Many campers had tossed supper of wild bird seed (never feed wildfowl with bread), and the family were going back down to the water to swim home to their warm, cosy nest for the night. But the problem was that one of the cygnets couldn't move! We could see it trying to get to its feet in vain with an expression on its face which was shouting, "Help! Wait for me! I can't move!"

For nearly an hour and a half, the parents came back and forth, circling round to cajole and protect it from the cool wind. One other cygnet even came up beak to beak trying to encourage the injured cygnet to move. One parent with 5 offspring travelled to the water's edge, but the other parent would not follow and stayed with the suffering one. To leave would mean its certain death, not surviving the cold night wind and no doubt the predators which would be around. And yet to remain and protect the one would mean the remaining 5 would be at risk themselves, away from the safely positioned nest.

Eventually the inevitably sad decision was made around 9.30pm and the 2 adults entered the water with their 5 healthy offspring setting off for safety leaving the injured cygnet to its natural fate ...

As soon as they were gone, 3 humans swooped with warm towel, fresh water, bird seed and a telephone call to the local wildlife sanctuary, who came the next morning with transport to where it could receive medical help (the bird had broken its upper leg).

The Swans' no doubt, heavy hearted decision, was not the one made by the Shepherd in Jesus' story. He had 100 sheep to protect, but left the 99 to search for and rescue just one of his lost lambs. Jesus' parable gives the world a picture of His Love and the lengths that God will go to rescue just one human being who has lost touch with Him. Are you that one? One who needs to call out "Help! I need You to rescue me from the mess I've got into! God has promised to hear and come for anyone who calls on Him for Rescue. You might be in a dilemma whether to Trust God or not. Is He real, capable, willing? Am I worth His Care? ...

My answer to all those is a resounding YES!

If you don't believe me, try Him; honestly and humbly put God's Promise to the test. I've written this piece before the decision about Freedom Day is made. The government has a dilemma on when our holiday dilemmas would end concerning vacation or staycation. But those are nothing compared to the Dilemma Sorted, when one lost soul like you, decides to seek God for the Rescue so desperately needed. Have you sorted this dilemma yet?

Broadband for Wacton

Properties at the top end of Wacton Common and the edge of Great Moulton are now live with B4RN not for profit community fibre broadband and are experiencing the fastest rural broadband speeds in the world!

The community got together and looked at the various aspects of technical, financial and long-term exposure to select a rural broadband supplier, considering it was important to do the best for every member of the community.

First consideration was reliability, a major problem with the present broadband over the telephone network. The conclusion, if possible, considering the rural nature, was that the new glass fibre network must be underground with no part of the network running along any telephone poles.

B4RN met the criteria of a full underground fibre network to the property and were actively working to connect businesses along Frith Way under the Government Single Business Voucher Scheme. B4RN, being a community broadband supplier, use volunteers to assist in the establishment of the network and this has been the extremely interesting and fun part of the project, all working together for the common goal. It's been amazing to discover the skills, knowledge and ccamaraderie that is in our small rural area, with people from many local villages helping each other. B4RN have been community financed along with the Government voucher scheme and have built a considerable, robust broadband network to rural communities. Being financed this way and a not for profit Community Benefit society, means a lower end price for a top end service.

Most broadband suppliers have locked in contracts, throttle the speed and have a tiered charging structure - 30Mbps cost £X amount, 50Mbps costs £X plus £Y amount etc. even though the connection can run faster. B4RN simply supply the full speed of their connection transceiver, 1000Mbps for just £30 per month. Another plus is no long term multiyear locked in contracts, with B4RN the connection can be terminated with a months notice.

The B4RN network as installed could easily be expanded into Wacton and surrounding rural locations, all it takes is a little bit of willingness and work within the communities.

Men on Wacton's Roll of Honour

This month we look at:

EDWARD WILLIAM FREDERICK BROOKS Private 41914 The York and Lancaster Regiment Private G/52448 2nd Battalion Middlesex Regiment

Edward Brooks was the fourth child of Thomas and Jane Brooks of Wacton and born in 1892. Thomas may have been an employee of Denis Alexander and may have been living at what's now known as Brett's Manor on Wacton Common, then owned by AR Alexander of Hardwick Hall. The Brooks family subsequently moved to Grange Farm house by 1901, another of AR Alexander's properties, and farmed by Denis Alexander. In the register of electors for 1910 Thomas is successive Common Road to the Common, so it suggests he moved back to the Common, this time the last house on the left behind the big pond.

Edward was working as a yard man on a local farm before he signed up with the York and Lancaster Regiment and was soon sent to the front.

He was then transferred to the 2nd Battalion of the Middlesex Regiment that formed part of the 8th Division, and took part in the Third Battle of Ypres which began at 3.50 on 31st July 1917, and it would appear Edward was one of the first casualties.

He is buried at the Tyne Cot Cemetery which was established in Oct 1917, and after the war it was enlarged with 11,500 burials from smaller scattered burial sites and it looks as if Edward was one of these. His memorial gives only his initials E W F Brooks.

CALEB COLEMAN Private 23559 2nd Norfolk Regiment

Caleb was born in 1893 and was the first son of William and Ellen Eliza Coleman of Aslacton and moved with the family to Bunwell in 1911 for at the at time, aged 17, he was a clerk with the railway company. Their family then moved to the Croft at Wacton as from there he is shown as an absent voter NM in 1918 and 1919.

The only record of his service appears to be the medal card which does not show him receiving the 1915 Star so one must assume he entered the war at a later date.

It looks as if his parents had moved back to Aslacton by 1920 at which time Caleb married Catherine Wilson. I cannot find further information about Caleb.

CLARENCE COLEMAN Ordinary Seaman Z7078 Royal Naval Volunteer Reserves

Clarence was the youngest son of William and Ellen Eliza Coleman, he was born in 1900 at Steeple Road, Aslacton. By 1911 the family had moved to Bunwell but soon moved back to Aslacton from where in 1913 they moved to the Croft at the corner of Wash Lane, Wacton.

He enlisted on 2nd November 1917 into the Royal Naval Volunteer Reserves no Z 7078. After basic training he was posted to VictoryVI as an Ordinary Seaman on 7th January 1918. He was then moved to Halcyon as an 'O Tel' which I assume means he was in a telegraph or telecommunications post which he held through his serice on Pembroke I, and Pekin, before returning to Pembroke I in April 1919. These postings were on shore based establishments from where he was demobilised on 15th May 1919.

He does not appear to have returned to Wacton but married Nettie D Stimpson in the Depwade District in 1924. Clarence died in 1968.

It was just after 10am on a bright sunny day in Central London on Friday 9 July 1869 when a tall man wearing a black frock coat and carrying a top hat turned the handle and opened the door of 8 Church Street, Lambeth and entered.

His name was Thomas Bowman Stephenson and he was 29 years old. He was taking possession of the first of many Children's Homes. Earlier in the year two friends of Thomas Stephenson, Francis Horner and Alfred Mager, had shown Stephenson the plight of homeless children around Lambeth who were neglected, shoeless, ragged and miserable. Together they recognised that street children needed a safe home and within only a few months were successful in raising the funds to rent the Church Street property. Thus began this great children's charity, subsequently named the National Children's Home (NCH) which became Action for Children in 2008.

Thomas Stephenson was the son of a Methodist Preacher and was born in Newcastle in 1839. His childhood was a very loving but austere one as the family struggled financially. Thomas, unsurprisingly, followed his father into the Methodist Church and started his life as a Preacher at St Peter's Chapel in Lady Lane, Norwich.

Our founder is often seen as a middle-aged philanthropist and a typical Victorian gentleman however nothing could be further from the truth. Thomas was a charismatic personality - young, energetic and a real 'trendsetter'. He left Norwich and went north to Lancashire and it was here that his attention was first drawn to the welfare of children who were working in the cotton mills. He championed their cause, drawing attention to the poor and dangerous working conditions in the Mills. His preaching and new modern ideas attracted the attention of a chapel in London who 'head-hunted' him to help their struggling congregation. He developed an open-air service and with his fine baritone voice, his singing drew in large crowds. He was a young, dynamic man who had a clear vision of what needed to be done.

150 years later problems/hardships still exist for families and children in a similar way to Stephenson's pioneering project. We at Action For Children continue to support houses which accommodate and support homeless young people across the country. In Norfolk, AFC runs The Early Childhood & Family Service on behalf of Norfolk County Council, where we can provide professional 1-2-1 family support in the home or at our bases in Long Stratton and Diss. We also offer parenting classes, family learning, groups & sessions, information & signposting. Since COVID we have delivered a great online offer with Cook-a-longs and family activities and learning videos on our YouTube channel, App and social media sites.

It could'nt be simpler

Outline of our Village Past

William the Conqueror

Although our understanding of Saxon times is shadowy and purely conjectural, the picture suddenly springs to life with feudal society, barons and serfs, and all the evidence of vigorous, competent administration, when we come to the period after the Norman conquest. This is due to the Domesday Book.

In 1086 William the Conqueror sent out officers to conduct a scrupulous survey of land and population throughout England. The returns from all parts were considerably condensed in the final Domesday Book - except for the returns of East Anglia. These remain at their fullest length and therefore provide an unexpected windfall for the local historian of this area.

Earl of Richmond

All land in Stratton (the 'Long' had not yet become part of the name in the Domesday Book), was held from the King by five major tenants, Alan, Earl of Richmond, who held the major part, Isaac, William the Bishop, the Abbot of St Edmunnd and the manor of St Etheldreda of Pulham.

These major tenants in their turn let the land out to various lesser tenants in the stratification of feudal society - thirty freemen, 15.5 borders, nine sokemen and three villeins. Bordars and villeins alike held cottages and small parcels of land from their landlords, and in return were required to perform tasks for them from time to time on the land. Sokemen held a status left over from the Saxon feudalism of preconquest England, including the right to grind at certain mills.

Land Tax

Domesday Book records 549 acres of arable land and 14 acres of meadow in Stratton, 6.5 ploughs and seven tenths of a mill. The records also tell that the numbers of ploughs and mills were greater in the times of Edward the Confessor. The area of Stratton is two leagues and three furlongs by one league and four furlongs (a league was about two miles), and it was assessed at an annual charge of 2/1d towards the kings land tax, or 'geld'. The first inhabitant of Stratton known by name occurs in the Domesday Book. His name is Walter the Deacon.

Comparison with Depwade

Wacton had an area of 161 acres and 22.5 freemen, sokemen and boarders. The Village was assessed at 9d geld. Comparison with the other villages in the Depwade hundred shows that Stratton had the largest acreage of Depwade and is assessed the highest land tax. Our Norman ancestors demonstrate unmistakeably as we demonstrate, our common Roman inheritance. For it is round the site of the first human settlement, on the road from Colchester to Caister, that the highest concentration of population in Depwade was to be found in Norman times, and continues still to cluster today.

We carried on to the end of the track which emerged onto Frith Way; we thought we'd found an orchid, but it turned out to be the less appealing broomrape, a parasitic plant. We passed Willow Farm and Lost Lands Farm – surely a story here? – to enter a delightful woodland path full of dappled sunlight between the arching trees. I remembered an American visitor who'd said, "What I love about your country is your green tunnels". I always think of that in the summer when driving down a little road with trees either side with branches meeting in the middle. Do we always appreciate the quiet beauty of our own countryside as we dash around to see the wonders of the world? Halfway down this path, we turned off right along Narrowgate Way, a track through fields which took us back to Great Moulton. A final stroll down Hallowing Lane and we were back at the church. Many thanks to Ann for organising a lovely walk, roughly a large square with one (the first) very wiggly side. As ever, the wonderful mixture of healthy exercise, fresh air, and pleasant companionship made for a most enjoyable morning, and

if there is not as much detail here as you would have liked, it is because I'm afraid I was talking too much.
