Most people welcome a chance to celebrate love because, whether we are conscious of it or not, love resonates at the level of the

deepest reality within us because it is the fundamental nature of God. Love should be at the heart (excuse the pun) of the message the Church gives to the world because it is God's message to us and is a message the world so desperately needs to hear.

When Christians say 'God is love' we are asserting the truth that drives the forces of creation and binds up its wounds. We're talking about a power tough enough to take anything on. God's love is strong, dynamic, and resilient. When Jesus suffers on the cross, he is healing the wounds of sin and evil.

God shows his grace to us by taking on all the sin of the world and opening a way that we

might be redeemed and become recipients of his intended blessing. When we open our hearts to the presence of God then his compassion towards us is what our spirit senses and experiences. Matthew 11 v 28-29 tells us that Jesus said: 'Come to me, all you who are weary and heavily laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls'.



#### Tip 15: Down the toilet

It seems that 'fat bergs' are created not just from food waste, but also from other things put down the toilet.

The toilet is only designed for bodily toilet waste and toilet paper.

Toilet paper is designed in a way that ensures it breaks up during its journey through the sewers so no one should be putting nappies, earbuds or cotton wool down the toilet.

There has been a move towards using flushable toilet tissue wipes, but these should not be mistaken for baby wipes. The only flushable wipes that should be flushed down the toilet are ones that have the 'Fine to flush' Certification Mark on the packet. These wipes, like toilet paper, are designed to break up while on the journey to the water treatment plant and are 0% plastic.

#### Tip 16: Batch cook

For our family, batch cooking was essential. As we both work full-time, one of whom works 12 hour day and night shifts, this was an important part of our waste plan. Also, one of us really doesn't like cooking! So, lots of meals were designed around staple ingredients

like breaded chicken, that could be used in a variety of different meals. The batch cooking relies on you planning your meals for the week which once you start doing will become your new routine and will in turn, make a massive difference on your food waste.

There are plenty of recipes online and in many recipe books, from a variety of different chefs that can provide you with batch designed meals.

For us the two main ones were minced Bolognese which could be used with spaghetti, in a lasagne or in a chili con carne rice dish and breaded chicken, which we used in chicken burgers, chicken curry and sliced into nugget type dips. As these were made at the beginning of the week and were ways of getting the kids involved in the cooking too, this made organisation and prep for dinner times throughout the week much easier.

#### Loved nonetheless

Here is a thought on a verse of Scripture from the encounter of Jesus with a man described as a 'rich, young ruler'.

This man was keen to follow Jesus, but when told he must share his wealth with the poor decided it was too much to ask, and he went away sorrowful. In this context we read that, "Jesus, looking at him loved him (Mark 10:21)."

This is a remarkable statement about Jesus, and the nature of divine love, a love that doesn't alter despite the ups and downs of our behaviour. It is constant and unchanging, truly without condition, and unshaken by the unpredictability of human response.

We might have expected to hear Jesus say, 'You foolish man' or 'You stupid boy', but there is no such rebuke, only love. Jesus might have been annoyed, disappointed, exasperated, alarmed, shocked . . but all we feel is His love for someone who has missed a great opportunity.

What a joy it is to know that Jesus loves us exactly as we are. When He looks at us, nothing is hidden from His gaze. He sees through all our pretence, all our subterfuge, all our attempts to put on a brave front. He knows who I am, completely. And yet He loves me unreservedly and without reservation. Amazing.

#### **Lectio for Families**

Lectio for Families is a free app for families to do together. It features daily Bible readings, a weekly memory verse, engaging questions to pause and talk about, and prompts for reflection and prayer. Helping families to read the Bible and explore faith through conversation and prayer together.



The app can be downloaded by parents and carers onto a mobile device. Families can then choose to either listen to the audio content together, wherever and whenever they are together, or they can read it as they pass the device to each other.

#### **Daily Prayers**

Like Lectio 365, Lectio for Families follows a simple P.R.A.Y. pattern each day:

P:ausing to be still

R:ejoicing with, and Reflecting on, verses from the Bible

A:sking for God's help

Y: saying YES to God's ways.

On Sundays there is a special Sabbath prayer, and occasional pauses of the regular pattern to celebrate heroes of the Christian faith.

#### Who is it for?

The Lectio for Families app has been designed for families with children aged between 7-11 years old, but is likely to be suitable for those who are younger and slightly older too!

The Lectio for Families team includes adults and children who are part of the 24-7 Prayer movement around the world.





To Kill a Mockingbird by Harper Lee

This classic had been reread by some. Set in the 1930s Deep South of the USA, the story is related by Scout, the youngest of the family of Atticus a lawyer. His current case is to defend a local black married man falsely accused of rape. The township is divided.

Atticus' wife had died and the family were cared for by Calpurnia, a woman of colour from the local township. We are introduced to other members of the family and the neighbours; so different from

A read enjoyed by us all.



At The Edge of the Orchard by Tracy Chevalier

This writer certainly does her research. Set in the USA in the 1800s it starts in Connecticut with the Goodenough family of apple growers originally from England. The son James, his wife and many children leave the family farm and travel west settling in Ohio in a swamp area where life is very hard. Sadie is an awful wife and mother with her own dislike of apple varieties so loved and protected by her husband. The first part of the book is rather slow.



We then follow the life of Robert the youngest son who travels as far west as he can until he reaches San Francisco. He tries various occupations on the way. He then meets William Lobb an arboriculturist working for English agents to collect cones, seedlings and saplings to ship for wealthy landowners wanting to 'show off' the latest sequoia and redwood trees growing in their pastoral land.

We learn about pine trees and their cones, apple varieties, lives of gold miners, pioneers and those early settlers.

A very good read.

#### Christians in India face growing number of attacks

In India, attacks against Christians have been rising, and more states are imposing anti-conversion laws. This comes as growing numbers of the Indian underclass, the Dalits, are turning to Christianity, and as right-wing Hindu nationalism is on the rise.

As yet another state, Karnataka, is poised to impose anti-conversion legislation, there have been challenges in the Supreme Court to the constitutionality of limiting freedom of religion in India.

Late last year, Hindu nationalists set upon a Christian community in Chhattisgarh state, to drive them out and make the area 'Christian free', according to International Christian Concern (ICC).

The mob of 50 attacked Christians in Metapal village with clubs, breaking their bones and leaving nine Christians seriously injured.

And following a similar attack on Christians in Uttar Pradesh, when 100 Hindu nationalists burst into a church meeting, beating the pastor and other Christians. The police turned up soon after and arrested the Christians, later charging them under the anti-conversion law.

The latest report from a coalition of NGOs listed more than 300 violent attacks against Christians in India, over a nine-month period. They included 288 accounts of mob violence, across 21 states.

The Evangelical Fellowship of India (EFI) also recorded 145 incidents of religious persecution against Christians – including three murders – in the first six months of 2021.

According to one Christian in India: "The number of attacks has increased since the second wave of COVID-19 ended. This is a most challenging time for the Church in India. We need prayer and the intervention of God."

An Indian pastor said that extremists were resorting to violence because growing numbers of Hindus were putting their faith in Christ and attending church services.

Late last year three extremists on a motorcycle threw acid over a 14-year-old Christian boy. Nitish Kumar was burned across 65 per cent of his body, and later died.

His 17-year-old brother, Sanjeet, told Morning Star News: "Even after what my brother has gone through, we will not forsake Christ. We will continue to remain faithful until we die."

The rising persecution is linked to Hindutva, a form of religious and cultural nationalism that binds Hindu identity to nationality. Hindutva (literally Hinduness) shapes the right-wing political ideology of India's ruling BJP and other nationalist groups. At its most extreme, the notion behind Hindutva is that to be Indian is to be a Hindu – and nothing else will be tolerated.

The rising tide of intolerance has increased since the election of the nationalist BJP in 2014. It has resulted in attacks against religious minorities and the passing of anti-conversion laws in many states. These laws are targeted at both Muslims and Christians.

According to the 2021 Indian census there are around 960 million Hindus in India, which has a population of 1.3 billion. Estimates vary as to the number of Christians. The official figure is 29 million, but some observers put the number at almost 65 million, roughly 5 per cent of the population.

## What's wrong with the world?

'How can a God of love allow suffering?' Many people struggle with such questions, however the Bible helps us to understand how sin affects both our own lives and the world.

Genesis provides us with a picture of how sin entered the world. In Genesis 2:16-17, God gave Adam and Eve both permission ('You are free to eat from any tree in the garden') and a prohibition ('But you must not eat from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil'), alongside warning them of the consequences of disobedience ('For when you eat of it you will surely die').

In Genesis 3, they broke God's law by eating fruit from the forbidden tree. As a result, their eyes were opened to the nature of sin (they knew *shame*) and their relationship with God was broken (they *hid* from Him). As a consequence, death entered their lives. This story reminds us that God gives us free will (an essential aspect of being human) to choose whether God will be at the centre of our lives or not.

The Bible offers different ways of describing sin:

A spirit of independence: we don't want God to interfere with our lives, preferring our own ideas, plans and ways of behaviour.

**Ignoring the Maker's instructions**: if you ignore user instructions, you only have yourself to blame when things go wrong! God created us to function with Him at the centre of our lives.

**Missing the mark**: we fail an exam even when we miss the pass mark by one mark: 'All have sinned and fall short of the glory of God' (Romans 3:23).

In a famous correspondence in The Times under the title 'What's wrong with the world?' GK Chesterton's letter simply said: 'Dear Sir, I am.'

## **Five famous quotes from Desmond Tutu**

The recent death of Archbishop Desmond Tutu was mourned around the world. Here are five of his more famous quotes, which show why he was so especially honoured for his justice and reconciliation work in South Africa.

"Do your little bit of good where you are; it's those little bits of good put together that overwhelm the world."

"If you are neutral in situations of injustice, you have chosen the side of the oppressor. If an elephant has its foot on the tail of a mouse, and you say that you are neutral, the mouse will not appreciate your neutrality."

"Don't raise your voice, improve your argument. Good sense does not always lie with the loudest shouters, nor can we say that a large,

unruly crowd is always the best arbiter of what is right."

"Forgiving is not forgetting; it's actually remembering — remembering and not using your right to hit back. It's a second chance for a new beginning. And the remembering part is particularly important. Especially if you don't want to repeat what happened."

"Differences are not intended to separate, to alienate. We are different precisely in order to realise our need of one another."
