#### **Festivals and Feasts**

Recently, someone commented to me that an ever increasing number of things need to be celebrated in society these days. The person in question pondered how the focus of special days now is different from how it was years ago. A little bit apologetic - as she felt it might have something to do with age - she suggested that it can take away the anticipation and joy of special celebrations in the Christian calendar. I fully agree!

Especially since churches seem to follow this trend in society. The number of 'special service' Sundays in a year now almost outweigh the 'normal' Sundays. There is the Harvest service, Remembrance Sunday, Brigades Enrolment service, Back to Church Sunday, Church anniversary, First Sunday of Advent, Toy service, Nativity service, Carol service and Christingle service all to fit in during the autumn. Followed in winter and spring by further anniversary services (of church buildings or church groups), thinking Sundays, vision Sundays, Sundays to renew promises, Sundays to remember commitments, Mothering Sunday, Christian Aid Sunday, Fathers day and so on. Until at last there is a break in the summer, when people are away on holiday.

There is of course a reason for so many special services. They help us remember God's faithfulness and celebrate the blessings we receive year upon year. But these are also services to which we can easily invite others who may not normally come to church. For them to join us in services that are designed to carry a simple message of God's love. Services that are theologically not too heavy. In the struggle to stay relevant and connected to the world and culture in which we are called to be church, being invitational and welcoming seems to make perfect sense.

The reality, however, is that very few new people ever do come to

As a minister, I see (and hear about) most strangers visiting church on random Sundays; driven by circumstances in their personal life; compelled by a lingering echo of Christendom. The only other times which almost always guarantee visitors through the door are Christmas day and Easter Sunday.

these services.

As churches, we run the risk to have too many feasts and festivals for visitors who never attend church. In the meantime, people who are there every week are suffering from 'festival fatigue'. It is a disease that strips people of the joy of worshipping God and leaves them to just go through some motions every week.

God says something about feasts and festivals in Amos 5 (verse 21 and further).

It seems that He is not a great fan of them either, if they take us away from what really matters!

# Is cinema the new church?

The film director Quentin Tarantino is famously quoted as saying that 'Cinema is the new church.' Certainly, films are the medium by which many people today have the opportunity to encounter the big spiritual themes of redemption and transformation. This is the case with *Beauty and the Beast*, the latest classic Disney film to benefit from a live action re-imagining.

This visually spectacular film retells the story of a prince (played by Dan Stevens) who becomes a beast, because of his self-obsession; and whose only hope is to learn to love and be loved, before the final judgement day. His redemption and transformation is brought





about through Belle (played by Emma Watson) who sees, within him, the person he could become. She helps him to turn away from his anger and pride. Belle is in the beast's castle through another story of redemption, when she willingly substitutes herself to save her imprisoned father, taking his life-sentence for him.

This film is a cinematic feast, with beautiful imagery and captivating songs. But it also provides an opportunity to reflect upon the spiritual themes of redemption and transformation, made possible through a sacrificial substitution.

At a time when many families would rather go to a cinema than be in a church perhaps, through appropriate conversations, we might help them to discover something of the big biblical story that is echoed in the stories on the screen.



#### **Guess Who's Calling**

Try locating the bible verses where people responded to a job invitation by saying:

I can't. I've just got married. I'm too young. I've got a speech impediment. Nobody will take any notice of me. I'm not qualified. There's a lion outside, I'll be killed. I'm not good enough.

Answers. (A) Luke, Chapter 14, verse 20. (B) Jeremiah 1.6. (C, D, E) Exodus 3.11, 4.1; 4.10. (F) Proverbs 22.13. (G) Isaiah 6. 5 & Luke 5.8. But the ultimate award for evasion goes to Jonah. He was called to be a missionary to foreigners whom he detested, so he took off in the opposite direction.

What does God's voice sound like? It sounds exactly like that of a friend or family member, who sees things in you that you can't see yourself. When they ask you if you have considered full-time teaching, or volunteering to be a Street Pastor, or becoming a Vicar, or applying for promotion, or anything else which might be God's will for you, that may be God's voice.

Often it will confirm a thought which you have had yourself. Don't say, "Oh no, I couldn't", because, as we've seen, that's what everyone says and it won't wash. At least we ought to try it out. St Paul wrote, "The one who calls you is faithful", because we won't be abandoned along the way.

7th May is Vocations Sunday in most churches. Here's how the Church of England explains vocation:

"The young are called; the elderly are called. There is no retirement from the Christian pilgrimage. ......Women are called and men are called.....God 'has no favourites' ....We are all called no matter what our occupations may be. There's no special status in the Kingdom for those in 'top jobs' or 'important responsibilities'"

#### **Thy Kingdom Come**

The Archbishops of Canterbury and York are calling Christians of every denomination to join in with Thy Kingdom Come, a prayer initiative between Ascension and Pentecost (25th May to 4th June), to pray for the nation to know Jesus Christ. It is a time to seek the empowering of the Holy Spirit, that we may be effective witnesses to Jesus Christ.

Praying for others to know Jesus is one of the most powerful things we can do. Persistent prayer for others brings transformation to their lives. As Paul writes: 'Devote yourselves to prayer, being watchful and thankful. And pray for us, too, that God may open a door for our message, so that we may proclaim the mystery of Christ, for which I am in chains. Pray that I may proclaim it clearly, as I should.' (Colossians 4: 2-4).

As Paul says, consistent praying for others involves discipline ('be devoted') and responding to what God is already doing in people's lives ('being watchful and thankful'). We can pray for 'open doors' to point people to Jesus and what He can mean in their lives. We all have opportunities to do this, as even Paul prayed as a prisoner in chains!!

The Archbishops are encouraging us to choose five people who we can pray for regularly. Why not ask God to guide you, as you settle on five names and commit to praying for them daily, perhaps by using the following prayer:

Loving Father, in the face of Jesus Christ your light and glory have blazed forth.

Send your Holy Spirit that I may share with my friends the life of your Son and your love for all.

Strengthen me as a witness to that love as I pledge to pray for them, for your name's sake.

#### How can we best help children with little hope?

There is an ongoing debate among many Christian relief workers as to whether impoverished and orphaned children in developing countries are best helped in their development by (a) staying with their grandparents or other relatives (all usually equally impoverished), (b) staying in purpose built Children's Homes looking after perhaps 40 to 60 children, or (c) being in smaller family-size units of say 10 or more children where there are at least two adult supervisors, perhaps a married couple, who can act as proxyparents. The UN Children's Fund (UNICEF) would say the ideal is (c).

The first of these, (a), is frequently of no advantage to the child because s/he becomes yet an extra mouth to be fed in a home often without adequate nourishment already.

The problem with (c) is finding couples willing to look after so many children and who also have adequate space for them to sleep and live. If there are, say, up to 20 children in such a home, this is a considerable expense in terms of food, clothing and accommodation. Many countries find they are unable to provide sufficient proxy-parents able and willing to take on this role, largely because of inadequate financial support structures.

In such circumstances (b) becomes an opportunity, although the funding issue is equally relevant. While children in such Homes may not get as much individual adult attention as in (a) or (c), they usually do get the opportunity to make friends who have gone through similar experiences of losing their parents. Where else would one hear such conversations as in a Home for orphaned children in one of the Southern World countries:

"How old were you when your mother died?" "Did she take long to die?" "Was she in much pain?" They then realise they are not the only ones to have experienced such traumatic events.

Part of our Christian calling is loving and helping others, whether these be children overseas in institutional homes or the needy youngsters in our own back streets. Rhena Taylor, founder of Outlook, once said to a couple, "When you are surrounded by an ocean of need, the Lord does not expect you to drain the ocean single-handedly but to take out your bucketful." The Lord smiles over every child loved and cared for — a very precious bucketful.

# **Boys' Brigade News**

Chessington Zoo has over 1,000 animals, including western lowland gorillas, sea lions, and Sumatran tigers. It is split up into several areas: Trail of the Kings, Creepy Caves, Sea Lion Bay, Children's Zoo, Amazu, Penguin Bay and the Wanyama Village & Reserve as well as a Sea Life Centre.

Chessington World of Adventures theme park consists of themed areas styled on a range of world cultures. It currently has 10 areas including the Adventure Point, Mystic East, Mexicana, Pirates Cove, Wild Woods, and Forbidden Kingdom. Land of the Dragons includes the intense spinning coaster Dragon's Fury. Another land is called Wild Asia. Major attractions include: Dragon Falls, Vampire, The Gruffalo River Ride Adventure, Rameses Revenge, Dragon's Fury, KOBRA and Scorpion Express.

I am sure they will really enjoy themselves and I will report back in the next newsletter.

On Monday 6th of May we will be taking the Junior & Company section boys to the battalion run football academy. There, they will have training by Enfield Rangers professional players and trainers. Following this there will be a football tournament.

On Monday 8th May we will be starting our summer session with a trip to Mega Bounce. Once again we will be jumping on 180



#### **King George VI**

The coronation of King George VI and Queen Elizabeth took place at Westminster Abbey 80 years ago this month, on 12th May 1937. It should have been for Edward, of course, but he abdicated. That occasion marked the BBC's first official TV outdoor broadcast. It was the first coronation to be filmed: the 40-strong camera crew inside the Abbey had to wear evening dress. As in the film The King's Speech, there was concern about the King's stutter, but he delivered his speech without a problem. He later wrote to the Archbishop: "I felt I was being helped all the time by Someone Else, as you said I would."






