Waiting.

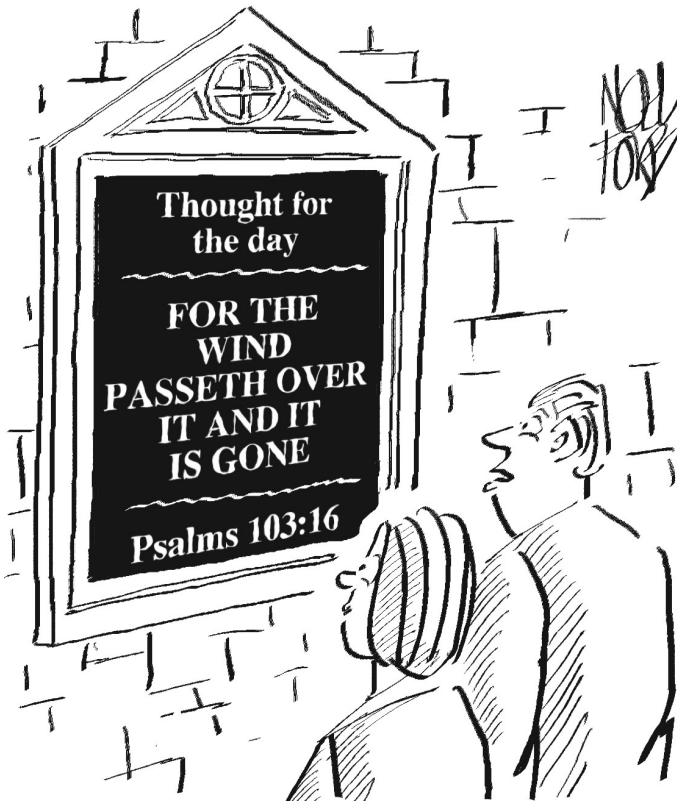

Enfield Homeless Winter Night Shelter

As you know, Lancaster Road URC was again this year one of the venues for the Enfield Homeless Overnight Respite Service, formerly known as the Winter Night Shelter. This ran for 14 weeks from the 3rd January to 9th April in seven local churches of various denominations, one church for each night of the week, under the umbrella of the Christian Charity 'All People All Places'. The aim was to provide food, shelter, warmth and friendship overnight for up to 12 guests with low support needs who had been referred to the charity by doctors, social workers or other professionals.

We had 64 volunteers from various churches and denominations as well as from the community, working together to do a variety of jobs.

When the guests arrived they were given a cup of tea or coffee and then they could chat, wash or just relax until dinner was ready. After dinner we showed a film on the screen in the church.

The project relied on donations of money from individuals or groups, so thank you to anyone who contributed to this, and also to everyone who supported the quiz evening which raised over £1,000. We also had donations every week of bacon for breakfast from Smiths the butchers, and baguettes and cakes from Greggs the bakers which enabled us to offer lunches to the guests which they could take away with them. A hairdresser came along to cut the guests hair, and a local dentist donated toothbrushes and toothpaste. So this really was a community event.

As mostly the same guests came each week, they got to know each other and started to relax with us. Chatting to them brought home to us how easy it is to become homeless. They were very appreciative of our efforts and extremely grateful for everything we did for them. We had 26 guests during the time the shelter ran. As it drew to a close, 'All People All Places' had found accommodation for most of the guests, which is their aim, and the others were in the process of meeting with various agencies towards that. APAP will continue to support some guests.

All the volunteers found being part of the Overnight Respite a very worthwhile and rewarding experience. While the problem of homelessness exists, we hope and pray that we will be able to continue to show the love of Jesus in our community in this way next year.

Green Tip:

Plastic bags, including bread bags, frozen food bags and other plastic which 'stretches' when pulled (including bubble wrap) can be recycled by taking back to the bins provided in many major supermarkets (Sainsbury's and Morrisons locally).

- All items should be clean and free of food
- Tear off sticky labels where possible
- As a general rule, if you can stretch the film then it can be recycled
- Compostable and biodegradable bags are not designed to be recycled and if they enter the recycling system can potentially cause quality issues in the recycled material.

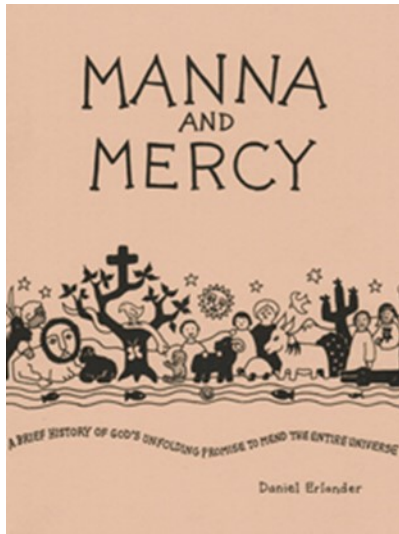
Foster Care Fortnight 13th to 26th May

The need is huge: thousands of new foster families are needed every year to care for children in need. These children range from being older children, sibling groups, disabled children and even unaccompanied asylum-seeking children.

Do you have what it takes to be a foster carer? As one experienced fosterer says: "It's not about age, marital status, sexuality, experience, cultural or religious beliefs and practices; it's about wanting and being able to respond to a child and help them develop and thrive."

Time and energy are the greatest commitments, from the moment you first make your application. One foster carer says that what makes it all worthwhile for her is "the quiet moments when a child has been out and tells you they are glad to be home again, or in watching a child who has never bathed before play in a bath of bubbles. Their giggles and happiness are a gift that's priceless."

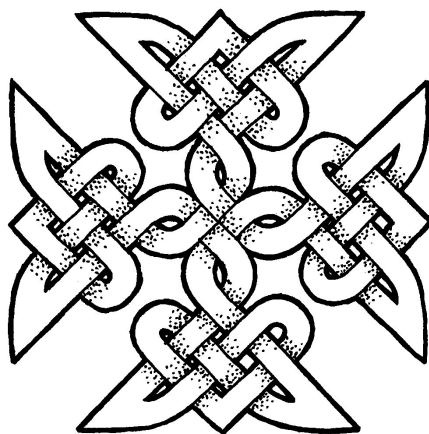

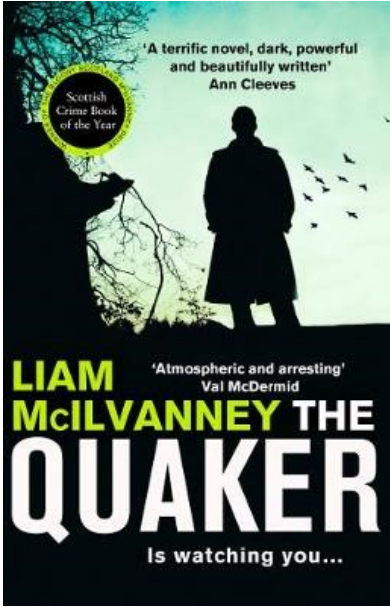

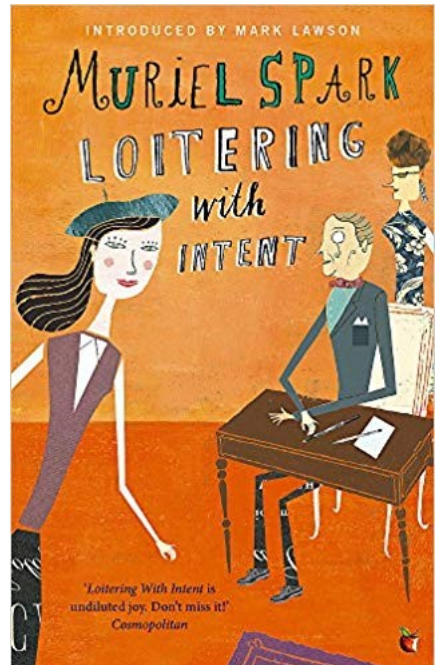
The Quaker by Liam McIlvanney

Update from Beyond Ourselves, with whom we sponsor Elijah

We are thrilled to be celebrating our **10 year anniversary** this year. It really is incredible to take a moment and be thankful for all that has

been achieved since we officially started partnering with schools in Zambia 10 years ago. Over that time, together we have:

- Enabled **over 8,000** children to have access to quality education
- Partnered with over **100 students** in the past five years to receive our High School Bursaries
- Seen **over 35** teachers advance in their professional qualification
- Celebrated the Grade 7 pass levels **increasing year on year**, and for the last five years they have remained significantly higher than the national average
- Witnessed **significant improvements** in both physical growth and health

We have seen each of the schools we are partnered with demonstrate exponential growth. From schools where multiple year groups all learn in one room, taught by volunteers who, on the whole, have no more teaching experience than having been taught themselves ; to becoming schools that have been commended by the District Education Board as “excellent examples of practice for other Community Schools on the Copperbelt”.

Across the board, there has been evidence of growth, change, development and transformation - all we ever hoped for. There is much to celebrate from the past 10 years!



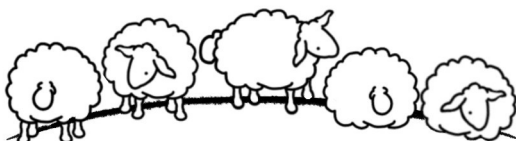

Christian Aid Week (12 – 18 May)

‘All mums should live’

Sierra Leone is the world's most dangerous place to become a mum. Every day 10 women die from giving birth. In Sawula district, the community struggle with a clinic which has no electricity and only two delivery beds.

Jebbeh is heavily pregnant but as her baby grows, it's not joy that fills her heart, but fear. When Jebbeh's sister Fatmata went in to labour, there were so few ambulances that Fatmata had no choice but to

walk for three hours under the baking sun, to the nearest hospital. The journey was long and with every step Fatmata struggled to keep walking.



Jebbeh told us: ‘My sister was crying out with hunger. She died on the side of the road. She never gave birth.’

This Christian Aid Week, together, we can make childbirth safe for mums and babies. Through our gifts and prayers, we can help give the world's poorest mums a chance to live.

This Christian Aid Week, 12-18 May, our church will hold a collection at the service on 12th May. If we raise £300, it could help provide a new delivery bed so more mums like Jebbeh can deliver their babies safely.

The Beatitudes: ‘Blessed are those who mourn’

The Beatitudes, at the beginning of the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5:1-12), present the values of the kingdom of God. In ‘Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted’ (5:4), Jesus appears to be saying ‘Happy are the unhappy’!

It’s not wrong for Christians to be sad or grieve, as we can still experience God’s blessing (‘blessed’). Jesus promises God’s comfort for our loss, mourning, pain and hurt. This is the work of the Holy Spirit into our lives. He is described as the ‘Comforter’ (John 14:16) i.e. ‘the one who comes alongside us to help’ (lit). He assures us of Jesus’ presence to share our sadness, make us aware of His love and strengthen us in our sorrows. Jesus has been in this place Himself, when He shed tears at the tomb of His close friend Lazarus (John 11:35).

There is also a godly grief which the Spirit brings into our lives, as we reflect on our messy lives. Peter wept bitterly after denying that he knew Jesus (Matthew 26:75). He makes us aware of our spiritual poverty, including our failures and shortcomings when it comes to loving and serving God. The Holy Spirit is also alongside to assure us of God’s forgiveness and cleansing as God’s children (Romans 8:16).

The Spirit also helps us to share the Father’s broken heart for our suffering world and for the communities of which we are part. Jesus Himself wept over Jerusalem, because its inhabitants failed to see what was happening in their midst (Luke 19:41).

We can live under God’s blessing in sadness, as He is able to turn our tears to joy, even though our comfort will only truly be complete in heaven. ‘God comforts the disturbed and disturbs the comfortable.’

Boys' Brigade News

April has been quite an eventful month for the Boys Brigade in the lead up to our awards ceremony on the 17th of May. In our weekly meetings the boys have been getting on with their bird box projects. It's been an eventful few woodworking sessions with some highlights being Taejah trying to screw a piece of wood to the air and Butcher having enough of the faffing that he ended up bringing his own drill to speed things up. All the boys have had a lot of fun in this project and hopefully all the birds around Bush Hill Park will now have somewhere (moderately) warm to call home.

The big event of this month has been our long awaited Easter Expedition. On Friday the 5th, five boys and four staff members set out for the chilly hills of the Peak District. The boys were off to learn the skills they would need for DofE, and the staff were there to help them learn how tough it can be on expedition. Mr Caddies in particular was teaching some of the boys (but mostly the members of staff) about sleep deprivation with his nightly snoring sessions, like someone trying to chainsaw a duvet in half. The boys, for their parts, really proved themselves over the weekend, with no big falling outs or arguments, and (almost) edible cooking. In the words of Mr Butcher "when it's all burnt, it all tastes the same". Even young Mr Taejah Daley managed to come out of his shell a bit, exploring a whole new range of facial expressions and sentences lasting more than four words. The weekend wasn't without a lot of effort though with over 20km walks on both the Saturday and Sunday (ignoring the height climbed), it's fair to say that everyone pulled their

weight over the weekend approaching every new challenge with an keen attitude. We were also blessed by great weather over the weekend, with all four days being warm (maybe not so much in the mornings) and rain free.

On the Monday morning the boys were treated to a trip to the local activity tent to take part in some gill scrambling. If you want to know what gill scrambling is imagine walking up stream in a slippery and wet river with two buckets of freezing water on your feet, every now and then traversing waterfalls and jumping in plunge pools. Mr Caddies felt it would be best if he supervised from the surprisingly dry and warm river bank, it was interesting how many boys were willing to give him a hug afterwards. Once your feet warmed up a bit it did start to become very enjoyable, especially the last climb up a waterfall on ropes. Once back in the minibus and dry we drove to a clearing near the road and had a barbeque lunch to finish the weekend off and head home. We managed to get all the way back to St. Albans before the minibus broke down!

Boys Brigade is currently on break over the Easter Holidays and after all the effort boys and staff have put in over these past few months, it is a much needed and well deserved one at that.
