JustOne Arsenal supporter...



A few weeks ago I became an Arsenal supporter. It was not something I thought long and hard about; it just happened 'by default'. Consequently, one of my friends remarked scornfully

that this decision should not have been made so flippantly! To be honest, Arsenal is probably not looking for the kind of supporter I will be.

Football is not really my thing and I am not too much bothered about who will win the next game. And as for spreading Arsenal's fame; I simply wouldn't know what to tell people about them. But who knows, one day I may sit at a game that will change everything. I may even end up wearing the t-shirt and scarf, chanting the chants and buying a season ticket...

There are a whole bunch of people for whom being a Christian is like my state of being Arsenal supporter. One day it just happened that they became involved with church and throughout the years they stayed. But to say that they understand what it means to be part of that community; to explain to others why they are going to church, or what they believe, may be pushing things a bit. Let alone to openly wear the garb that comes with it.

And then there is a multitude of people who are like me the week before I set foot in the Emirates Stadium. Like I knew there were large football stadiums in which I had no interest, they believe there is a God and are happy for others to worship him.

The evangelist J. John from the Philo Trust (you can just 'Google' him) has a vision to get 35,000+ people to move into the next stage of their relationship with God. As I and some 400 other church leaders from across denominations heard his story unfold, it wasn't difficult to catch the vision. The focus is on the area of Greater London. The occasion is a big evangelism event. The date: Saturday 8th July 2017. The place: Emirates Stadium. It is a very short summary of something that began with five years of praying!

J. John is looking for partnering churches to help him make the JustOne Emirates event physically possible. The stadium is already booked. Much support has already been pledged. But the event can never substitute for the sharing of the Gospel that needs to happen in local churches. It is more like a big one-off gift to help the churches in Greater London. Therefore, and to show his commitment to the local scene, J. John has dedicated himself in the year leading up to 8th July 2017 to visit and preach at partnering churches and give local courses on evangelism.

It is an amazing opportunity for churches in Enfield to be invited to get involved in this. It could open up the way to a future we have been searching, hoping and praying for. I promise that you will hear more about it in upcoming church meetings. But in the meantime, can I ask you to start praying for this initiative; for all the practical matters, but even more so, at this stage for people and churches to catch this vision. I believe it is inspired by God's Holy Spirit.

Prisons Week Time to remember the people in our 150+ prisons

Because of increasing concern 40 years ago for the welfare of prisoners in England and Wales, chaplains and other Christians started Prisoners' Week, to encourage prayer throughout the Christian community for people in prison.

This year Prisons Week – as it has become – is being held from 15 to 21 November and is attracting wide support across denominations. The former Archbishop of Canterbury, Lord Williams, is strongly behind it, observing that "one of the most serious aspects of being in prison can be the sense of isolation and even abandonment; and one of the most effective witnesses that can be given to prisoners is the assurance that they are not forgotten".

About 85,000 people are in 150 or so prisons in the UK and Northern Ireland. The vast majority of them (over 80,000) are men. A surprising number of innocent children are affected: in 2009, for instance, some 200,000 children in England and Wales had a parent in prison.

There is one Anglican chaplain in each prison in England and Wales, plus about 100 others from different denominations. Perhaps surprisingly, there are many Muslim chaplains, with figures ranging from 80 full-time equivalent (official 2013 figure) up to 400-450 full and part time now (publicspirit.org.uk). The prison population is 12% Muslim.

Christians wanting to get involved in Prisons Week through letter-writing would do best to consult Prison Fellowship, which has 130 local prayer groups and 1500 volunteers. They are easily tracked down on the internet. You can keep abreast of events in Prisons Week itself on Twitter by following @PrisonsWeek.

To go one step further and become an official prison visitor, you should contact the National Association of Official Prison Visitors, who say "the cumulative effect of regular, friendly and non-judgmental contact can, and often does, make a positive difference".

Serve One Another

'O God, who art the author of peace and lover of concord...whose service is perfect freedom' (Collect for Peace, BCP).

Paul wrote to the Galatians: 'It is for freedom that Christ has set us free.' (Gal 5:1). To a church which consisted largely of slaves, he adds 'serve one another in love' (13). How does Paul encourage us to use our freedom to serve others?

Free to serve unselfishly All of us would prefer to be served by others, but Paul's challenge is 'do not use your freedom to indulge the flesh' (13). If you want to understand the word flesh, take off the h and read backwards ie self! If we are serving one another, it's not about my needs, but looking to the concerns of others. How available are we to serve others? Do we offer the excuse of being too busy or resent the time? When stepping out of our comfort zone, be prepared to risk rejection and misunderstanding!!

Free to serve lovingly: Luis Suárez was sent home from the 2014 World Cup for biting other players! Paul warns of the danger of Christians falling into the same trap: 'If you bite and devour each other, watch out or you will be destroyed by each other' (15). We are called to love others, rather than using or exploiting them for our own purposes.

Are we prepared to think about people's needs and put ourselves in their shoes? Paul tells us to 'live and be led by the Spirit' (16,18), for it's the Holy Spirit who will enable us to see others with the eyes of Jesus. 'A Christian is the most free lord of all, and subject to none; a Christian is the most dutiful servant of all, and subject to everyone' (Martin Luther).



Calling me home by Julie Kibler


What a difference a month and a book can make!

Talking Jesus

What do people outside the Church know about Jesus? Do they know someone who actively follows Jesus? Have they ever had a conversation about Jesus?

Knowing the answers to questions like these could really help Christians share the most amazing message: the love of God for all of us through Jesus.

So HOPE, the Church of England and the Evangelical Alliance, backed by Church leaders of all denominations, commissioned the Barna Group research company to ask people living in England. Here is what they said...

60% said they thought He was a real historical person 43% said they believed He rose from the dead 21% think He is God while 30% think He is spiritual leader or prophet

The Talking Jesus research – available at www.talkingjesus.org – shows that practising Christians are talking to people about Jesus: 66% have had a conversation with a non-Christian about Jesus in the past month. And Millennial Christians – 18-34-year-olds – are talking about Jesus the most often.

Most non-Christians (67%) say they know a practising Christian and that person is most likely to be a friend (40%) or family member (34%). They think of the Christians they know as 'friendly', 'caring' and 'good humoured' and more than half (58%) of those who know a Christian had had a conversation with them about their faith in Jesus.

And what do they think about Jesus after that conversation? 1 in 5 is open to knowing and experiencing more about him.

Roy Crowne, Executive Director of HOPE, said: "It is the first time that a study like this has been done. The results are a game-changer for churches wanting to share the good news of Jesus. Church leaders can often get discouraged by reports of declining numbers.

"But these results show that Christianity in Britain is diverse, full of life, and many people are passionate about sharing their faith. It will help us to equip Christians to be effective when they are talking about Jesus to those open to hearing more. This research is a first step: it changes everything."

Our Pilgrimage to The Holy Land

Five members of the High Cross Congregation were extremely privileged to be able to join a Pilgrimage to The Holy Land guided by our former minister, Rev David Hamblin.

To walk in Jesus' footsteps was an incredibly moving experience. We saw the hills and deserts that Jesus saw and visited the sites where significant events had occurred in His life. The Bible and its stories were vividly brought to life in a new way. It was a life-changing experience and it made us feel very spiritually inspired.

David's son, Martin, helped with the excellent organisation, gave great support and was our backmarker on all the visits. Bassam, an Arab Christian, was our guide. He had an incredible knowledge of the Bible and of the history of the area. His presence made us feel very safe in a troubled region.

The tour company, McCabe, financially supports Living Stones Projects and we toured a boys' orphanage and a Palestinian hospital both of which are helped by them.

Over the next few months we hope to share our thoughts about the places we visited. Next month we will tell you about the walk down the Mount of Olives which overlooks the east side of Jerusalem. It was here that Jesus spent time with His disciples before He was arrested.

After breakfast they packed up camp and set off with all their equipment on another six hours of walking and navigating.

They arrived at the end location, again on time and in very high spirits. The assessor was very impressed with them and he passed them all on their expedition element.

On Sunday 18th October, we held a very special Church service to celebrate our 125th Anniversary. Henriette took the service, with our

guess speaker Martin Poll adding to the service. Martin is an old boy of the Second Enfield and is now the domestic Chaplin to the Queen - with his actual title being 'The Reverend Canon Martin Poll'

The brass band played all the hymns and sounded fantastic. Mr Ward had worked tirelessly to get them together, arranged all the practises and sorted out all the music. We also invited loads of past members and it was great to see so many in attendance.

During the service Alan Rushbrook's time as Captain was acknowledged. The boys presented him with a card which everyone had signed and also a few gifts and a memory book. We also acknowledged Pat Cutts who has been our treasurer for many, many years and then we welcomed Bob Neate as our new treasurer.

After the service we had set up lots of memorabilia and old photos for everyone to look at. We had also set up a buffet and everyone tucked into a range of food. A massive cake was also brought out, which all the past captains helped to cut.


The whole day was fantastic and really enjoyed by all.
