1. Christmas starts on the 1 <sup>st</sup> December

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<b>Some more information</b>	<b>Your answer should have been:</b>
1. Christmas starts on the 25 <sup>th</sup> December, Christmas day. The preparation starts four Sundays before Christmas. This period of time is called Advent.	<b>False</b>
2. Jesus was born into a Jewish family and brought up as a Jew in the areas now known as Palestine and Israel.	<b>True</b>
3. Mary was Jesus' mother, but Christians believe that God is Jesus's Father. That Mary conceived a child by the grace of the Holy Spirit. Joseph however brought Jesus up as one of his own children.	<b>False</b>
4. According to Matthew's Gospel, Shepherds visited the baby Jesus in a stable; they were unable to keep the Jewish laws because of their occupation, so were outcasts. They recognise Jesus as special, sent by God and this is symbolic of the fact that being able to follow rituals is not important, belief is and that God cares for everyone no matter how poor.	<b>True</b>
5. Luke's Gospel tells us that once Jesus and Mary and Joseph were settled in a house in Bethlehem, SOME, wise men visited the baby Jesus bringing gifts. Three gifts are named, hence the tradition (in some countries) of three kings, representing Jesus coming for the whole world.	<b>False (or at least unclear!)</b>
6. Jesus' name was not Jesus (not a trick question, think about it). The languages Jesus grew up with were Hebrew and Aramaic; his name was Jeshua or Yeshua; Jesus is the Greek translation of this name.	<b>True</b>

<p>Victorian, secular tradition in the UK. Lights are used to symbolise light overcoming darkness and Christians often deck their trees with lights to symbolise Jesus as the 'Light of the World'.</p>
