December 2012 the Church had net free cash reserves of £19,622 (2011: £28,188).

The church currently invests spare funds in interest bearing bank accounts.

5.4 Grants Policy

The Church supports the work of Christian Aid, the Leprosy Mission and Action for Children with donations being sent directly to these charities. During 2012 the Church sponsored two children, one in Zambia through Beyond Ourselves and another at the National Society for the Visually Handicapped through Al-Shurooq School in Bethlehem. In addition the Church makes anonymous love gifts, at the discretion of the ministers to those in need within, and outside of, the Church fellowship. The communion fund is used for this purpose.

6. Plans for Future Periods

Recognising the importance of prayer and Bible study and acknowledging that these areas are often poorly attended new initiatives will be tried to encourage more people to take part in these activities.

A meeting for the older members of the Church is needed and it is hoped that this could be arranged on a midweek afternoon.

Fundraise to enable early repayment of loan required to complete our hall roof. Plus scope works and plan funding to enable our community floor and heating to be replaced by the end of 2015.

Run a Lent course as a supplement to Second Sunday Study which will hopefully lead to the setup of a new house group.

Improvements to sound and vision in Church and other meeting areas is needed to enhance worship and also enable both hirers and our Brigades to enjoy enhanced facilities in the areas they meet.

An "Open Church" event is planned for Pentecost 2013 where all organisation and regular hirers will be invited to share what they do with members of the Church and local community. It is hoped that a Pentecost Celebration service will conclude the weekend which will encourage those to have a firmed commitment in the Church and its activities.

Encourage commitment of both members and adherents in all activities of the Church. To encourage a formal commitment membership classes will be run after Easter with the aim of new members being received by the end of May.

The lack of a stipendiary minister is a concern and the Church will explore ways of working with other churches in the area if possible.

Our Boys Brigade Company hopes to continue with its high and regular attendance. It is hoped that in 2013 they will have more lads enrolled on their Duke of Edinburgh Gold award as well as 3 lads gaining their Queens badge. An expedition trip is planned for April 2013 plus a theme park trip, and summer camp. They are also planning a 5 day sailing trip on the Norfolk broads in May 2013.

Our Girls Brigade are planning a weekend in Paris, in April, which will be in place of the annual summer camp.

The Church is seeking to make further appointments of Elders.

7. Responsibilities of Trustees for the Financial Statements

The Elders are responsible for preparing the report and the receipts and payments account and the statement of assets and liabilities. The Elders are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Church. The Elders are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Church and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

BASIS OF INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S STATEMENT

My examination was carried out in accordance with General Directions given by the Charity Commissioners. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeking explanations from the Elders concerning any such matters.
