

The search... is on!

"But the LORD said to Samuel, 'Do not consider his appearance or his height, for I have rejected him. The LORD does not look at the things



people look at. People look at the outward appearance, but the LORD looks at the heart." (1 Samuel 16:7)

There had been a failure.

Somehow things hadn't quite worked out for the King that the people had chosen, the one who had stood head and shoulders above everybody else was no longer favoured by God...strangely this King had also been chosen by God, or so the text would suggest to us... even though God, to begin with, didn't want the people to have a King..

It's difficult, isn't it, for us to work out what God's plans and purposes are when we read through the various accounts of the journey of the people of Israel, the chosen people...so is it any wonder that we as a church, and we as individuals, often get things wrong as well?

We think we are following in Christ's footsteps; we're doing our best, we pray hard and long, we search the scriptures to find the life that Jesus wants to give us...and yet, time after time we still get things wrong.

Think for a moment or two about the errors that have been justified by reference to scripture over the centuries...slavery, making women and children of less value than men. exploiting the planet's resources... perhaps we're not so bad, after all? The prophet Samuel is told to stop whimpering and whingeing, over the replacement of Saul as King of Israel, to fill his horn with oil and set out... God is commissioning him again to anoint the new King, someone who will do the right thing, be God's worshipper and give God the honour that belongs to God alone. Someone who will be obedient.

And then the children of Jesse are called forward to be presented to the prophet Samuel.

What a choice.

So many people with so many gifts... so what exactly are we looking for?

What is it you are going to be looking for as a church when you seek to find a new minister?

How are you preparing to choose?

Take a quick look at 2 Peter 1 verses 3 – 11 as you prepare to answer that question...because Peter, writing here, seems to suggest that we may not need anything – and therefore, dare I suggest that you may not need to be thinking in ways that you probably already are... that you must have a certain type of person, a leader from a particular stable or background, someone with particular gifts and abilities?

The Apostle writes:

"God's divine power has given us everything needed for life and godliness..."

Wait a minute – if God has given us everything we need, what are we looking for? Should we be looking for something or someone else?

God has placed within our churches at this moment in time the people who are meant to be there/here. You have been given the gifts you need in the people you have in your fellowships.

You are a church of the living God, and the living God has given you gifts, talents, opportunities to do God's work, to carry on the Missio Dei, the mission of God here in this locality, in this city, in this nation.

Many churches seem to fail to recognise that God has gifted them, given them the resources they need to do what they need to do at any point in time. God has called **each and every one** of you to follow in the Jesus way, to walk the way of Christ through your lives and in your lifestyles.

So, as you begin to approach entering into a search for a new minister can I encourage you to begin by looking around at the resources you have already and to consider what **you** might do to encourage one another in your spiritual walk with Christ and focus on these words that Peter gives us as a guide.

Read through again 2 Peter 1: 3 – 10 and see what instructions are given to you.

We will be praying, as we prepare to leave you for a time, for you to have wisdom and discernment together as churches in all that you do.

May God richly bless you on your journeys.

Remember wildlife this Autumn.

Cooler temperatures, darker evenings, falling leaves, Autumn is fast approaching! There are a number of things that we can do to provide food and shelter for wildlife, now and in preparation for next year.

Resist the temptation to clear up your garden; allow vegetation to die back naturally and leave seedheads, especially on plants such as teasels, thistles and sunflowers. This provides food and shelter for birds through the coldest months.

Don't totally cut back your perennial plants but trim them instead and leave plenty of foliage at or near ground level for insects and birds. Piling up leaves and other vegetation to create an open compost heap could provide the perfect hibernation spot too.

Clean all your bird feeders to avoid the spread of disease to winter migrants and put up a nest box well in advance of breeding season. A nest box could also prove a cosy spot for small birds to spend the night on particularly cold winter evenings ahead.

For early spring 2022 flowers, plant Alliums, daffodils, tulips, grape hyacinth, crocus, snakes head fritillary, and bluebells this Autumn. Other wildflowers seeds which can all be sown now include: cowslip, chamomile, common knapweed, betony or meadow buttercup. Alternatively, you can buy a wildflower mix which includes all of these.



Waste Warriors

Vikkie and the Thompson family continue their food waste tips, picked up from participating on Channel 4's Cook Clever, Waste Less with Prue & Rupy which first aired on 27th May.

Some of the tips you may already do, which is awesome, keep that up, but for others, this may all be new ideas for you. Continue to reduce your waste in as many ways as possible to help the planet and the environment for the younger generations that come after you. Good luck!

Tip 7: Bread

A shocking 36% of households regularly don't eat their crust. The second most throwaway item by UK households is bread. Every day in UK homes we throw away approximately 20 million whole slices of bread, equivalent to 1 million lives. (Source - BBC Studios' Science Unit).

Chop up the end slices going stale and pop them on an oven tray. Put them in a low/medium oven to dry them out for about 10 minutes. Then blitz the chunks in a food processor. The dried breadcrumbs can be stored in an airtight container and last about three months.

They store well in the freezer too, as does grated cheese. Have a tub of frozen grated cheese and frozen breadcrumbs ready mixed to sprinkle over a lasagne, cauliflower cheese, macaroni cheese, in meatballs - straight from the freezer! Maybe even add crisps to this mixture when they are near their 'best before' date, for added texture.

To save energy, when preparing to cook dinner, put the bread in the oven while you are waiting for the oven to heat up.

Tip 8: It's all about Milk!

Every day in the UK we throw away 3.1 million glasses of milk. Milk goes off much quicker if the fridge is just a few degrees too warm.

34% of Brits rarely or never checked their fridge and freezer temperature and almost half (48%) rarely or never change it.

52% incorrectly think the fridge should be set between 4 to 7°. It should be below 5°. (Source - BBC Studios' Science Unit).

Make sure the fridge door is shut. The temperature inside a fridge rises significantly each time the door is opened and could take hours to cool down again. Make sure you shut the door when you get your milk out to make a cuppa.

Keep a fridge thermometer inside your fridge and check the temperature. Don't put hot food straight in the fridge. Cool cooked food at room temperature and place in the fridge within 1 to 2 hours.

Spoiled milk can replace buttermilk or sour cream in baked goods. It can also be used to tenderise meats or added to soups, casseroles, or salad dressings.

As the milk further sours, you can use it in recipes that call for more sugar. Bring a cup of milk to a simmer and then add a tablespoon of sugar, whatever strong black tea you have around, and a few whole spices like clove, cardamom, and cinnamon. Boil for five minutes, then enjoy your chai-inspired beverage hot or iced in your now wonderfully scented kitchen.



Persecution of Christians set to rise in Afghanistan

As the Taliban tighten their grip on Afghanistan, Release International has warned that attacks on Christians are likely to rise across the region.

One church leader in Afghanistan said Christians were living in great fear. Some who worked for the government now face reprisals, and any identified as Christians could be killed. Christians risk betrayal, even from their own family members.

A Christian contact of one Release International partner describes the situation as 'dire.' Says 'Micah': "Our brothers and sisters in Christ are telling us how afraid they are. In the areas that the Taliban now control girls are not allowed to go to school and women are not allowed to leave their homes without a male companion."

The church in Afghanistan already faced sharp persecution, even before the Taliban advance. That church is invisible and must operate underground in this land where Muslims who change their faith are breaking the law and considered to have betrayed their communities.

To be exposed as a Christian is to risk being charged with apostasy, which is punishable by death or imprisonment. There have also been honour killings of Christians by their families.

It was the Pakistan Taliban who shot 15-year-old Malala Yousafzai for going to school and telling the world about it in a blog.

Thousands of Afghans, including Christians, are now seeking refuge in neighbouring Pakistan. But the Taliban are growing in influence there, too. Before the Afghan president fled, he accused Pakistan of permitting thousands of jihadi fighters to cross its border to support the Taliban.

Through its international network of missions, Release International is active in some 25 countries around the world, supporting pastors, Christian prisoners and their families.

Time to reclaim the sabbath, says new report

Home working, zero hours contracts, the switch to home deliveries and online retailing, and an 'always on' culture – the world of work is changing fast and massively, and the Covid pandemic has accelerated the upheaval.

Now faith-based think tank Theos has come up with key proposals aimed at helping modern-day workers survive and thrive despite both the current changes – and the major challenges coming down the track. One proposal suggests 'recovering the sabbath.'

In a new report, 'Just Work: humanising the labour market in a changing world', Theos identifies three 'great disruptions' facing the world of work. They highlight: the technological – Artificial Intelligence, machine learning, and automation; the ecological – climate change and loss of biodiversity; and human vulnerability, as seen through the pandemic, mass migration and declining birth rates.

Paul Bickley, one of the report's authors, explains: "The issue is not work itself, but rather what happens when we make work, rather than the people who do it, our focus. We are disconnected from a healthy sense of work, and severing the needed boundaries between work and rest has set us adrift. The biblical idea of Sabbath is an ancient answer to modern anxieties. It's time to rediscover it."

During the pandemic, increasing numbers of people have shifted to working from home, from in-person shopping to ordering online, having take-aways delivered, and watching streaming services instead of going to the cinema.

But people working from home or in the 'gig economy' delivering food or online orders, have discovered they are being watched – and watched closely. Software fitted to home computers or installed in

vehicles is monitoring when and how people are working. The move to home working has meant an increased erosion of defined working hours, with 'the boss' able to make demands round-the-clock.

In response, Theos makes three key proposals:

First, a focus on a full work, rather than full employment economy. Paid employment is the main – but not the only – form of work, and unpaid labour, such as caring responsibilities and volunteer work, need greater esteem and focus from a policy perspective.

Second, recognition of the human person as central to any healthy understanding of work.


Investors, and first and foremost church investors, have achieved tangible changes through activism in areas such as climate change and governance. They should add clear requirements on the fair handling of wages, benefits, agency work, outsourcing and employee surveillance to the social criteria they look at within environmental, social and governance investing.

Third, recovery of shared practices of rest to counter our culture of overwork.

Dissolving boundaries between our employment and our leisure – exacerbated during the pandemic – have negatively affected many workers. Overwork is literally killing people. For many, a combination of technology and the pandemic have broken the link between work and particular places and times – leading to an expectation, even if it is only an expectation of ourselves, that we will always be available.



'Two Women in Rome' by Elizabeth Buchan




Fairtrade

The Friend at Midnight

This month we are looking at the Parable of the Friend at Midnight (Luke 11:5-8). It is found in a passage where Jesus is teaching His disciples to pray.

Pray Shamelessly:

The parable concerns a man coming to his friend at midnight and asking 'Friend, lend me three loaves, for a friend of mine has arrived on a journey, and I have nothing to set before him' (5-6). Despite the hour, the rules of hospitality would mean this was not an unreasonable request.

But the friend refuses to help because everyone in his house is asleep. Jesus adds, 'though he will not get up and give him anything because he is his friend, yet because of the man's boldness he will rise and give him whatever he needs'. Jesus uses this parable to encourage us to come in shameless boldness to our heavenly Father with our needs. In contrast to the parable, God is not slow in responding to us. It's not God who is reluctant to answer, but we to ask. Do we pray with shameless boldness?

Pray Persistently:

Such confidence is the basis for persistent prayer: 'Ask, and it will be given to you; seek, and you will find; knock, and it will be opened to you.' All three verbs indicate a continual habit: 'Keep on asking... seeking... knocking'. We will not be content simply to ask once and then move on. Jesus tells us to bring our prayers to God persistently. Do we give up too easily in prayer?

Pray Expectantly:

'For everyone who asks receives, and the one who seeks finds, and to the one who knocks it will be opened.' Do we pray expectantly, believing that God delights in answering your prayers? Why not begin this adventure of prayer today!

Interview

How long have you lived in this area?

I've lived in Bush Hill Park all my life with just a three year stint in Southampton for university.

What made you choose our church to come to?

My gran made sure my brother and I were taken to Sunday School. I remember being taken to a few different Sunday Schools probably aged about five and we choose to go to the Methodist on Wellington Road.

At about age 13 all the other people my age had left and the nearest in age to me were seven year olds or 30 somethings which felt ancient to me at the time! I had been friends with Richard Barry my whole life and he suggested coming to Bush Hill Park, particularly for the Fury youth group. All in all I think I only missed one Sunday.

Once I started coming to Bush Hill Park I joined Girls Brigade, Fury and the music group, everyone was really friendly and it was great fun.

What makes you go to church at all?

I come to church now for a chance to be still and not need to worry about anything else in my life. I also enjoy hearing how different people interpret the bible and it's a good way to focus on God.

Do you have a favourite hymn? What is it, and why?

I enjoy a lot of the newer songs like Indescribable by Chris Tomlin, Build your kingdom here by Rend Collective and Beautiful one by Tim Hughes. Mostly I like the tunes and being able to sing a harmony but the words can also resonate like this from Indescribable, it makes you think of the power and wonder of God:

Who has told every lightning bolt where it should go Or seen heavenly storehouses laden with snow Who imagined the sun and gives source to its light Yet, conceals it to bring us the coolness of night

Do you have a favourite Bible passage? What is it, and why?

I quite like the whole of James. It's only five chapters long and it has very practical ideas. However for some reason the verse that's coming to mind now is from 1 Peter chapter 3 verse 15:

Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have. But do this with gentleness and respect

If you don't know why you believe what you believe, why do you believe it? How do you know you're not just doing what you grew up doing? I like logic and reason and I like that the bible expects you to be able to explain yourself, I just need to always remember to do it with gentleness and respect!

Has your faith in God helped you at different times in your life?

Yes. Over the last few years I have found work and life getting more and more busy with very little downtime but I find the time I spend with God, giving thanks for what I have or what I see on walks or reflecting on a bible passage with Lectio365, gives me the space to breathe and refocus on the things that matter. I am not strong enough to do everything on my own, I need God's help and support.

What would you say to someone who is not a Christian, but would like to know more?

There are so many things in this world which point to a God. Things that a creator put in place for our enjoyment. The main one which stands out to me now is that the sun is roughly 400 times further away from us than the moon but also roughly 400 times bigger which means we can experience a solar eclipse – that is by design, believing that happened all on its own is much more of a leap of faith than to believe in a creator.

Simply reading the bible can help. Don't try to read from the start of the bible, start in the New Testament or with the Psalms. Before you start reading, ask for the Holy Spirit to help you understand what is written, then read a bit and see what comes to you. You never know what could happen!

Boys' Brigade News continued from September...

This year the theme for camp was video games with everyone turning up as a range of characters from various video games. The day got off to a strong start with Mario's water assault course with points awarded for most water returned to the tent's buckets at the end of the round, fastest time to complete and fastest individual times. Once the course was finished the wobbly pole was competed. The water balloon game was played, and the usual water fights kicked off. We then had lunch before the costume and tent item competition took place followed by Pac-Man's Bush Tucker Trials and then the theme games begun. There was a giant battleships board, in which boys had to use air darts to hit and sink the battleships, then there was a life size minesweeper which the boys had to make their way through the course without setting off the explosions. There was Agent Peely's Target practice, a Minecraft block builder, the target being to build the tallest tower. A Tetris puzzle that could only be completed in two possible ways. Only one tent managed this with a second tent completing it 12 seconds after their time was up. One of the faster paced games involved one at a time the boys getting in the swimming pool and searching for fish, whilst blind folded, team members could only say cold, hot or search when directing them to find the fish with many distractions also in the pool. Another quicker game was the sonic ring run where there was a rope on the field and boys had to balance along the rope course and untie rings along the way before going on to compete the Pokémon shopping list game and finding Pokémon around the upper field. In the evening we played a highly competitive game of Wollyball which had some very questionable decision being made by the umpire. There were some new rules to the game this year, such as points being awarded if the ball goes out of

the field of play which seemed to light the fire in Josiah's belly as his competitive side shone through.

Thursday started with a game of 2nd Enfield Telephone, where we put our own twist on the classic game. Each member of the tent has a leg to run around the surrounding area of the field. The first person is given a bible passage which they must remember and pass on to the second member for their leg to the third and so on. Once the last member of the tent completes the final leg, they must write down the bible passage with the most accurate winning and then bonus points being scored for fastest overall time. Tent 1 did very well with this getting the most accurate write down and the fastest time run. After this it was lunch time before we had a down pour of rain. In a quick change of events, we played some in marquee games such as the shopping list memory game. Ummm... Can we play umbrella? By the evening the weather had cleared up a bit as we headed off to head-hunters the outdoor sniper laser guasar which was enjoyed by all. We played a free for all round followed by a couple rounds of lower the flag before playing zombies to finish off with!

Before we knew it, Friday had arrived, and camp was almost at a close. We started the morning with coasteering which involved rock climbing, swimming and cliff jumping along the coastline. This was a nice way to end the week with lots of the boys jumping from the tallest point, those that didn't opted for an impromptu geography lesson on coastal erosion landforms. After we finished coasteering we headed for a packed lunch at the near by harbour before the boys got ready to go to town in the afternoon whilst most of the pack up was being done at the campsite, the lorry was packed and by the end of the pack up there was barely enough room for a mini photocopier. We played a final few games of Wollyball to end the week before

walking down to Lee Bay beach for hot dogs as the sun went down and the moon came up over the horizon. We closed the night with a few camp songs and hot drinks in the marquee before going off to bed for the final sleep of camp.

On waking Saturday morning, we were met by rain until we left the site, all the tents were packed down and the marquee, cook house and washrooms were cleaned and tidied as camp was packed away for the year and we journeyed back to Bush Hill Park.

A few other things there which we contested at camp were tent and table inspection. It was the year of the novice TCs but they learnt quickly and vastly improved as the week went on. By the end of the week the tents had almost perfect symmetry. As usual there was no dishwasher, so the boys washed their dishes and lined them up for table inspection which was narrowly won at the end of the week by Tent 2, who saw off Tent 1's fightback and over took Tent 3 who got off to a strong start.

Now on to the food. What can be said other than the abundance of meals we ate. From porridge, bacon, egg and beans for breakfast to, lasagnes, chilli potatoes, curry, chicken, roast pork, and of course not to forget, plumb duff. The food was exceptional the whole week and always gave that boost of energy after a high-octane session.

The boys and staff thoroughly enjoyed camp and it was one of the best camps in times gone by.
