

June was a month with major events which affected many

people. The election and the upheaval that has brought, the terrorist attacks in Manchester and London and more recently the dreadful fire in Grenfell Tower, West London. June also had smaller but no less



impactful events, including the passing of Reg Sear who was part of our church for many years, we have an obituary to him on page seven.

It is how we react to these events which really matters, the Archbishops of Canterbury and York have said faith has a central role to play in politics: "Contemporary politics needs to reevaluate the importance of religious belief," they insist. "The new Parliament, if it is to take religious freedom seriously, must treat as an essential task the improvement of religious literacy." They add: "Political responses to the problems of religiouslymotivated violence and extremism, at home and overseas, must also recognise that solutions will not be found simply in further secularisation of the public realm."

July and August will, God willing, bring a more hopeful time. In our own church we have the Boys Brigade leaving for camp on Saturday 22nd July and we await news of the fun and frolics they get up to.

'Are we there yet?' This is a familiar cry from a child frustrated by a long journey, impatient to be at the destination. With the school holidays soon upon us, it's good to be reminded of Psalm 121. This is one of those psalms (Ps 120-134) used by the Jewish pilgrims journeying to Jerusalem for the great festivals.

There were real dangers for these Jewish pilgrims on their journey. They could slip on the road, there was the threat of wild animals and they had to suffer hot days and cold nights. On the Christian journey we are tempted by 'the world, the flesh and the devil', as well as dealing with those who mess up our lives and our questions about God's goodness or existence.

So where do we look for help? 'I lift up my eyes to the hills – where does my help come from?' (Psalm 121:1). Ironically, the Jews would look to the hills, where pagan worship was practiced. Even today, we can go to the wrong places for help e.g. horoscopes rather than the Scriptures; work colleagues or friends, rather than fellow Christians. We can also miss where to look for help: 'My help comes from the Lord, the Maker of heaven and earth' (2).

Like the Jewish pilgrims, we need to recognise that only God has the power to keep us on the road. Even when God seems silent in our suffering, He is 'watching over us' (5). On our journey He 'will keep

us from harm' (7) and 'watch over our coming and going' (8).

In this newsletter, with Pentecost only just past, the Rev Paul Hardingham considers how the Early Church grew and what that means for us, see page nine. The second Sunday in July is Sea Sunday and we have an article on page 17 about all that seafarers do for us.

Iraq's church leaders call for help

Iraq's three main church traditions have issued a joint statement calling for international action to safeguard the "rights of Christian communities in the historic Nineveh Plains", including the establishment of a "safe haven" for Christians in the region.

The joint statement by church leaders followed a proclamation by a prominent Iraqi Shia cleric that "Jihad should be implemented in regard to the Christians in order for them to convert to Islam. Either they will become Muslims or we must fight them, or they ought to pay jizya." Jizya is a tax paid to an Islamic government by non-Muslims as a sign of subjugation, according to classical Islam.

The threat of anti-Christian violence continuing, despite the progress made in defeating Islamic State, remains a real concern for Iraqi believers, reports the Barnabas Fund. An Iraqi MP has recently stated that around 1.5 million Iraqi Christians have fled the country since 2003.

Reginald J Sear

1921 - 2017

Reg was a boy in the Second Enfield Boys' Brigade Company starting in the Junior Section although it had another name then. A local lad, he lived with his two sisters in Bertram Road attending Bush Hill Park School.

An electrician by trade, he worked so tirelessly for the church and others using his DIY talents.

He and his wife Vera whom he married in 1947 became members of the church in 1966 when our Minister was Revd Ralph Eveleigh.

He became an elder in 1987 working with Rev David Hamblin, Rev Steve Faber, and Rev Martin Legg completing nine years in 1996; he took a break of one year and came back for 1998 and 1999.

During this time and later, with Terry Blowfield, Charlie Cox and others they saw to the maintenance of this aging building. He projects managed the conversion to the Upper Room, including the difficult task of sourcing the spiral staircase. When Steve suggested we turn part of the lounge area into facilities for the disabled, it was Reg who investigated the feasibility.

When the Men's Guild was started, it was Reg who was at the fore and there when they joined with the Men's group at the BHP Methodist church.

He took on the task of Registrar keeping the Membership list up-to-date with much more activity in those days!

With Vera involved with the Girls' Brigade it was Reg who undertook the job of their Treasurer with his usual meticulous ways.

With increasing frailty, especially of his eyesight they were at worship less and less but connexions continued.

Reg was a man of punctilious striving towards perfection certainly using his talents for his Lord. We have missed his presence for a while now but he is not forgotten by those who knew him.

HIDDEN FIGURES

Getting there together

Hidden Figures is the true story of how men and women, black and white, worked together to put a man in space. The film recounts the largely unknown contribution of three black women, whose gifts were crucial to the success of the space program. Kevin Costner describes it as 'a story of three women whose God-given abilities were allowed to flourish and make a difference'.

In particular, the film highlights the role of Katherine Johnson (played by Taraji P Henson), whose remarkable ability in mathematics is recognised by the project director Al Harrison



(played by Kevin Costner). Initially, Katherine was not welcomed into Al's team. Indeed, when she entered their room, one white male mathematician assumed that this black woman must be a cleaner, and rudely handed her a waste bin, complaining that she didn't empty it properly the previous night.



As well as being black, and a woman, Katherine was also a widow bringing up three young daughters. But she did not let any obstacle hold her back from utilising her prodigious ability at mathematics for the good of others. As Taraji Henson, who plays Katherine Johnson, says: 'if God has something for you, no-one can take it from you.'

Although set in the 1960s, a particular time of racial and sexual discrimination, this film has much to say to all of us today, about how we can work together to use the gifts that God has given to each of us, for the benefit of all people.

As the character Al Harrison says to his team: 'We all get there together or we don't get there at all.'

Acts for Everyone

With over 3000 people becoming Christians at Pentecost, the early Church was established in Jerusalem (Acts 2: 42-47). This new community is a yardstick for what church can be like in every age, including our own.

A learning community:

'They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching.' (42). The new Christians were eager to learn from the apostles about their new faith. They were a community that was always learning. Is this true for us: ourselves, in groups and as a church family?

A loving community:

They had 'everything in common' (44) and gave 'to anyone as he had need' (45). This was an expression of the 'fellowship' (42) they enjoyed with one another. This doesn't mean that normal Christian community has no private ownership, but the church is to offer a radically different community to the world around. It reflects the loving relationship found in God himself. Is this true of our church life?

A worshipping community:

'Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, praising God.' (46,47). They met both in the temple, and in homes to worship. It was a heartfelt response to all that Jesus had done in their lives. Is such worship the basis of the whole of their lives, not just what we do on Sunday?

A witnessing community:

This community shone out with God's love, resulting in them 'enjoying the favour of all the people.' (47). The impact of this resulted in 'the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved.' (47). Can we say this of our own church? 'we need to humble ourselves before His sovereign authority.. not to quench Him but to allow Him His freedom' (John Stott).







Boys' Brigade News

The summer session is zooming past so quickly, which means it will soon be camp. However there are still a few weeks to go. Before then, let me catch you all up on what has been taking place over the past few weeks.

On Saturday 10th June the entire company took part in the Battalion and North London athletics competition. We had a good turn out from all three sections. There were Anchor Boy races which consisted of shuttle runs, egg and spoon races to name a few. The Junior Section had trace events including 60 metre sprints, replays and also some field event, including tennis ball throwing and long jump.

The Company Section events were on a more traditional form and included 100m, 200m, 400m 800m & 1500m races. We were able to enter boys in every event. There were also field events which included long jump and high jump, discus, shot put and javelin. Again we were able to enter every event.

The Junior Section came first in North London and the Company section came 2nd. Well done to all the lads involved.

On Monday 12th June we took the Company Section boys to Broxbourne to try out Paddle boarding. Paddle boarding involves getting a rather large surf board shaped board that you stand up on - well it did take a while to be able to master balancing on it. Once you had mastered standing up, then you were taught how to fall off the board safely. Well most of us didn't mind throwing ourselves into the water, but Mr Ward seemed to remain on his board & dry! But not for long - as once all the kids had realised that he had not gone in, it was pointed out to the instructors. The instructors then made a bee line for him, and before you could shout his name again, he was in!!

Once we had mastered standing up on the boards, the fun really began. We played loads of games where we had to try and tip other people off their boards. We did gladiator challenges, where you have two people on one board and try to tip your opponent off the board.

It was just generally great fun. All the boys and staff loved it. The following week we took the boys to play Footgolf. It is basically like golf except you use a football and your feet.

The centre we visited was in Barnet and was a disused gold course that had been modified to become a foot golf course. This activity was something different and it was an enjoyable evening.

On the weekend of the 24th & 25th June, our Junior Section attended a London wide camp for all Junior Sections in London. This event was to mark 100 years of the Junior Section. There were non-stop activities for the boys all day and they got very excited about being able to sleep in a tent on Saturday night.

On Monday 3rd July we have one of the most exciting evenings of the year. It's the CAMP meeting. This is where the lads find out whose tents they are in and also what the theme for this year's camp is going to be. It's very exciting but top secret at the moment.

Coming up in the last few weeks before camp we will be doing a foot rally. Then we will be running an activity session over Whitewebbs, where the lads will be split into teams and have to travel to different locations and undertake a task. The tasks will be a skills challenge, a golf challenge, a team challenge and also bridge building task to get across the river.

The final week of the session will be on Monday 17th July, where we will be having our final game of Danish rounders over the park, followed by a Rushbrook BBQ extravaganza. You can expect loads of chilli and garlic! Mr Rushbrook does love a good BBQ.

With the summer session and activities drawn to a close there is only one thing left to do.... Attend CAMP!

That's right, on Thursday 20th July; we will be loading up the 3.5 tonne lorry with all the suitcases and equipment and the odd sofa or 3. Once again we will be travelling to the Isle of White for a week of joy and fun (and that's just the staff). Wordsearch

St. Swithun - saint for a rainy day

St. Swithun is the saint you can blame for rainy summers. It is said that if it rains on his special day, 15th July, it will then rain for 40 days after that. Swithun became Bishop of Winchester in 852, under King Ethelwulf of Wessex, in the days when Wessex was the most important kingdom of England. Swithun was famous for his charitable gifts and for his energy in getting churches built. When he was dying in 862, all he asked was that he be buried in the cemetery of the Old Minster, just outside the west door. But on 15th July 971, the monks decided to move Swithun into their newly built cathedral. And so his bones were dug up. The unusually heavy rain that day, and on the days following, was attributed to the power of St Swithun. Swithun was disturbed again in 1093, when he was moved into the new Winchester cathedral. So if it rains on 15th July....get out your umbrella!




