In the beginning...

At the start of his ministry Jesus came to be baptized by John the Baptist. We are informed by Luke's gospel that "the Holy Spirit descended upon him in bodily form like a dove. And a voice came from heaven, 'You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased.' " (Luke 3:22)



A significant moment.

I wonder what it meant to Jesus, and also what those who were watching, standing nearby, maybe waiting in the queue for their turn to be baptized, might have thought.

And the voice that came from heaven – did it sound like thunder or what? How many people heard what was said?

And if you had actually heard the words that were spoken, how would you have been inclined to respond?

Some of those who were there must have made a note of what happened, because otherwise we would not have a record of the events to hand now, but I am not convinced that too many

of them, at that stage, actually followed Jesus.

One of the reasons for my thinking that they didn't follow Jesus straight away is the fact that at the beginning of the next chapter in Luke's gospel we find Jesus heading off into the desert for forty days.

Thinking about this makes me wonder how often we miss significant moments that happen, that are happening around us?


Do we read the signs of the times, do we understand what is really going on, do we miss opportunities to respond to God's promptings because we are busy with our lives, and maybe not alert to God's voice in our midst?

As we enter the season of Lent this year, as we prepare for Easter, why not take a little more time each day to simply pray one of the following prayers:-

"Lord Jesus Christ,
Help me this day,
To hear Your voice,
To see where you are at work
And to join in with Your building
of the kingdom of God
Here and now. Amen."

Eco Church

After church meeting agreed that our church wants to become an "Eco Church" and get accredited as such by the charity A Rocha, Vikkie, Sue, Tony, Martin, Alison and I met on Sunday 27th January to go through their questionnaire to see if we're doing enough to get the bronze award and what we could do as a church to help the planet.

The survey has five sections and we need to meet enough criteria for bronze in each of the five sections to get the bronze award. We are doing quite well but could definitely do better. We reached silver in the Worship & Teaching section, bronze in Buildings and Land sections but did not get enough in either the Community & Global Engagement or Lifestyle sections to achieve bronze. This means we have work to do in those areas before we can apply for our bronze award.

One thing in particular we would like the church to get involved with and approve, is becoming a public recycling drop off point for biscuit, cracker and cake wrappers. Enfield council does not currently recycle

these wrappers but Terracycle does. They work with big brands (in this case, McVitie's®, Carr's®, Go Ahead® and Jacob's®) to enable the recycling of ALL brands of biscuit, cracker and cake wrappers. Once collected, the biscuit, cracker and cake wrappers are cleaned and melted into hard plastic that can be remolded to make new recycled products.



Hopefully we, as both the small Eco Church group and the church as a whole will improve the eco credentials of the church and we will get the bronze award in the next few months - watch this space for tips on easy changes to be more eco and what we hope to do as a church. Once we have got our bronze Eco Church award, the next step will be a more long term look to see what we can do to achieve the silver award!




Imago Dei: Poetry, Music, Art

Reduce, Reuse, Recycle

The first of the three R's is Reduce.

Reduce is first on the list because it is the best and most important way of minimising your impact on the earth's environment. It means that you try to reduce the amount of materials that you use and also the resources such as fuel and water that you use.

Here are some examples of ways that you can reduce:

- By not buying items that you do not need, for example by only replacing items when they can no longer be used or are beyond repair.
- If an item is damaged, try to repair the item rather than buying something new. Clothes and electronics are good examples of items which are often thrown out when they become damaged, yet they can often be repaired.
- By not buying and using single use items such as straws, plastic cups and drinks that are sold in plastic bottles which are used once then thrown away.
- You can also reduce your impact on the planet by refusing to buy items that have excessive packaging, for example chocolates that come in plastic boxes or items that are sold in an unnecessarily large container.
- If you need to print out a document, print on both sides of paper. If you have paper that you have printed on one side only, you could use the back to write on.
- By choosing to walk, cycle or take public transport rather than using a car.
- By hanging washing outside to dry rather than using a tumble dryer.

Opening Up to God

In a best-selling book, Generation X guru Douglas Coupland tracks a young man through a troubled era. He's remorseful over his mistakes. His marriage has stagnated. He's ensnared in a meaningless job. Instead of deep friendships, he endures what he calls "halfway relationships." He's worried that he doesn't feel life the way he used to. He peers into his future with uncertainty. The book's title: Life after God. But after 358 pages of aimlessness and frustration, this was his conclusion:

Now — here is my secret: I tell it to you with an openness of heart that I doubt I shall ever achieve again, so I pray that you are in a quiet room as you read these words. My secret is that I need God — that I am sick and can no longer make it alone. I need God to help me give, because I no longer seem to be capable of giving; to help me be kind, as I no longer seem capable of kindness; to help me love, as I seem beyond being able to love.

Like Coupland's character, maybe you have a secret, too. Perhaps your own circumstances are causing you to conclude that maybe — just maybe — you need God to breathe hope and life into your world. Or maybe you need him to knock the crust off a heart that's corroded with self-interest and cynicism. Or maybe you need him because... well, to be honest, you're not sure why. You just sense that there's got to be more to your existence than a job, three meals a day, and the gnawing feeling that something's missing.

So you've been casually checking out Christianity. Nothing too serious yet. You've leafed through a book or two. Questions are swirling through your mind. You'd like to get at the truth, but you're not sure how to — and you're a little afraid of what you might find. Or possibly you already know a lot about the idea of God, but you're realizing that you really don't know him. You've wrestled with the concept of a deity yet never embraced Jesus himself. You went to church as a youngster and even went through religion classes, but they seemed to have numbed you toward God more than sensitized you toward him. If someone asked, you'd say that you were a religious person, although the truth is this: a heartfelt, life-changing, soulsatisfying faith has always eluded you.

This prayer is for you. Seventeen words that can start a revolution. Pray them at your own risk: "God, open my eyes to who you really are, and then I'll open my life to you."






The Man I think I know by Mike Gayle

Round, like a circle in a spiral, like a wheel within a wheel...

Many years ago, at the Pleasure Beach at Blackpool, there was a certain 'ride' or amusement that was strictly for the physically fit. It consisted of a flat wooden disc about 20 feet in diameter and set at an angle of 45 degrees in the floor. When it began to rotate, the aim was to get to the centre where there was a pole. As the disc rotated faster and faster, everyone who failed to get to the pole got flung off. Nowadays there's probably a regulation banning it as far too dangerous! The principle of the game was a basic law of physics. When any wheel rotates, the outer rim moves fastest of all. Half way to the centre and you are moving a lot more slowly. And, at least theoretically, at the absolute centre will be a point which is totally still. That's why anyone who reached that pole could stand there quite comfortably.

We have just started the Church's season of Lent. It's generally thought of as being a time for giving up chocolate, wine, whatever. But it's really a time to remind us that in our own rapidly spinning world, God is the still centre.

At Christmas, we thanked God for entering the ever moving and changing life of the world. But one great characteristic of Jesus was His stillness. Busy, harassed, injured people found someone with neither clever chat nor idle gossip, neither vulgar boasting nor loud opinion. His life always seemed to rotate round a still central point, which gave Him His balance and authority.

"Be still then and know that I am God" wrote the Psalmist. Lent is a time for us to stop and remember that. Lent is a good time to be a little more silent than usual – quicker to listen and slower to speak. And the more silent spaces we give ourselves, the more we'll give that still, small Voice within.

God's stillness is still full of energy. That still centre of the spinning disc is also the point which drives the rest of the rotating circle. Equally, when we're in touch with that still centre, we'll be able to give strength and support to those who feel they're spinning at the edges.


Being still does mean that we need to take time to pause, to take stock, to take a critical look at our lives. That's what Lent is about. On the spinning discs of our own lives, we need to remember that there is a still centre, calm and yet full of energy – which is where God is.

Update on Elijah, our sponsored child in Zambia

Elijah lives with four other children and three adults in his home. He is cared for by his mother, Peggy Mambwe. At home Elijah is responsible for sweeping, washing dishes and fetching water. He enjoys playing with friends during his free time. Apart from the staple diet of nshima (maize), Elijah enjoys eating vegetable pie and rice. Elijah visited the local clinic this last year with chest pains but has recovered now.

Elijah is in Grade 6 at Greater Joy Community School. His favourite subject is technology and one day he would like to be a pilot. He enjoys learning at school. Elijah's favourite moment from the last school year was celebrating Teachers' Day.

Greater Joy School is led by Maureen Nakaponda who is the Head Teacher and works closely with Ospeck and Angelina Sichilongo, the Directors of the school. The school has a dedicated team of staff that enjoy making learning interactive and are keen to ensure they are using the up to date teaching practices in Zambia.

Each school day Elijah receives lunch and enjoys breaktimes outside, which often include games of football. If any children are unwell, a staff member, together with the child's carer, will take them to a local clinic where they will be given treatment where necessary.

Over the past year a new toilet block has begun to be built. The foundations have been dug and the walls are up. It has been exciting to see the church and the community come together to build this toilet block.

The exam results at Greater Joy Community School continue to surpass that of local government schools. The teachers and pupils also enjoy days such as Career's Day and Chetenge Day where students have the opportunity to come to school dressed up and participate in a whole school assembly.

Thank you for supporting the children and staff at Greater Joy Community School.

25 years of ordaining women

25 years ago, on 12th March 1994, the first 32 women priests in the Church of England were ordained. It happened in Bristol Cathedral, and Bishop Barry Rogerson ordained them in alphabetical order; so Angela Berners-Wilson was considered the very first woman to be ordained. She is now chaplain at the University of Bath and prebendary at Wells Cathedral. The youngest was Karen MacKinnon, now spiritual care manager at Southampton Hospital. Ten years later, one in five priests was a woman. Of the 542 candidates entering training in the Church of England this year, more than half (274) are women, which is 19 per cent more than last year.
