Whilst being a Committee Member of our "Friends" Ann managed to hold down a very responsible job as an Adult Social Worker and at one stage was also church warden at St. James Silsden . She was also an active "Friend" of Parcevall Hall.

Ann was a Member of our "Friends" for many years and a valuable member of your committee until she became ill. Even then would have continued had she been able to drive. She was also always very generous and helpful when there was any catering to do. The Trips she organised were done very efficiently, and without fuss. Every person received a handout of where we were visiting. The Parish visits Ann was involved in were equally well organised.

Ann and I were lucky enough to be involved in a "Friends" Conference for Cathedrals and Greater Churches in Blackburn. She was a lovely

companion, and very instrumental in promoting all that small Cathedrals had to offer. Other Conference delegates were quite impressed.

Many Friends beside myself are absolutely in awe of how Ann kept her "pecker" up through such a long illness, and bravely continued to still do the things she loved doing. She will be much missed by all who knew her, and who benefited from her love and prayers. A lovely lady!



#### **Leslie Bentley**

There is I'm afraid, sadly another passing away to report. Leslie was a valued members of the "Friends" for many years, and before his health started to be a problem he and Joyce (now sadly also no longer with us) could always be relied upon to support us at any of our events.

Ever the Gentleman, on parish visits he was always on hand to help collect the lunch money from everyone in order to pay a restaurant bill. He and Joyce will always be remembered by the "Friends" as being particularly good company at these events.

He was an all round sportsman, but was particularly passionate about rugby. and liked telling you about a good match. He was a member of Bradford RUFC where he became captain, and was known as "Legs" Bentley, so nicknamed because he could run 100 yards in 10 seconds. When speaking to him on the phone once he told me because of health issues he missed coming on our trips and attending events at the Cathedral. He was equally missed by us, and will be remembered for being the perfect gentleman and not least for the permanent twinkle in his eye.

Eighteen members of the Friends gathered on the Settle-Carlisle train in lovely sunshine. We had a group of seats and were joined at Settle by a keen and knowledgeable guide from the Friends of the Settle-Carlisle Line. Without being intrusive or over-stated, he distributed some leaflets - and kept us regaled with anecdotes, facts and features of our journey.

On arrival in Carlisle, we made our easy way to the Cathedral, where we were warmly welcomed by a number of people who were all expecting us and who put themselves about to make sure our visit went well.

#### Extra seating needed!

We joined a celebration of the Eucharist in the very truncated Nave. It seems extraordinary to note that the arrival of our group meant they had to



provide extra seating! That's because the ancient nave was was demolished during the Civil War by the Scottish Presbyterian Army so they could use the stone to reinforce Carlisle Castle. What's left is now a Regimental Chapel.

Lunch was taken in the delightful Prior's Kitchen and we were then treated to an excellent tour of the Cathedral by a most knowledgeable guide.





There was a wonderful carved triptych where we had a privileged close-up look



The main space in the cathedral is the splendid choir, with its stunning barrel-vaulted ceiling, intricate east window with its mediaeval glass and ancient carved misericords.




A couple of hours to do our own thing in Carlisle - and then back onto the train for a (somewhat somnolent!) trip back to Yorkshire.
