## **Covid-Safe Reminder**

We have been reminded by our bishops to keep our churches Covid-Safe by following the following guidance:

- Anyone displaying any symptoms of Covid-19 should stay at home and not travel to church or participate in person.
- Sanitise your hands when entering and leaving church.
- Face coverings (both nose and mouth) **should** be worn in church.
- Maintain good ventilation and air-flow throughout the building: because of cold weather, it is important to wrap up well in church!
- Please get vaccinated and have the booster jab when available to you.
- People engaged in pastoral ministry which involves visiting the housebound, sick and vulnerable, should take regular lateral flow tests to ensure they are safe to do so. These are free from the NHS.

There is now very strong evidence to support that the main mode of transmission is through breath and nasal aerosols, and that the risk from surface and touch transmission is very small indeed. As such, the strict regimes of church cleaning that were recommended at the beginning of the opening of churches for public worship are no longer necessary. General church cleaning is sufficient.

If these guidance points are supported, then our churches will continue to be safe places for people to gather for acts of public worship, including over the Christmas period.

## Feast/Memorial Days this week

**St Peter Canisius 1521-1597 21 Dec** Peter was born at Nijmegen (Netherlands) and died in Fribourg on this day. He was a Jesuit priest who spent his time writing and teaching in universities and colleges. Together with his easily understood preaching and the writing of famous catechisms, his academic life enabled him to restore and strengthen Catholic belief in response to Reformation. He is remembered for his use of the press in promoting the Catholic revival after the Council of Trent.

**St John of Kanty 1390-1473 23 Dec** Born in Kanty (Poland), John died in Cracow. Ordained a priest, he taught philosophy, theology, and scripture at Crocow University. John urged his students to be moderate for in controversy. He is remembered for his excellent reaching, for his personal austerity and generous almsgiving.

THE WORD

Year C • Psalter Week 4

The first two chapters of the Gospel of Luke are a highly artistically constructed series of five scenes (this excludes the later one of the finding of the child Jesus in the Temple) and the central event is the meeting of Mary and Elizabeth, both pregnant, with Jesus and John the Baptist respectively.

The reason for Mary's visit to her cousin is not, as often supposed, out of concern for her welfare or an act of kindness or charity, but rather is part of the stereotyped account of the annunciation of the birth of a significant person in the divine plan. The final and sixth element in the narrative is the giving of a sign. In this context, the sign is the confirmation of the divine or angelic word: it is an assurance that the person receiving the message has not dreamed or imagined it. Thus, Elizabeth's being pregnant is the sign to Mary that Gabriel's communication was genuine. Mary's visit is to confirm that she has understood correctly her experience with God's messenger. This is the only scene in which the two mothers meet: the unborn John the Baptist gives testimony to the arrival of the child Jesus, just as later he will proclaim the coming of the Messiah. Elizabeth hails the arrival of "the mother of my Lord" and her words have passed into the Christian tradition as part of the most common and popular prayer to Mary.

## REFLECT

he scene of the visitation is the central occasion of Luke's Infancy Narrative, the first two chapters of his Gospel. It brings together the two mothers, Elizabeth and Mary, and their unborn children, John and Jesus. After this, they diverge and we are given the accounts of the birth of the two children. Always, Luke presents Jesus as superior to the Baptist. Elizabeth is cast in the mould of the mothers of important figures in Jewish tradition who are unable, for some unspecified reason, to conceive naturally, but by divine intervention are able eventually to give birth. Mary's virginal conception is of a different order: this to insist that Jesus is the Son of God and has no human father.

It is important to remember that the Gospels are theological documents: they are expressions of faith. While we might be inclined to see events such as the visitation in terms of human sympathy, there is much more at work, much more depth to figures such as Elizabeth and Mary than a surface reading of the text might suggest.

It is worth reflecting on Elizabeth's final words to Mary: "Blessed is she who believed that the promise made her by the Lord would be fulfilled." In the Bible, the verb "to believe" can be understood as "to trust". Perhaps if we thought more about trusting God rather than simply believing in God, we might be closer to the attitude of Mary and Elizabeth and to that of Joseph and Zechariah. Luke is always emphasising the need to listen to the word.

### DC

Set out the figure of the shepherd from your crib set: reflect during the week on how seemingly ordinary people received news of the birth of the Messiah rather than official and educated individuals.



## LEARN

The point of Mary's visit to Elizabeth is to confirm Gabriel's message at the annunciation.

In biblical annunciation narratives, a sign is always given to assure the recipient that they have not imagined or dreamed their experience.

People who demand signs as proof are condemned: this is not the same as individuals, such as Mary, checking out signs that they have been given by the divine messenger.

### SAY

Hail, Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with you. Blessed are you among women. (see Luke 1:28. 42)

just as I was commanded in the scroll of the book,

"God, here I am! I am coming to obey your will."

Notice that he says first: You did not want what the Law lays down as the things to be offered, that is: the sacrifices, the oblations, the holocausts and the sacrifices for sin, and you took no pleasure in them; and then he says: Here I am! I am coming to obey your will. He is abolishing the first sort to replace it with the second. And this will was for us to be made holy by the offering of his body made once and for all by Jesus Christ.
