Long Stratton Scouts join the campaign to recruit volunteers in Norfolk

Norfolk Scouts have launched the #GoodForYou campaign designed to recruit over 150 volunteers across the County to help young people to reconnect, support their wellbeing and develop their skills for life.

The 1st Long Stratton Scout Group provides fun and adventure for young people in our community and we are seeking volunteers from all walks-of-life to consider investing a bit of time to help out and gain some feel-good factor.

Scout volunteers will create opportunities for young people to recover from the impact of the pandemic by supporting their wellbeing and building the skills needed to succeed in life. Some of these will be working face-to-face with our young people, but there are also lots of flexible roles helping with fundraising, maintenance of facilities and helping make decisions.

Andrea, a volunteer with Long Stratton Beavers said:

"Volunteering with the Scouts is a fantastic way for me to learn new skills, enjoy the outdoors, teach young people about the things I know and most of all have fun. It's fulfilling to know I'm putting something back into our community. Scouting is such a worthwhile organisation and the young people learn life skills through adventure, confidence to try new challenges and develop respect for themselves and others."

Since the first lockdown, we have been providing online zoom sessions & supporting young people with at-home challenges & online camps. When restrictions allowed, we also got straight back into social-distanced activities to help our young people continue to enjoy the fun & adventure.

Currently, we are running all our sessions for young people aged from 6 years old upwards under the latest Government guidance. This has seen our younger sections enjoying games together & working towards their gardening badge. Meanwhile, our older sections have focussed on navigation skills allowing them to enjoy the summer evenings outdoors.

Brandon, a young person with Long Stratton Cubs said:

"I have learnt skills like what I need to make a fire, and have been able to use them at home to help mum light the wood-burner. I was nervous before I went on my first camp by myself but I had lots of fun, now I look forward to going on another one. My leaders are helpful and friendly, and if I need help I know I can ask them."

Edward, a young person with Long Stratton Scouts said:

"Scouts has helped me develop lots of new skills. In lockdown, the leaders kept us busy with lots of badge work. I enjoy Scouts as we do different activities every week."

Men on Wacton's Roll of Honour by Robert Maidstone

This month we look at three members of the Dye family

EDGAR EMMANUEL DYE

R/744 3rd Battalion Royal Naval Reserves

Edgar was the second son of George Ellis and Harriet, his birth was registered in the Depwade District in late 1886, presumably in Wacton but he was baptised in May at Hethersett, his mother's family home parish.

His father was a team man employed by Frank Snelling of the Wilderness, and Edgar, at 13, was already working on the that farm as well. By 1911 he had moved to Settrington in Yorkshire where he looked after the stock on the hill farms.

In December 1915 he joined the Army reserves R/744 and was called up 16th February 1917 Royal Naval Division 3rd Reserves Battalion as Ordinary Seaman. The Royal Naval Reserves were trained to supply seamen and by May 1917 he was classed Able Seaman, but the numbers of reserves exceeded the need and many were drafted into the Anson Battalion and retrained as fighting land based troops.

Edgar finished his retraining in early November and was sent to France, where whilst in Rouen he sprained his ankle in January 1918 and was invalided back to the UK. He returned to Calais in June 1918 and then sent to the fighting front.

On 21st August 1918 he was reported "missing" then on 5th October the regiment was notified he was a prisoner of War and being held at Kreigsgefangenenlagers Limburg an der Lahn (between Koblenz and Frankfurt).

He remained there until after the end of the war but on his release was admitted to the Wessex Field Ambulance with severe enteritis. He was then transferred through the 1st Australian Casualty Clearing Station and Etapes General Hospital to 1st London General Hospital at Camberwell arriving there on 27th December 1918.

Sadly his condition did not improve and by mid May he was dangerously ill. He died at 8.15pm on 28th May 1919 with tubercular peritonitis. His body was returned to Wacton and he was buried in the churchyard here. (324w)

JOHN HENRY DYE

241 Infantry Battalion

John Henry Dye was the younger brother of Edgar Emmanuel Dye and was born in Wacton in 1899. He would have left school in 1913 and presumably enlisted at 18.

As Dye is a common name I have not been able to identify a service number nor medal card for John, however the Wacton Roll of Honour says he was in the 241 Infantry battalion. This battalion was part of the 207th (2/1st East Midland) Infantry Brigade which in turn was under the 69th(2nd East Anglian) Division intended for home defence and training.

The 207th Brigade was based near Retford in Nottinghamshire . In April 1917 the troops camped out initially at Carburton Camp, then were billeted at Clipstone Camp overwinter then under canvas at Thorseby Camp in spring 1918.

He returned to Wacton after the war living on the Green with his parents. He died in 1953 aged 54 and is buried at Wacton (164w)

EDWARD JOHN DYE

Lance-Corporal L/11652 Middlesex Regiment

Edward John Dye appears to be the second son of Matilda Dye of Wacton Common. He was born in 1899 and he lived with his mother at his grandparent's house until Matilda married John Pidgeon in 1902.

In 1907 Edward enlisted in the Mddlesex Regiment at Mill Hill, London and by 1911 may have been abroad in Guadaloupe. Although his military records gives his name as Dyer he is readily identified as being from Wacton.

He had returned to Europe by August 1914 as he entered the war as Private L/11652 of the Middlesex regiment in France and by 1916 had been promoted to Lance-Corporal but sadly was killed in action on 2nd July 1916 and commemorated on the Thiepval Memorial Somme, France. His mother was then living at Mill House Wacton Common. (132w)

We are already into the middle of summer 2021 and 16 months into the Covid-19 pandemic. As I write this article, there is a sense of excitement as the 21st of June rapidly approaches. Will the U.K. be ready to embrace normal life again without restrictions? The apprehensive side in each of us is slightly worried and wants to be cautious and take each day as it comes. We want a safe and healthy country.

This month I look at DNA's – appointments marked 'Did Not Attend' in the practice. This has been a national problem for many years, and it costs the NHS immensely. A recent research article in the BJGP (British Journal of General Practice, March 2021) reviews this problem. NHS England has estimated that there are 7.2 million missed general practice appointments annually, at a cost of £216 million. Reducing these numbers will surely improve primary care efficiency. This study noted that DNA rates for Nurses and Pharmacists (community) are twice that of GP appointments. The difference being that GP appointments comprise more of 'reactive care' while nursing and healthcare appointments are 'planned or proactive care' for long term conditions. Both are important for the physical and mental wellbeing of the community.

A snapshot in our practice in the last 2 weeks of May 2021 showed 22 DNA'd appointments which comprised 14 GP appointments and 8 Nurse appointments, which equates to 140 minutes of GP time and 120 minutes of Nurse time. There are many reasons for DNA appointments. It can be quite frustrating for the practice as we desperately try to find appointments for patients within a reasonable time frame.

We look to you to help us find the best way of dealing with this problem. Suggestions are always welcome. We do remind you to cancel appointments that are no longer needed. We also encourage you to contact us when the time of an appointment becomes unsuitable for some reason. Every little helps.

Floods in Stratton



The beck is usually a little trickle of water that doesn't cause a problem, but in certain circumstances it flows like a torrent and sometimes overflows, flooding properties on the street. Long Stratton has been flooded several times before 2020.

This account of the 1912 flood was written by Mrs Janet Dunthorne in the bakery in the street (which

burnt down in 1941 and was later replaced by Stratton House).

She writes: 'I was married June 1912 and a large flood occured in August 26th 1912, the waters rushing down the garden from the beck, coming in the back door flooding the living room, surrounding the table and new furniture, which we had to pile up on the table. After raining all night it finally left off in the afternoon. It was many months before the place looked normal again'. This article was in the September 1973 edition of this magazine.

In January 1939, Stratton was flooded again. I have a newspaper article showing water pouring out of what is now Old Dairy Loke, which was beside the house that Janet Dunthorne lived in.

In March 1947 the E.D.P headline stated 'Road inundated at Long Stratton' showing a photo very similar to the one in the paper in 2020 of the plain. This flood was the result of melting snow. There had been lots of snow, roads were closed and villages cut off. The melting snow came off the fields into the beck and again Stratton was flooded. The photos show the plain and corner of Star Lane where there used to be a shop with flood water. The shop became Barclays Bank and is now flats. Long Stratton firemen used a trailer pump to pump the water away. My family lived in the street and my cousin told me we were put upstairs in my parent's bedroom as there was a fireplace there so we could keep warm. My Mum opened the back door and the front door and the water went straight through. The houses were clay lump and took ages to dry out.

The next flood was in 1968, again heavy rain for several days flooded the beck. My Mum again opened the back and front door to let the water go through. Once again in December 2020 Stratton was flooded and we are currently waiting the outcome of the investigation to find the cause of the flood.

Outline of our vIllage Past

Taking Shape

In the course of centuries, the Romans' influence in Britain began to wane. In A.D. 380 Saxon pirates began to attack the shores, and the forts of Brancaster and Burgh Castle were erected against them. By A.D. 450 the Roman soldiers had all been called home.

The pirates now swarmed into the unprotected island, their farming kinsfolk and their families not far behind. Axes began to ring as the forest was cleared along the Roman road, by people speaking in a foreign tongue and giving the Roman settlement of Stratum a new name, Estratuna, 'The town on the street by the water'.

Village Community

The Romans had never been one for villages. Townships and homesteads had been their way of life. The Anglo-Saxons were the first invaders who lived in villages, and their settlements have established the shape of the whole of rural England with unbroken continuity up to the present day. They found the Roman road, with its remnants of Roman occupation at Stratum. On either side of it they cleared the forest. They strung out two rows of log cabins facing each other along the street, and the two communal fields they had cleared behind, they shared out into fair portions of strips.

Sometime between A.D. 630-700 Christian missionaries brought the Gospel to the Anglo-Saxons of Stratuna, and a primitive church of logs and thatch was put up. In 865 began an invasion of a less peaceful nature - the landings of the Vikings and the Danes. Yet although the Vikings fought and killed the Anglo-Saxons mercilessly in key centres like Thetford, in more rural areas they seem to have been content to settle down side by side with the local population, peacefully occupying sites which were there still, and vacant, for example in Morningthorpe, Swainsthorpe and Ashwellthorpe.

Building Still Standing

All this has to be read in the shape of the countryside and the ground-plans and names of villages. Of the whole period from 400-1066, not a single archaeological discovery remains. On the other hand, above ground an extant building still in use does remain.

When the threat of Danish raids began to look severe, some of the farmers of Estratuna headed off into the forest westward. They came to a site where they knew there was a clearing and a spring beside a rising patch of ground. On the rising ground they built a tower. They called their new village 'Waketuna' - Watch Town - and, incorporated into All Saints church, that tower survives still today.

LOCAL WALKS

8th June 2021 Walk

This was our first group walk since the pandemic rules precluded car sharing. We agreed, however, that we have very much enjoyed and appreciated the variety of walks in a 360 degree radius from Long Stratton. But today, 8 of us in 3 cars drove to Shotesham. A sign on the Saxlingham road, indicating



Shotesham in 1 ¼ miles, took my carload on an adventurous circuitous route! We eventually met the others patiently waiting opposite the Globe pub. At first we thought that a waiter was laying tables, but then we noticed a paintbrush in his hand! We set off along a delightful woodland path on the Boudicca Way, leading to a wooden bridge across the stream, and out into undulating open farmland. The hot sun in a blue sky told us that summer had come at last.

We marvelled at meadows of wild flowers in profusion: buttercups, clover, yellow rattle, lesser knapweed, oxeye daisies and orchids, buzzing with bees and hoverflies. Over another bridge with a gnarled tree elbow, and a path to a pond with floating algae, damsel flies, and other aquatic insects rich in omega 3 for newly hatched nestlings (current Springwatch information).

Through a kissing gate, which proved a small challenge to avoid stepping in deep mud! Skirting Little Wood, we noted with pleasure that new hedging plants followed all the way on the other side of the path.

Two sleek contented cattle were resting at a gate. A buzzard in the blue sky was slowly circling, searching for prey.

The footpath turned left onto Market Lane, with banks and hedges a profusion of cow parsley, hogweed, elder in bud, and mature oaks with oak apple galls. There was speculation over a large 15cm hole in the bank below the hedgerow. Then a hawthorn and wild rose hedge festooned with gossamer webbing containing hundreds of small active caterpillars doing an excellent job demolishing the green leaves. A muck heap, a blaze of red poppies. and fumitory.

As we continued into The Street, we passed Trinity Hospital, noticed a swallow's nest



under the eaves, and admired the row of charming thatched cottages.

From the vantage point of the village sign, we looked up at the church on the hill.

Back to the Globe, where the tables were still being painted.

A glorious walk, and our thanks to Penny who led it.
