

I have been thinking recently about beginnings,

endings and more of the same. One of the obvious outcomes of last month's General Election is that there are new MPs, unemployed MPs and, for some government ministers, more of the same as they return to the same job as before but are expected to sum up new energy and new solutions for their next term in office (a German proverb comes to mind: 'a new broom sweeps clean, but an old broom knows how the dust lies!'). Although we all face changes in life, the sudden, public way in which it is applied to our political leaders must be a bruising experience for those not re-elected.

People who choose to move house, change jobs, get married or emigrate to another country usually have time to plan and prepare themselves for the change that is bound to take place, though others, like the people of Nepal, face change of cataclysmic proportions as earthquakes destroy at a stroke everything they could reasonably take for granted about their daily existence.

Most of us live between these two extremes: even if we have lived in the same house or neighbourhood all our lives, we recognise that the continuity of bricks and mortar and living at the same postal address does not shield us from change. Even within the familiarity of home

we face the constant flow of beginnings and endings. There is no such thing as 'no change'. The challenge is how to respond to it with arms folded or open, turning our back or facing it full on. For it is often at the crossing points of life when we feel most vulnerable that we may be receptive to the loving presence of God. While one of the hymns we sing in church claims that 'nothing changes here', it is a reference not to church, home or the world, but to the constancy of God helping us meet the changing realities of life head on and with hope rather than drawing the shutters and ignoring them.

Sometimes we are more aware than others that God has given


us a new opportunity and new gift to enrich our lives. As you prepare to welcome Henriette Wentink as your minister next month may you welcome her 'as from God' and welcome also the change that her presence will make in your existing church communities. Henriette will have much to learn about you in a short time. May you also be open to learn from her and trust her to lead you to new experiences of God.

Remember St Paul's words that "the one who calls you is faithful and he will do this" (i.e. keep your spirit, soul and body, sound – 1 Thessalonians 5.23-24) as you discover new expressions of faith and new opportunities for Christian service.


This was enjoyed although perhaps taking a while to get into. It created a

Wordsearch


Each June, the C of E holds its Petertide ordinations, to coincide with the feast day of the great apostle Peter, who was leading the Church at Pentecost. Simon was a married fisherman from Bethsaida, near the Sea of Galilee. His brother Andrew introduced him to Jesus. When Simon made his famous confession of faith, that Jesus was the Christ, Jesus gave him a new name – Cephas, or Peter, which means rock. The 'gates of hell' would never prevail against Jesus' Church, and He gave Peter the power of 'binding and loosing', and also the 'the keys of the kingdom of heaven'. Peter witnessed the Transfiguration, the raising of the daughter of Jairus, and Jesus praying in Gethsemane. Peter betrayed Jesus but after the Resurrection, Jesus entrusted him to feed both the lambs and the sheep of Christ's flock. Peter was the first apostle to work a miracle.
