

It's a mystery – how do we respond?

Pentecost was when the church began.

There was a sound from heaven like the rush of a violent wind which filled the whole house, and tongues, as of fire, appeared among them and rested on them.

Luke records that "all of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability." (Acts 2:4)

Something happened that day. We can't escape the fact. The disciples lives were changed... and many people in churches all over the world have wondered and asked questions about what happened that day down through the centuries. Some have pleaded that God would send the Holy Spirit again in the same way. Others have wanted to shy away from whatever it was that happened for fear of one kind or another.

But I don't think anyone can deny that something happened that day, something that changed the disciples in a powerful way, something that gave them the courage to preach the message of the good news about Jesus Christ in a new, powerful and vibrant way.

A few years later the apostle Paul arrived at Ephesus and found a group of believers. The story, re-told by Luke in Acts 19, is one that continues to challenge the 21st century church.

Paul notices that these believers seem to be missing something, so he asks them a simple question:-

"Did you receive the Holy Spirit when you became believers?"

We're not quite sure what it was that caused Paul to ask this question, or what exactly seemed to be absent from these disciples, but it is something we were reminded of recently when reading "Unleashed" by Gavin and Anne Calver, who write: "What we do not see here in Acts is a church operating out of duty, but out of joy. They are powerfully moved by the love of God in their hearts to share with their brothers and sisters. There is an overflow of generosity, of

kindness, and selflessness that spills forth in the early church." (p57)

Might it be the joy that those disciples at Ephesus were missing – and is that something that in our own worship as a church is missing oftentimes today?

After Paul baptises these believers he lays his hands on them and "the Holy Spirit came upon them, and they spoke in tongues and prophesied".

Is it the gifts of the Holy Spirit that we are missing in our churches today, gifts that according to 1 Corinthians 12 vary, but which "God.. activates.. in everyone.. for the common good" (1 Corinthians 12:4 – 7)

Do we realise and recognise that it is God's intention that we all have something to offer to build up the church of God, the body of Christ – each of us has a part to play, and the current situation we are facing as a community dealing with coronavirus means that we need to think more about our response. Can we help by calling another member of

the church and having a chat with them? Can we help by praying for another person in need? Is God speaking to us about a different way we could respond? Do we need to ask God to fill us with the Holy Spirit, or give us the joy that is promised to us?

Graham Tomlin, in his book "The Provocative Church" writes about our calling as Christians: "Christians are not meant just to try to do good, be nice and help the world work a little bit better. They are instead to act as signposts to another order, another way of life, another kingdom, which can be glimpsed in this world, but has not yet arrived completely." (p22)

We are called together to be the light of Christ to the world around us.

Can we pray that we might see how God might want to do that through us, as individuals, and as a church, at this strange time — and might we also pray that the Holy Spirit would lead and guide each and every one of us from day to day.

Nigeria – slaughter continues during time of lockdown

Fulani militants have continued to carry out attacks against Christians in Plateau State Nigeria, despite the coronavirus lockdown. In the latest attack, at a village near the capital of Jos, extremists murdered two five-year-old children and a three-year-old infant.

Release International, which supports persecuted Christians around the world, has again been calling on the Nigerian government to take urgent steps to protect its vulnerable Christian communities from attack — even as they face the new threat of the coronavirus.



According to a leading green energy supplier, all of us relying on food delivery services at the moment are helping the environment!

Home delivery is like the public transport of groceries. Instead of having 20 odd cars make their way to the supermarket – one van drives

around delivering to everyone in the area. Additionally, it means you're less likely to impulse buy which can help to reduce any waste food.

Remember, if you can, to ask for no plastic bags. It is safe to buy unpackaged fruit and veg if you wash it thoroughly. A study published in the New England Journal of Medicine revealed plastic is the surface the coronavirus remains viable on for the longest - up to 72 hours; for cardboard/paper it was 24.

So perhaps, if you had not been in the habit of doing so, stick with deliveries after the lockdown and help slow down climate chaos.

Out of India? (Part Two)

On Friday evening, after having spent most of the day with the Principal of Bishops College we met up with our good friends, Prakash Thankachan and Margaret Ali. Margaret is one of the few ordained female ministers in the Diocese of Calcutta and Prakash is a deacon who works with the Mennonites. We spent time with them and their families, especially enjoying some time playing with their daughter, Irene.

On the Saturday we were guests at a workshop on human trafficking. It was incredibly moving to hear stories from women who had been trafficked and others who were having to work as sex-workers in order to ensure that their children did not end up in the same profession. Our hearts were touched deeply, both by these incredibly amazing people and by the vision of the church to try and act to make a difference.

Sunday morning we split up! Melanie went off with Rig David from Cathedral Relief Services to preach at CNI Wesleyan Church and Mark headed to St Paul's Cathedral in Kolkata where Bishop Paritosh Canning led



the eucharist and Mark spoke as the cathedral celebrated Mothering Sunday (a week early!).

Mark then attended the blessing of the Cathedral Gift Shop, and a refurbished play area for young people (although he did manage to

get in a quick game of badminton on the newly built court!) before a quick snack with the Friends of the Cathedral.

In the afternoon we joined a contingent from the diocese and headed out for the rededication of a church. The Bishop was greeted in traditional Indian way and the afternoon was a great celebration with much joy



present. It looked like being a great new start for a church in the middle of an area that struggles to make ends meet.

On the Monday we were able to say a few goodbyes as we headed off with Pradip, the Administrator at Khristiya Seva Niketan Hospital, to go to Sarenga – the second part of our trip was just about to begin.

Returning Good for Evil: Love Holds Out Hope

At the height of the Cuban Missile Crisis, as the tension was building toward what could have been the outbreak of World War III, Soviet Premier Nikita Krushchev sent an urgent communiqué to President John F. Kennedy. In part, the message said, You and I should not now pull on the ends of the rope in which you have tied a knot of war, because the harder you and I pull, the tighter the knot will become. And a time may come when this knot is tied so tight that the person who tied it is no longer capable of untying it, and then the knot will have to be cut. What that would mean I need not explain to you, because you yourself understand perfectly what dread forces our two countries possess.

In effect, when you make the decision to return good for evil, you're choosing to stop yanking on the rope of conflict and making the knot in your relationship so tight that it can never be untied. By simply dropping your end of the cord, you're loosening the tension and preserving the possibility that the still-loose knot might somehow be untangled by the two of you. This maintains the hope — however faint — that reconciliation might someday occur. As you think of the adversary whose face you've brought into your mind, you might be tempted to rule out any likelihood of ever having a civil relationship with him or her. But don't write off anything too quickly.

"There were probably some Christians who hated Saul when he was filled with malice and breathing threats and murder against the church," said David Dockery and David Garland in Seeking the Kingdom. "Who would have guessed that he would become the apostle Paul, . . . preaching . . . love and forgiveness? The one who treats us as our enemy today may become our brother or sister tomorrow. Jesus says to treat them today as our brother and sister."

Hatred writes people off; love holds out hope.

Trinity Sunday, 7th June

... celebrating our God who is Three Persons

Trying to explain the doctrine of the Trinity has kept many a theologian busy down the centuries. One helpful picture is to imagine the sun shining in the sky. The sun itself – way out there in space, and unapproachable in its fiery majesty – is the Father. The light that flows from it, which gives us life and illuminates all our lives, is the Son. The heat that flows from it, and which gives us all the energy to move and grow, is the Holy Spirit. You cannot have the sun without its light and its heat. The light and the heat are from the sun, are of the sun, and yet are also distinct in themselves, with their own roles to play.

The Bible makes clear that God is One God, who is disclosed in three persons: Father, Son (Jesus Christ) and Holy Spirit. For example:

Deuteronomy 6:4: 'Hear O Israel, The Lord our God, the Lord is one.'

Isaiah 45:22: 'Turn to me and be saved... for I am God, and there is no other.'

Genesis 1:1-2: 'In the beginning God created.... and the Spirit of God was hovering...'

Judges 14:6: 'The Spirit of the Lord came upon him in power...'

John 1:1-3: 'In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning. Through Him all things were made; without Him nothing was made that has been made.'

Luke 24:49 actually manages to squeeze the whole Trinity into one sentence. Jesus tells His disciples: 'I am going to send you what my Father has promised; but stay in the city until you have been clothed with power (the Holy Spirit) from on high.'

In other words, the sun eternally gives off light and heat, and whenever we turn to its brilliant light, we find that the warmth and life there as well.





Where was the social distancing?

Transgender. Christian. Human.

Alex Clare-Young recently appeared on Songs of Praise and spoke about their life-journey to the point at which they have become the first out transgender minister in the United Reformed Church.

Their book, the title of which is above, has recently been published by wild goose publications (2019).

I have a copy if anyone is interested in borrowing it (always happy to lend books!).

Alex's book is a good, easy-to-read account of Alex's journey to date which, I think, will prove a good introductory book for people who are struggling to understand the experiences that many like Alex have been through, and still go through.

There is a good section on "Defining Terms" which helps the reader understand some of the words that are used when referencing transgender people and some useful worship resources (prayers and songs) that could be adapted and used in many different situations.

If you personally have no experience of transgender people then I would commend the book to you – it doesn't take too long to read and is written in a way that means you can take it as slowly or as quickly as you would wish to. There is space provided through the book for you to reflect on what has been written.



Christians and the bubonic plague of London

The Reverend Richard Peirson was one of the exceptions. Most of the other clergy in the City of London had fled the Great Plague in 1665, but Peirson stayed behind to look after the parishioners of St Bride's Church, Fleet Street, where he was Rector. The parish was densely populated and the pandemic was catastrophic. The church's register records 636 burials that year in the month of September alone, with 43 interred in one day.

Houses of infected people were marked with a red cross on the door, with occupants kept inside for 40 days. Handcarts were pulled along the city streets to cart away the bodies; the drivers' cries of "Bring out your dead", became etched in the memories of subsequent generations. Relatives were banned from attending funerals.

The official count numbered 68,596 deaths in London alone, but other estimates suggested two or three times that number. Bubonic plague – for that is what it was – was incurable. Poor people were fatalistic about it but complained that even their 'spiritual physicians' had abandoned them. Clergy of the Church of England were often supplanted by non-conformist preachers.

It wasn't just the St Bride's Rector who put his life in jeopardy by staying at his post. While most wealthy people, along with King Charles II and his court, escaped the plague-ridden city, Churchwarden Henry Clarke also chose to remain at the church. When he succumbed to the illness, his brother William took over. William survived for a fortnight.

Plague cases continued to occur sporadically at a modest rate until mid-1666. That year the Great Fire of London destroyed St Bride's Church and much of the City of London. It was rebuilt to a design by Christopher Wren, but almost obliterated once more in 1940 during World War II before being restored yet again.

Today's Rector, Canon Alison Joyce, says that compared with her predecessor Richard Peirson, she has it easy. Like everyone else, she is confined by the lockdown rules to her Rectory next to the church. But her pastoral work continues, and she collates sermons and archive music to create a Sunday webcast service. Alison writes, "these days it is a ministry of telephone calls, emails and Facetime. I offer such practical help and support to the vulnerable as I can . . . I keep a candle burning before our main altar and continue a ministry of prayer."

Alison says she is surprised when people regard the faith as a kind of celestial insurance policy against bad things happening to them. The first followers of Jesus knew that in dedicating their lives to following the crucified and risen Christ, their discipleship would take them into the very heart of darkness, not away from it.

She adds, "Hope is no hope at all unless it can engage with utter despair and meaninglessness."

'How long, O Lord?' - the lament of Psalm 13

As we struggle with the effects of the global coronavirus pandemic, we might echo the words of Psalm 13: 'How long, Lord? Will you forget me forever?' It is one of a number of lament psalms, where the psalmist cries out in pain, because he feels abandoned by God. In our current circumstances, these psalms enable us talk to God about our fears and frustrations, while renewing our confidence in Him. What does Psalm 13 say?

Bring your complaint to God: The psalmist brings his pain and questions to God: 'How long must I wrestle with my thoughts and day after day have sorrow in my heart?' (2). He is open with God about his complaints, despite the anger he feels.

Ask boldly for His help: He goes on to ask for God's help: 'Look on me and answer, Lord my God. Give light to my eyes, or I will sleep in death, and my enemy will say, 'I have overcome him...' (3–4). While avoiding despair ('there's no hope') or denial ('everything's fine'), the psalmist is confident in God's power to deliver.

Choose to trust Him: 'But I trust in your unfailing love; my heart rejoices in your salvation. I will sing the Lord's praise, for He has been good to me.' (5–6). The lament is a journey to the point of renewing our trust in God in the brokenness of our life.

The psalms of lament (eg. Psalms 10, 22 and 77) give us a prayer language for dark times. They enable us to be honest with God about what is happening to us and remind us that God has not abandoned us. He is a God who is both sovereign and good.

'Laments turn toward God when sorrow tempts you to run from Him.'

Hearing God (4)

How do we know what God is saying to us? How do we work out what God's plan for our lives is? (Continued)

7. **Through our emotions** – how often do we feel like we are on an emotional roller-coaster? How often do we wish we could control how we feel and how we respond in certain situations?

"We must learn to listen to these emotional reactions. Through them God speaks. They reveal to us more clearly than any other language whether our life revolves around self or around God." (Joyce Huggett) Our emotions can tell us a lot about ourselves and by thinking about them and asking God to show us how our emotions have affected our behaviour we can learn more about ourselves. Why do we respond in the way we do? Is the reason that we are happy because we are in church praising God or is it because our football team won yesterday or what?

I particularly like the verse in one of the Letters to the Corinthians which says:- "We take captive every thought and make it obedient to Christ" (2 Corinthians 10 v 5)

We so often read that as meaning that we should take hold of sinful thoughts but good thoughts, good emotions can be a problem to us as well and they need to be brought under Christs' control. We can be so excited that we miss people who need our love and care. We can be so full of ourselves that we fail to hear the cry of the poor.

8. **Through "holy hunches"** – God can speak to us through "holy hunches". Joyce Huggett suggests that as we learn to listen to God through many different ways we will begin to learn how God actually speaks to us as individuals and for each of us we may well find that God speaks to us in a different way to how God speaks to others around us. We may find some similarities. For example the way God speaks to us through our church services on a Sunday may be similar but for some of us it could be that God speaks clearly through the written word whilst for others it may be through our relationships

with other people. God is a God of great variety, much as we are a people of great variety and God loves to speak to us in different ways and at different times. We need to be prepared to hear God at all times. Joyce says:-

"As we listen to him, it will not surprise us, then, if through 'holy hunches' we are prompted to telephone a certain person, visit someone, or send a cheque to a certain charity. As we act on these hunches, we quickly discover when they have been placed there by God because the help we give is so timely. God-sent." (Joyce Huggett)

Sometimes something different, something out of the ordinary, is needed to enable us to actually hear what God is saying to us. Can I encourage you to begin to look for God afresh in other ways, to not perhaps limit God's ability to speak to us to one method only, to be open to receive from God in different ways, in new ways.

Some of those different ways may be ways that you have not encountered before. Let's look at one more:-

9. **Through gifts of the Holy Spirit** – God may well look to begin to speak to us as a church through some of the gifts of the Holy Spirit that God gives. Some of these are listed in 1 Corinthians 12, gifts of words of knowledge or wisdom, gifts of prophecy, gifts of speaking in tongues and interpretation of tongues.

Some of these things you may be familiar with, some of them may seem distinctly odd to you. Be aware of them, get to know about them, discern how God might use them.

A book I particularly found helpful in learning about the gifts of the Spirit is one that is now quite old. Originally published in the early 1960's, I think, "Nine o'clock in the morning" by Dennis Bennett tells the story of how he discovered the gifts of the Spirit and the effect that it had on his church.

I won't tell you any more but if you would like a copy to read please do let me know and I will get one to you.
