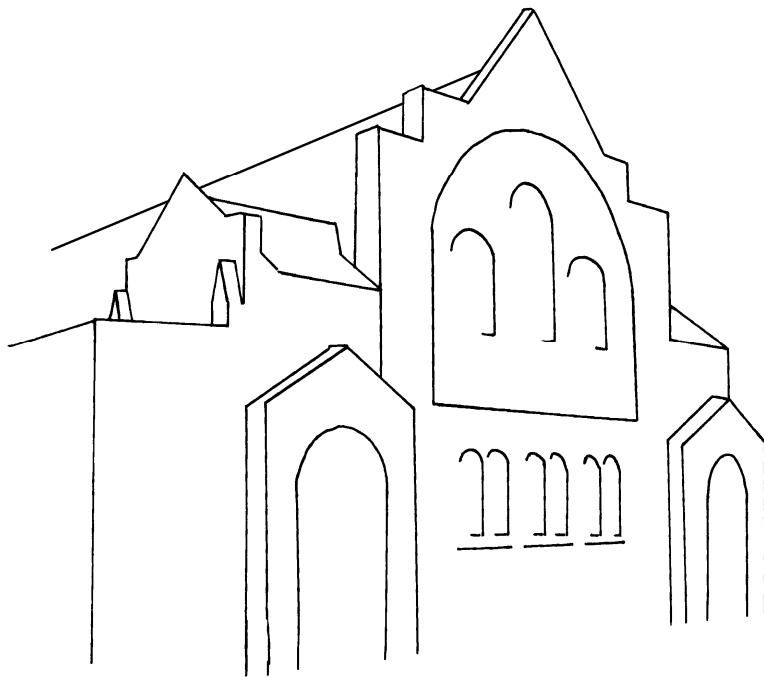

One of my favourite TV programs is Grand Designs. It really engages and feeds my creative side to watch people design and build their own homes. The most exciting episodes, I find, are those where the basic structure's of a derelict castle, cinema or lifeboat station are transformed into something incredibly beautiful to live in.

I have the dream that perhaps one day I will build my own grand design on small scale. I know the location and the building. But of course it may well stay a dream forever. For one thing is certain; projects like these are very costly. Often, the original budget spirals out of control and thousands of extra pounds need to be found to finish off the building.

In Luke 14:27-30, Jesus uses a building project as an illustration when he urges his followers to calculate the cost of discipleship beforehand. In much the same way as one would first sit down to look at the cost of building a tower to make sure it can be finished.

The thought has often struck me, in this last year of training, that weighing up the cost of making a

set of promises is exactly what I have been doing in recent years.

Before someone starts 'testing the call' to the ministry of Word and Sacrament, they normally read through the promises ministers make in the URC. Just as an initial assessment. Once enrolled in a theological college of the URC, these promises are explored more in-depth. Until, at the end of years of training, they will be spoken out at an ordination service. It can be a daunting prospect that brings on an acute sense of awe.

For these are not just any promises. They are promises made to God and the Church; to lead a holy life; to faithfully proclaim the gospel; to be truthful, loving, enabling and to set an example, even if persecution would come along.

Difficult stuff.  
Costly.  
Impossible...

...unless they are made by the grace of God – whose love for the world cost him everything when he gave his Son, so that we might live.

...unless they are made relying on the strength of Christ – who walked the way of the cross because of the joy set before him by his Father.

...unless they are made in the power of the Holy Spirit – who raised Jesus from the dead as the Son of God.

For it is only then, that I find my cost calculation turned upside down and inside out. It is only then, that I can give over my derelict structure to God, to be used in his grand design. And it is only then, that impossible promises become possible to make; because of the overwhelming measure of transforming grace, strength and power freely poured out by God.

The gospels have a number of stories about things lost and found. The lost sheep, the prodigal son, and one of my favourites - the lost coin. I wonder if Our Lord had someone in mind when He told that parable? Perhaps He had seen a lady searching high and low, turning the house upside down - could it have been His mother, Mary? Just a thought.

I am always losing things myself; usually essentials like glasses and keys and once my wife. We got separated from each other in a museum in Germany. I spoke to a warder who took me to a room where all the CCTV cameras were, and I was invited to select a wife. In the end, to get her back, I had to make an announcement over the tannoy.

I am also always finding things. Maybe it is because I look downwards all the time. I have found keys, a wallet, a suit jacket, bank cards and a bobble hat on a train. The suit jacket was on a train so I could easily tell the guard. The wallet was outside a station in the drop off zone and I just handed it in. Do you have a separate note of important telephone and other numbers if something is stolen? Do not put your address on your key tab.

The bobble hat is another story. It was left on a first class carriage and I could remember the man and where he was sitting. I gave a full description of the man, the seat and which train he was on to a lady at enquiries at Newcastle station. I do not think it was ever claimed. Between you and me, I suspect he has spent much of his life trying to get away from it.

## Red peppers, cucumbers and the flower garden... <sup>17</sup>

Wies Landheer, a qualified doctor and mission partner with CMS in Rwanda, reflects on what we can learn from our garden ...

When I came to Rwanda, I didn't plan to garden. I didn't have any green fingers! The land around my flat had some majestic trees and flowers, which indicated it had once been a nice garden. I decided to attempt to restore it.

The more time and thought I invested in this, the more I started to like gardening. Could it be that God can use a garden to teach us lessons about mission? Is it possible that as we try to grow cucumbers for the first time ever, that God is actually showing us how to build his kingdom?

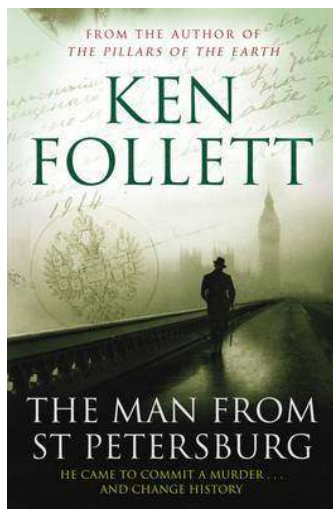
To one side stands a Jacaranda tree, likely planted by the first missionaries here. We enjoy its benefits. In the same way in my work, I build on the efforts of people who came here before me a century ago and planted the structures for the hospital and the Anglican Church. On one hand we are blessed that others have done the ground-breaking; on the other, sometimes a 'tree' is cut down and replaced with new seedlings. The labour ward here was built to accommodate one woman but now is overcrowded with four beds. So the hospital is preparing to build a new obstetrics and gynaecology block that will have its own operating theatre for emergencies.

My garden holds a collection of plants, mostly copied from other gardens near and far. I have learned that the closer we find the plant to 'copy' from, the bigger the chance that it will also grow well in our garden. In cross-cultural mission we can try to copy an idea or concept from 'home' into our new environment but it is often better to be led by local experience.

What happens with a seed after you have planted it is quite a mystery, mostly beyond your control. What we can do is little: watering, weeding and being patient. I find patience hard. Sometimes I cannot stop myself from digging up seeds to see if they have sprouted. Impatience can harm our harvest. My mother sent me seeds for red peppers. They bore a lot of large fruit, but it was all green. Convinced that they would never turn red, we picked and ate them. They tasted good. What a surprise it was when one day a pepper, still on the plant, showed some patches of red! I can tell you that they tasted even better.

Together we are gardeners in God's garden. Let us encourage each other to plant seeds of love, work hard and wait patiently as God performs his miracles.

## Book Club



### The Man from St. Petersburg

This is the tale of an anarchist assassin named Feliks who volunteers to go to Britain and assassinate a Russian prince just before World War I. The prince is on a diplomatic mission to convince Britain to support its efforts to acquire some territory that would give it access to the Mediterranean, since the Russians don't trust the Turks. In exchange for British support, Moscow will ally with London against the Central Powers in the war everyone—especially protagonist Lord Walden, who is the prince's diplomatic counterpart—knows is coming. Who is the mastermind behind this cigar smoke-filled backroom wheeling and dealing? Winston Churchill! Of course, there is an element of romance

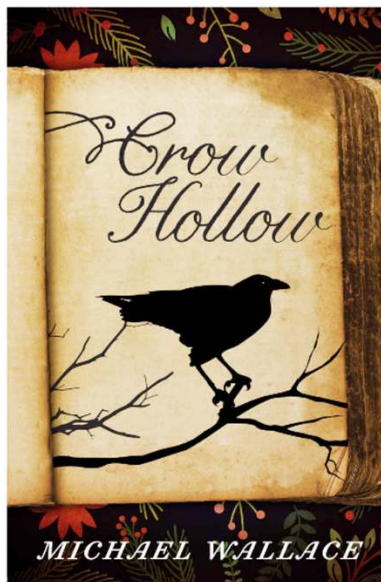
in the story too.

Lord Walden's wife daughter, Charlotte, has been dabbling in radical politics, going so far as to attend a suffragette rally. With the clock ticking and war on the horizon, a deal between the prince and Walden has to be reached before Feliks can kill him.

Perhaps not his best but very readable all the same and we did learn, or remind ourselves of pre-WW1 history. After all, careful study of history is the key to understanding the world around us and making good decisions. By understanding history, by knowing enough of it to create a believable fictional story, Ken Follett reminds us of some lessons for today, lessons those without any knowledge of history cannot possibly understand - so keep learning!

Next month on the 6th July we will have read 'Crow Hollow' set in and around Boston (USA) in the 1600s.

Sylvia for the Book Club 'girls'



This month we start a new series looking at the 'one anothers' in the New Testament. We begin with the challenge of loving one another, as John says, 'Dear friends, let us love one another, for love comes from God' (1 John 4:7). Authentic Christian community in our churches will be shaped by how much we love each other. What does John say about this?

Recognise that God first loved us:

'Love is when you go out to eat and give somebody most of your French fries without making them give you any of theirs.' (Chrissy, age 6). At heart, love is not just feelings but action! Although we are underserving, God demonstrated His love for us in the person of Jesus, by sending Him to die for us, 'This is love: not that we loved God, but that He loved us and sent His Son as an atoning sacrifice for our sins' (10). We can only show God's love to others if we have first-hand experience ourselves. It's the Holy Spirit who draws us into the loving embrace of the Father and Son, to enable us to experience the love between members of the Trinity.

Recognise the call to love one another:

How can we show people what God's love looks like? It will be seen and experienced in the life of the Christian community within our churches. 'No one has ever seen God; but if we love one another, God lives in us and His love is made complete in us' (12). Significantly John uses the same opening phrase in John 1:18 when referring to Jesus. The implication of his words is that if you want to know what God is like you have to look to Jesus and the Church!

As 'Church', we are called to demonstrate God's love in the way we behave together, by how we pray, support, encourage, forgive and welcome each other. How do we experience God's love in the groups and Sunday congregations that we belong to?

Colin Urquhart has talked about a roundabout which most churches reach at some point, when they ask, 'Where do we go from here?' There are various roads off the roundabout, marked 'evangelism', 'healing', 'social involvement' etc. They try the roads but find they all lead back to the roundabout. Finally, they notice a little dirt track marked 'love one another'. So often God has to bring us back to that track and tell us again, love one another!

believe his fellow disciples' news of the Resurrection. But 'doubt' did not mean that Thomas did not love Jesus! Only a few weeks before, Thomas had urged his fellow disciples to follow Jesus to see Lazarus in Bethany, despite danger from the Jews. "Let us also go, that we may die with him." (John 11:16) Instead, Jesus brought Lazarus back to life. Thomas was sometimes very confused about just where Jesus was headed. But in John 14:5 Jesus untangled his confused commitment: "I am going to my father", and "No one comes unto the Father but by me." Finally, after the Resurrection, Jesus appeared to Thomas, showing him the wounds of his crucifixion. Thomas was electrified, and his response immediate: "My Lord and my God" (John 20:26ff). Thus Doubting Thomas' honest doubts, turned to honest faith, have become a reassurance for thousands of people down the centuries.
