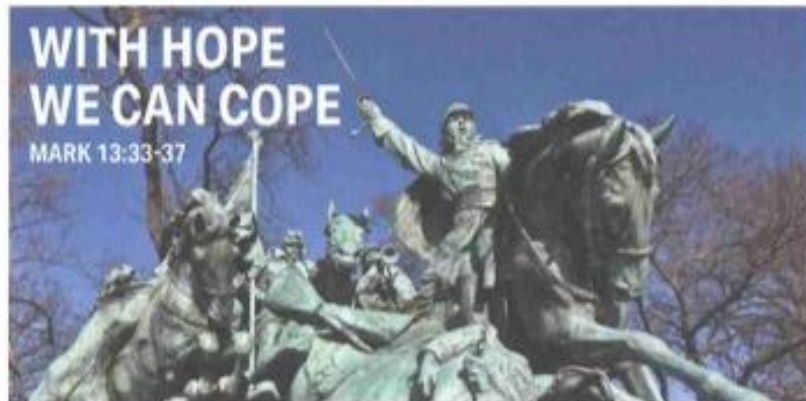

FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT

THE WORD

Year B • 3 December 2023 • Psalm Week 1



WITH HOPE WE CAN COPE

MARK 13:33-37

He was so broke he sold wood on St Louis street corners in order to feed his young family. Everyone looked on him as a failure. He had been kicked out of the army for drunkenness, he was given a farm by his new father-in-law but couldn't make the crops grow.

In the end, his brother took pity on him and gave him a job as a clerk in his leather goods shop. He wasn't even good at that. For the proud West Point graduate and Mexican War veteran, the future looked bleak.

Then, in 1861, civil war broke out in America. As an ex-soldier, he offered to help organise local volunteer regiments on the Union side. And immediately, having been given permission to proceed, the old soldier began to shine. He displayed extraordinary strategic and leadership skills. He moulded those local Illinois regiments into a glittering, fighting army. Soon he was put in charge of entire divisions, and won battle after battle. In 1864, President Abraham Lincoln appointed him commander of the entire Union army - a force of over a million men. One year later, the terrible civil war was over, the Union army had won.

Those who knew him of old were astonished by the change in Ulysses S. Grant. In just a few years, he had gone from certified failure to victorious Lt. General of the US army, the first man to achieve that rank since George Washington. In 1868 he was elected president of United States, serving two terms, the first president to serve two full terms in more than 30 years.

In less than a decade, Grant had gone from selling firewood to living in the White House. He had gone from zero to hero, from pitiable to idol. For Grant, shame had turned to fame. He had never lost hope, and it enabled him to accomplish extraordinary things.

The need to hold onto hope is what characterises the season of Advent. We are on edge. We are seeking reassurance. We long for peace, joy, security. We await Jesus' coming. We hope.

Hope is not only a great Christian virtue, it is an essential human requirement. For without hope, we are lost. Without hope, there is no point in going on. Without hope, we die. ■

DO

Make Advent a special time for your family. Light an Advent candle and spend some time together in prayer each day.

PRAY

Advent invites us to be both people of hope and bearers of hope. Pray for a deeper appreciation of the meaning of this season.

SAY

"Come, Lord Jesus, come fully into my heart and into my life. Fill me with your hope."

LEARN

Advent is the great season of hope. It reminds us that darkness does not have the last word, because into that darkness a light has come and is coming - Jesus, God-with-us, the light of the world.

Advent reminds us that God has heard the cry of God's people, and God responded to that cry by sending his Son as one like us to save us. Hope has taken shape in Jesus. Darkness has been destroyed.

REFLECT

Hope seems in short supply at the end of this year. We're worried about the future. What kind of world, with climate change and political unrest and the frightening advances in Artificial Intelligence, are we leaving to our children? Despite all our progress in science and technology, despite how sophisticated we have become, despite the gains we have made in human rights, our world seems as broken as in the past. Racism, populism and xenophobic fear-mongering are on the rise.

The season of Advent cautions against despair. It assures us that we are not alone. It urges us forward knowing that, with God on our side, we need not be afraid. Hope will overcome.

Writer Roy Scranton gave one of his books about climate change a gloomy title. He called it *We're Doomed, Now What?* But even though his analysis of the future sounds depressing, he refuses to let go of hope. He offers a good definition of hope. He links it with faith.

"For me, hope is always connected to faith because you don't hope that you'll go to work in the morning," Scranton said in an interview. "I don't hope I'll change my daughter's diaper, I just do those things. You hope for things that you don't have any control over. I do have a faith in human resilience and the human ability to adapt to difficult situations and still find ways to lead meaningful and rich lives."

Hope is trusting in God's promises while working to build God's Kingdom by putting into practice the Sermon on the Mount. Hope is about not looking away in the face of adversity, but facing it head on in the knowledge that God is with us.

That's what Advent is all about. And that's what we need to keep our focus on in the frenetic build-up to Christmas Day. Remember what we celebrate this season; remember what is far more important than decorations and presents and parties; remember why for us this isn't a mere secular feast, a handy excuse to eat and drink and max out our credit cards. This is the feast of our hope, the feast of God-with-us, and it offers a timeless template for how we must approach all life's challenges.

As Ulysses S. Grant knew, even when things seem at their bleakest, hope still beckons us on. ■

PRAYER AFTER COMMUNION

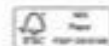
May these mysteries, O Lord,
