

Creation Time

At the beginning of September we enter Creation Time, and over this period I am sure that you will find the topic of creation being covered in different ways at different times in our various church services. But what is it all about? The following is an extract from Eco-Congregation Scotland about this year's observance of Creation Time:

What is Creation Time?

In 1989 the Ecumenical Patriarch suggested that 1 September, the first day of the Eastern Orthodox Church year, should be observed as a day "of protection of the natural environment". Ten years later the European Christian **Environmental Network (ECEN)** widened this proposal, urging churches to adopt a Time for Creation stretching from 1 September to the feast of St Francis on 4 October and this was endorsed by the 3rd **European Ecumenical Assembly** in Sibiu, Romania in 2007, which recommended that the period "be dedicated to prayer for the protection of Creation and the promotion of sustainable lifestyles that reverse our contribution to climate change".

Since 2008 Churches Together in Britain and Ireland (CTBI) has compiled a programme of

resources to encourage and assist churches to observe Creation Time. These include suggestions on a variety of ways in which churches, groups and individuals could choose to focus on a creation theme at this particular time of the year.

Pope Francis made the Catholic Church's warm welcoming of the season official in 2015, using powerful words last year to encourage participation in the ecumenical Season of Creation:

"This is the season for letting our prayer be inspired anew by closeness to nature...to reflect on our lifestyles...for undertaking prophetic actions...directing the planet towards life, not death."

Creation Time 2020

We have known for decades that this time will come. We have been made aware of the rapid extinction of beautiful and unique creatures. Thanks to the honest and disciplined work of climate scientists, we know (unless we fall victim to fake news) right now, that our lifestyle is unsustainable, and our dominant philosophy of 'permanent growth at all cost' carries the seeds of the destruction of the life that God called good.

Over and above the foolish stewardship of land and resources, yet closely allied to it, is the crisis of values, and of spirituality; a twisted and self-deceptive view of 'profit'.

The whole Christian family now has an unprecedented opportunity and calling: to bring together mission, justice, stewardship, and study: to bring out of our 'treasure' the determinative priorities and values that are so different from those piloting Creation towards catastrophe.

And above all, to take note of, and act on, and trust in, the worth we are given (each and all of us) in Christ. The worth and encouragement we may give to our neighbour, and our fellow creature, in partnership, rather

than exploitation. May we cherish and be empowered by the knowledge of our enduring and transforming worth in the sight of God. Even if, until now, we have indeed pursued 'worthless things'.

The writers of the materials that we will be using in some of our services over this period come from a variety of church backgrounds and pastoral contexts, and, in particular include some good friends of ours, Revd David Coleman (who is the Environmental Chaplain for Eco-Congregation Scotland), Rev Alex Mabbs (URC minister at the Brighthelm Centre) and Rev Andy Braunston (URC minister for the Glasgow Southside cluster and also co-ordinator of the URC's Daily Devotions which some of you may be receiving). If you are able to do so please do check out the wide variety of resources that are available to help us think about creation at www.ecocongregationscotland.o rg and elsewhere.

One really easy way to keep up-to-date with major environmental news is to download and set up certain free phone apps on your smart phone or tablet. For example, on the BBC News app - click 'My News', 'Add Topics' and select


'climate change', 'energy' and 'nature', and it will bring any items on these subjects to the top of your personalised news feed to ensure that you are receiving the very latest environmental stories. On The Guardian app, to give another example, you can select and expand 'Environment' on the left hand side menu to add topics including 'Climate Change', 'Wildlife' and 'Pollution' (press the button to add topics - an image of a home with a plus sign). Now you should be able to see related articles in your news feed.

By using free apps in this way, you can be informed - for interest, prayer and action - about the very latest developments - including many good news stories as well as the worrying ones which tend to get prominence on front pages.

My Big Fun Walk is a reinvented version of our flagship event The Big Fun Walk, which had to be postponed due to the Covid-19 pandemic. Last year, this popular event raised over £160,000 for North London Hospice and had 1,600 participants. So help us raise vital funds for our patients!

What's involved?

'THANK YOU' for your unique and vital contribution to the life of the United Reformed Church, and for the work of the kingdom which we are able to do together in God's name

We are living through an extraordinary and challenging time – a very anxious time for everyone; a difficult time for many; and a time of suffering and loss for some. Yet, the main purpose of this letter is to say 'thank you' to each of you for all that you have done for the Church in the past; for all that you continue to do even in these difficult times; and for what you will do in the future.

As we are treasurers, you will not be surprised that the focus of this letter is on finance. But we recognise that finance is only a means to the end which is our doing of God's work together.

'Thank you' for your giving to your local church. Financially, this giving is the lifeblood of your own church and of the whole United Reformed Church across England, Scotland and Wales. It is this personal giving that enables your local church treasurer to pay your church's bills. Typically, the largest of those 'bills' is the contribution your local church pays to the URC Ministry and Mission Fund. This Fund meets the central costs of the United Reformed Church. The total budget is around £20 million and is approved each year by Mission Council. Over 80% of this money is spent on ministers and church related community workers – their training, stipends and pensions. But the other 20% also achieves an enormous amount on

behalf of us all. General Assembly 2020 was severely constrained because of the Covid-19 lockdown, but the reports written for General Assembly are available on the URC website, and they paint pictures of all the work that has been done in our name over the last two years and much of that work is ongoing.

'Thank you' for your giving and the giving of your local church last year. In 2019, over £19.4 million was given by local churches and synods to the Ministry and Mission Fund. The total contributions from local churches reduced very slightly but the average giving per member has, once again and remarkably, gone up by more than inflation.

'Thank you' for your continued giving this year. We fully understand that circumstances this year are difficult. Most local churches have been unable to meet for over five months. We have not had the usual opportunities to make our offerings for the work of the Church. But most of the costs of the local church and of the denomination have not reduced and some have increased as a consequence of the pandemic. We are also aware that some have lost income or work this year and are therefore in great financial difficulty. But there are others on fixed incomes who are actually better off than they might otherwise have been. So, please continue to give what you can in whatever way you can – or save it up until you can hand it over.

Any giving of ours is a response to the amazing generosity and love of God which we see in Jesus. Nevertheless, it is important for us to say 'thank you' to each and all of you.

If you have any questions or comments arising from this letter then please speak to your church treasurer, who has been provided with more detailed information. If they are not able to help directly then they can get in touch with the finance team at Church House.



Helping Christians of Central Asia during COVID-19

What do you do when you are persecuted for your faith during lockdown? Open Doors, which works with the Persecuted Church, has shared a story from their partners in Central Asia.

It's become sadly familiar to hear stories of Christian women around the world who are persecuted by their fathers or brothers. But Zebede is facing attack from her own son.

Like many of us, Zebede has been under lockdown at home in her Central Asian country. Her adult son is bitterly against her Christian faith, and blames her for all the family problems. He threatens her, beats her if he sees her reading the Bible, and even rips it. He doesn't like to see her praying, and he threatens to burn down her church.

So when Open Doors partners recently arrived at her home with a bag of food, Zebede burst into tears. The supplies were vital, but she was even more delighted to see fellow Christians again.


But Zebede is only one example among thousands of Christians across Central Asia. Lockdown has deprived them of income, and then the local government often deliberately neglects them when official COVID-19 aid is distributed. On top of that, they cannot even meet with other Christians, and are instead isolated at home, often with their persecutors.

But Open Doors partners have been hard at work to bring vital relief aid and encouragement. On-going support from British donors has meant that local churches can be resilient voices of hope in their area.

One local church has seen their vision expand by twenty times. "We set the goal to help 100 of our local families," says the church leader, Pjetr. "Frankly, we didn't expect to be able to cover so many families. This is a huge amount of money for us. But today we are helping more than 2,000! This is a miracle!"

Book Club




Book Club has met a couple of times since 'lockdown' eased, but in the garden of one of our Members.

called 'Pooter' is out of this world of 2020. An enjoyable look of the past in the area some of us know so well.




In August we had read 'Half a World Away' by Mike Gayle.

Why Do I Still Struggle with Doubts About My Faith—And What Can I Do About It?

No doubt about it: doubt scares many Christians. They stare into the dark, pestered by uncertainties and questions that make them feel anxious and vulnerable. When those times come, keep this in mind:

- Doubt is not the opposite of faith; the opposite is unbelief.
- Doubt is normal. Virtually every thinking person—regardless of beliefs—at times has doubts.
- Even King David, John the Baptist, and the apostle Thomas doubted—yet they are considered heroes of our faith.
- Doubts are not necessarily destructive; they can actually strengthen our faith.

How should we respond to doubt?

Step #1: Find the root of your doubt.

Is it intellectual, caused by questions in your mind? Or emotional, based on things you feel (or don't feel)? Or does it stem from your will—choices you make that hamper your relationship with God?

Step #2: Ask God and others for help.

When we suppress our doubts, we unwittingly give them more power. But when we admit them to God and to mature Christian friends, it's amazing how their potency dissipates. Don't try to face them alone.

Step #3: Implement a course of treatment.

Do you wrestle with intellectual doubts? Read great books, do extra research, and talk to Christians who have grappled with the same issues. Emotional doubts? Discuss them with a pastor or Christian counselor. Doubts related to your will? Let God guide your daily decisions—really obey him—and you will experience breakthroughs.

Step #4: Take scrupulous care of your spiritual health.


A healthy faith is the best antidote for the virus of doubt. Prioritize the daily habits and relationships that will keep you spiritually strong—prayer, Scripture reading, study, worship, and fellowship.

Step #5: Hold your remaining questions in tension.

Accept the fact that there are always more questions—and rejoice in knowing we'll have an eternity in heaven to get all the answers!

How long have you lived in this area?

What made you choose our church to come to?

Dad was minister, so it made sense at the time!

What makes you go to church at all?

Do you have a favourite hymn? What is it, and why?

Do you have a favourite Bible passage? What is it, and why?

I love Peter, and John 21 is always special to me, especially when sitting by the Sea of Galilee where it all happened.

Peter makes mistakes, he makes hasty decisions, he has a deep love for his Master, he speaks before he thinks. John captures the events that day as Peter and Jesus reconnect. We looked at the passage at Stepwise in August and if you read it in the Amplified Bible the differences in the Greek language (that can't be translated properly

into English because the Greek has many words for different types of love) make the three questions "Peter do you love me ..." make even more sense.

It is great to know that we can and will make mistakes, that we can doubt and that we are still loved by Jesus and forgiven.

John 21 verse 15 Amplified Bible:

So when they had finished breakfast, Jesus said to Simon Peter, "Simon, son of John, do you love Me more than these [others do—with total commitment and devotion]?" He said to Him, "Yes, Lord; You know that I love You [with a deep, personal affection, as for a close friend]." Jesus said to him, "Feed My lambs."

Again He said to him a second time, "Simon, son of John, do you love Me [with total commitment and devotion]?" He said to Him, "Yes, Lord; You know that I love You [with a deep, personal affection, as for a close friend]." Jesus said to him, "Shepherd My sheep."

Has your faith in God helped you at different times in your life? Yes, but I can't remember time before I had faith.

Knowing that God loves me and cares for me is a constant help. Being able to look through situations and see with a positive view and trusting that there is a bigger purpose/reason to everything gives a different look at life.

What would you say to someone who is not a Christian, but would like to know more?

Do the Alpha Course. It gently encourages you to faith. I wouldn't suggest they came to Church on a Sunday as that isn't an easy place to find your initial faith. Having a discussion over a pint is a much safer environment and more likely to encourage a move to faith than being told to turn up at 10am on Sunday!

What's in your hand?

September is usually the time when we get back to our normal routines after the summer break. With the current coronavirus pandemic, it's very different this year! However, it is still a good time to consider how God can use us to make a real difference in our workplace, school, family, friends and community. He equips us with everything we need to make His love known.

When God gave Moses the job of bringing the Israelites out of Egypt, He asked the question, 'What is in your hand?' (Exodus 4:2). Moses was holding his staff, which represented his livelihood (what he was good at); his resources (his flock represented his wealth) and his security (which God was asking him to lay down). God asks the same question of us: What has God given you? Our gifts, temperament, experience, relationships, mind, education can be used in the work God has given us to do. How will we use them to make a difference in the places where He calls us to serve Him?

John Ortberg, in his book *It All Goes Back in the Box*, speaks of Johnny, a 19-year-old with Downs syndrome. He worked at a supermarket checkout putting people's items into bags. To encourage his customers, he decided to put a *thought for the day* into the bags. Every night his dad would help him to prepare the slips of paper and he would put the thoughts into the bags saying, 'I hope it helps you have a good day. Thanks for coming here.' A month later the store manager noticed that Johnny's line at the checkout was three times longer than anyone else's! People wanted Johnny's thought for the day. He wasn't just filling bags with groceries, he was filling lives with hope!

He gave us eyes to see them: 'The Madonna of the Goldfinch' by Raphael

The weeks and months of lockdown have been difficult and testing times for many of us, but they have also provided the opportunity to look afresh at the world of nature. With less traffic on the roads, less air pollution, and less noise pollution, the sky has somehow seemed bluer and the bird song more joyful and confident.

It is appropriate that we focus this month on one such bird noted for its liquid, tinkling song – the goldfinch. In this month we also celebrate the feast of the Nativity of



the Blessed Virgin Mary on 8 September, and so the painting is 'The Madonna of the Goldfinch' by Raphael.

Raphael was only 37 years old when he died in 1520, but his work is marked by maturity and great beauty. No more so than in this painting which shows Mary with a young Jesus and John the Baptist. You could easily miss the tiny bird which is carefully held by John and gently stroked by Jesus, who has one foot resting on His mother's. It is an intimate, tender scene which was painted in 1505 as a wedding gift for Lorenzo Nasi. It was badly damaged by an earthquake in 1548, painstakingly restored in the early part of this century, and now hangs in the Uffizi in Florence.

As we look, we rejoice in the grace and simplicity of the scene. We look again and ask ourselves 'Why a goldfinch?' The bird has a red

spot on its head, and legend tells that the goldfinch flew down to the cross of Calvary to take a thorn from the crown of thorns. As it pulled the thorn in its beak, its head was splashed with a drop of blood.

And so this painting of gentleness and innocence opens out into a wider canvas of redemptive love. Our thoughts move from infancy to the cross. Mary, sat on a rock, is reading 'The Throne of Wisdom', and the artist is inviting us to ponder where true wisdom is found. Here, as we look at the wonder of nature and new life with a mother and children, but also as we look ahead to the 'wisest love' of Jesus who is our Redeemer.
