2. Structure, Governance & Management

2.1 The Governing Documents

The activities of the Church are overseen by the Elders' Meeting of the Church in accordance with the provisions of The Structure of the United Reformed Church determined by the General Assembly of the United Reformed Church, and supplemented by the rules of the Church (dated 1994).

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2.2 Trustees

The Church has two classes of trustees as follows:

2.2.1 Managing Trustees

The Managing Trustees of the Church are responsible for the day to day management of the Church's business in accordance with the Church's objects. The Managing Trustees are the Minister(s) and Elders (collectively known as the Elders) and are elected by the Church member's meeting.

- Elders are elected by the Church Meeting, normally in November, ordained to their office, and inducted to serve for a period of three years. An Elder may be elected to serve for further terms of three years. After nine years continuous service an Elder shall not be eligible for election until one year has elapsed.
- Minister(s) are appointed at Special Church Meetings and serve without fixed term. They can only be removed at Special Church Meetings.

The Elders meet approximately 10 times per annum to discuss a full range of matters relating to finance, fabric, general administration, the implementation of the church constitution, pastoral matters and responsibility for the keeping of the church membership roll.

None of the Church's officers receive remuneration from the church.

The induction process for any church member newly-appointed to the Elders comprises an initial meeting with the Minister(s) and receipt of copies of:

- the Church Constitution
- the most recent financial statements
- the Charity Commission's guidance 'The Essential Trustee'.

2.2.2 Holding Trustee

The holding trustee is responsible for holding the Church's land and buildings on trust for the benefit of the Church in accordance with the trusts applicable to URC properties.

2.3 Church Members

Church Membership is open to those who make a declaration of faith in accordance with the statement concerning the nature faith, and order of the United Reformed Church and section 21, Schedule A, of the Scheme of Union and have their membership application accepted by the Church Members' Meeting.

Church Members share in the responsibility for the finances, administration, maintenance and activities of the church and elect the Elders. Church Members meet at least twice per annum for business meetings, and receive reports from the Elders.

3. Objectives, Activities & Strategies

3.1 Objective

As a local congregation of the United Reformed Church, the Church seeks to advance the Christian religion through its activities and the facilities offered to the community by its building, and described more specifically in its mission statement as: Growing Christians through worship, fellowship and witness.

3.2 Activities

Bush Hill Park United Reformed Church is an urban, multi-ethnic, community church, with a membership of 45 plus 4 regular adherents. Sunday worship has average attendance of 25 including young people with up to 80 attending special services such as Brigade Enrolment and Christmas.

The Elders have given due regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit. The Elders believe that the Church provides benefit to the public by:

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- providing resources and facilities for public worship, pastoral care and spiritual, moral and intellectual development, both for the congregation and for anyone else who wishes to benefit from what the Church offers;
- promoting Christian values and service by members of the congregation to the community, for the benefit of individuals and society as a whole;
- providing facilities for local charities to promote their organisations;
- providing resources and facilities for use by the local community.

During the year the Church continued to carry out the following activities in order to promote the Gospel in the local neighbourhood:

4. Achievements and Performance

Minister's Report

The year 2016 continued to be a time of discovering how three churches will share one minister and work together as a recently formed pastorate in Enfield North. In the Synodal movement of streamlining structures, the pastorate further became part of the Enfield and East Hertfordshire Local Area Group.

At Bush Hill Park conversations were initiated around shared expectations on the role of the minister. Communication proved to be complicated and a situation of conflict arose early on in the year. Mediation and support from within the wider URC was sought to assist exploring the issue.

During the summer months, ministerial duties at Bush Hill Park temporarily ceased in order to create time and space for further searching conversations between elders and minister. Much time and energy were given by those attending the meetings.

Two new elders were elected during the year. We are grateful that the call to become an elder was heard and responded to, especially as two serving elders came to the end of their term and were required to step down in December.

The pastorate's coordinating group made place for joint elders meetings. The elders of the three churches have found it helpful to meet together. The opportunity to share experiences and seek vision for the pastorate encourages mutual links.

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Secretary's Report

2016 has proved a challenging year for Bush Hill Park United Reformed Church. Numbers at worship have fallen over the year with an average of 34 people attending worship in the first six months of the year but this has fallen with an average of 22 attending worship in the second half of the year. No single cause for this drop in numbers has been identified but some factors include: an ageing congregation where some members are now too infirm to attend or have passed away, members moving away from the area for work or retirement. Two new people joined the eldership team. Two current elders ended their nine year term of active service and will take a non-serving role in 2017.

Baby & Toddlers

There are fewer babies than toddlers but then they grow up so quickly! Wednesdays the hall is full with eleven to fifteen carers and mothers; fathers; grandparents and perhaps up to twenty-five children. Friday mornings is unpredictable and currently we wait until they arrive to get out the toys. In some ways this works well as the toddlers up to four years old often enjoy the space of the hall to ride around on the trikes and on the cars. Interesting to see them stumbling the first part of the session and then strong and sturdy by end of term.

We purchased a tepee, a car carpet layout with extra vehicles, and a wooden railway set; having the delight of putting this into the church underneath the large Christmas tree. It was played with by the children who visited and only needed three replacement batteries over the month! The ball pit is out of action again as they keep damaging it and we cannot find a stronger version than Toys-R-Us, Argos or Ikea.

The Carers especially thank the church for the coffee machine and say ours is the best coffee of the groups they visit! Thank you Elders.

We donate £10 to the church every week, designating this for the hall refurbishment but were also able to donate other quite large sums during the year, again to this designation. It will be so good to see the hall more fit for purpose eventually

Boys Brigade

The Second Enfield Boys Brigade has had a very busy year. We run both Junior and Company Sections on a Monday evening and Anchor Boys on a Friday evening. Our numbers have remained consistent throughout the period January 2016 – December 2016, leaving us in a healthy situation.

During the year, all 3 sections had a range of trips on offer to them. The anchor boys and junior section visited LEGOLAND, as well as a London wide activity day. The junior section also took part in a weekend camp.

At company section level, we again ran two camping trips this year. The first was an Easter expedition to the Snowdonia national park. This was a 4 day trip, where the lads learnt about camp craft and cooking for themselves, as well as navigation skills using maps and compasses. As part of the Trip we climbed to the summit of Snowdon. We also took the lads to the national White Water Centre, for a morning of White Water Rafting.

The second was our week long Annual Summer Camp, held under white canvas on the Isle of Wight. The lads are entertained from dawn to dusk. Camp is definitely the highlight of the year for both staff and members.

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Throughout the year we run a brass band, which the lads are really keen on. Once in a while, the old boy's brass band meet up and plays with the current band. In May 2016 we held a 'raise the roof' music concert, which saw a range of performances, including the old and current brass band.

Every Thursday we run a circuit training session for those that want to get fit. The company took part in a wide range of competition throughout the year, and won the London wide PR games competition.

During 2016 activities and trips were arranged to Thorpe Park, Canoeing, Quasar, Bowling, Top golf, ice skating, sledging and archery, as well as a large range of badge classes, community projects and games. In May 2016 we ran a community fun day, which involved large inflatables, games in our hall and a wide range of craft, not to mention a large BBQ. This attracted over 70 young people and their families to us. In July 2016 we held our annual fundraising Jumble sale.

Every Sunday morning we run youth Bible study that is currently split into 2 age groups (covering from 5-18 years old).

In September 2016, we ran two D of E expedition practice walks over the course of a weekend, one for the bronze and one for the silver group. Then in October 2016, both groups had their expedition assessment. This was the final element for them, after spending 6 to 9 months doing voluntary work, learning a skill and physical elements. The bronze group did their assessment in the Chiltern Hills and the silver group did their assessment in mid Wales. Both groups passed.

In December 2016, we took to the streets of Bush Hill Park, where our brass band played traditional Christmas carols, and the remaining boys and staff collected donations from the community.

Girls Brigade

5. Financial Review

5.1 Financial Activity and Financial Position

The Church is funded by the freewill offerings of members and others in attendance and also by income generated by the letting of the church premises.

The Receipts and Payments Account and the Statement of Assets & Liabilities can be found on pages 12 and 13 respectively. The Church's net cash increased by £27,749 during the year (2015 – increased by £5,066). The Statement of Assets & Liabilities shows total assets of £351,986 (2015: £312,171) and total liabilities of £nill (2015: £24,655).

Included in cash are amounts totalling £23,441 (2015: £18,170) which are restricted. These monies have either been raised for, and their use restricted to, specific purposes, or they comprise donations subject to donor imposed conditions.

5.2 Reserves Policy

The Elders have examined the requirements for free cash reserves, i.e. unrestricted cash funds. The Elders consider that, given the nature of the Church's work, free reserves should be equivalent to approximately 6 months' routine general fund expenditure, plus committed future expenditure on other projects, where funds permit. The Elders are of the opinion that this provides sufficient flexibility to cover temporary shortfalls in incoming resources and will allow the Church to cope and respond to unforeseen emergencies whilst specific action plans are implemented. At 31 December 2016 the Church had net free cash reserves of £58,956 (2015: £36,478).

5.3 Investment Policy

The church currently invests spare funds in interest bearing bank accounts.

5.4 Grants Policy

The Church supports the work of Christian Aid, the Leprosy Mission, North Enfield Foodbank and All People All Places, with direct donations to these charities as follows:

- Leprosy Mission collection boxes £40.75
- Christian Aid Emergency Appeals £50.00
- North Enfield Foodbank 35.6KG of food as our Harvest Charity
- All People All Places £216.30 as our Christmas Charity

During 2016 the Church sponsored two children, one in Zambia through Beyond Ourselves and another at the National Society for the Visually Handicapped through Al-Shurooq School in Bethlehem. In addition the Church makes anonymous love gifts, at the discretion of the ministry team to those in need within, and outside of, the Church fellowship. The communion fund is used for this purpose.

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6. Plans for Future Periods

We are a Partner Church for the JustOne event planned for 8th July 2017 at the Emirates Stadium. As such we will be praying and fundraising for the event which is a vision of Canon J. John and the Philo Trust.

We hope to grow our numbers this year with several initiatives.

a) Relaunch of Sparklers (Sunday school) for young children.

- b) Attending and bringing "just one" person with us to the just one event in Emirates stadium in July 2017.
- c) Holding a fun day to promote our youth work (BB/GB) in the summer of 2017

We also hope to upgrade our facilities with a refurbishment of the hall area, we hope that this will help more people to use the premises and therefore become aware of our presence in their community.

We will continue to pray together and encourage others to join us as we pray for our church as well as local and wider issues.

We will hold a "building users" Christmas Carol service at Christmas where we hope a wider range of building users will enjoy attending church.

7. Responsibilities of Trustees for the Financial Statements

The Elders are responsible for preparing the report and the receipts and payments account and the statement of assets and liabilities. The Elders are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Church. The Elders are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Church and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.
