As mentioned in the previous newsletter, by September 2023, all state-funded, mainstream schools will be expected to provide a compulsory school week of 32.5 hours / 6.5 hours a day. Operation Encompass

The will continue to receive any notifications from Operation Encompass during the holiday.

Operation Encompass is an innovative project in which schools and nurseries in Gloucestershire are participating, and which is run in partnership with Gloucestershire County Council, Gloucestershire Safeguarding Children Partnership and Gloucestershire Police. Many other Local Authorities both nationally and locally have successfully implemented Operation Encompass.

Operation Encompass commenced on 4th March 2019 for schools and 14th December 2020 for nurseries and aims to support children and young people who are affected by domestic abuse. Witnessing or experiencing domestic abuse is really distressing for a child or young person, who often see the abuse, hear it from another room, see a parent's injuries or distress afterwards, or can be physically hurt by trying to stop the abuse.

As a result, following any domestic abuse incident being reported to the police, the police will contact the setting to share relevant, necessary and proportionate information to nominated setting staff. This will ensure that the setting is made aware at the earliest possible opportunity and can subsequently provide support to children in a way that means they feel safe and listened to.

Each setting has members of staff who have been fully trained in liaising with police and Children's Social Care when required, and will ensure that the necessary support is made available to the child or young person following the notification of a domestic abuse incident.

Message from GCC to Parents/ Carers

Since April 2022 many schools in Gloucestershire have welcomed children from Ukraine who have fled war with their families. The Homes for Ukraine scheme has allowed Gloucestershire households to share their homes while Ukrainians get settled in Gloucestershire.

The Homes for Ukraine team at the county council are urgently seeking follow-on placements for guests who have already been in the UK for 6 months to 1 year, and have not yet fully regained their independence.

Relocating to a new host can mean children need to change schools, leaving their friendships and disrupting their education. We can support Ukrainian children in our school community by helping them stay in the same area and attend the same school.

Please note that Gloucestershire County Council have locally increased all host payments to £600 per month, so lower figures published in the national guidance can be disregarded.

School Punctuality Reminder

School punctuality is also an area that will be a focus in the new academic year. Children being late for school has risen throughout the year.

The school day starts at 8.50am for all children. We expect children to arrive in good time to start the day therefore staff are on the playground and school door opens at 8.40am. Registers open when teaching begins at 8.50am and close at 9.00am. The register will be marked with an 'L' if a child is not present when the register is taken. Arrival after the close of registration will be marked with an unauthorised absence code 'U'.

Lateness

Poor punctuality is not acceptable. If your child misses the start of the day they can miss work and do not spend time with their class teacher getting vital information and news for the day. Late arriving pupils also disrupts lessons that have already started. Often this leads to the child feeling embarrassed or upset which in turn can lead to reluctance to coming to school. Being 10 minutes late every day throughout the academic year is the same as missing two weeks of school.

Arrival after registration without a reason acceptable to the school will be recorded with an unauthorised absence for the morning session and this will affect his/her attendance figure.

If children arrive late, they need to sign in so we know they are on site and we are able to check their dinner arrangements. If attendance, including lateness, is a problem, we will notify and work with the parents in the first instance. The registers are taken again at 1.15pm. It is recognised that there may be circumstances when a child may arrive late because of transport difficulties etc. In these instances, school should be informed as soon as possible.

If your child has a persistent late record you will be asked to meet with the Head Teacher or the Family Liaison to resolve the problem, but you can approach us at any time if you are having problems getting your child to school on time. See Lateness Letters 1, 2 and 3.

Absence Procedures

If a child is unfit for school; parents should contact the school by 9.00am on the first day, in person, by email or by telephone and repeat this each consecutive day until they return.

Absences will not be authorised without this procedure. It is school procedure to contact parents of children who are absent that have not notified school by 9.15am.

Uley School Uniform

All Year:

- Red Sweatshirt or cardigan with school logo
- Red polo shirt with/without logo
- Dark grey trousers, shorts, culottes, skirt or pinafore dress

- Grey, black, white or red tights/socks
- Sensible, practical and smart shoes/boots in black – no trainers or Crocs please
- Warm outdoor coat. Children should have a coat in school for break times during the whole of the Autumn and Spring terms.
- A change of clothes in case of accidents.

On warmer days:

- Red gingham dress
- Sensible summer sandals – black, red or white

Sandals

A polite reminder to ensure that the children wear sensible sandals – here are some examples. It is surprising how many trip and falls can be caused by poorly fitted sandals.



Jewellery, Hair Accessories, Make-up and Nail Varnish

- One pair of stud earrings and a watch may be worn for school. No other jewellery, including smart watches or other piercings are permitted.

- All jewellery must be removed by the child when participating in any physical education, so we encourage no jewellery at all on PE or swimming days. Please note: Teachers are not permitted to remove earrings.
- Hair bands, ribbons, bows or scrunchies should match the uniform. Hair bands should not have large flowers or other decorations attached.
- Hair that is shoulder length or longer must be tied back.
- Make up, nail varnish and artificial nails should not be worn to school. If a pupil is wearing these, they will be asked to remove them.
- No transfers or tattoos
- No crop tops - mid-drifts on display - school uniform or PE kit
