



The next issue will appear on Sunday November 1. Material for inclusion should please be emailed to the Editor on pbrune@olcs.net by October 20.




COMMENT

Looking Out and Looking In.

On a holiday in North Wales in June we were looking out at the screeching seagulls who dominate Llandudno bay, with its distant view of the Great Orme Head, mentioned in weather forecasts; the nosey seagull, looking us in the eye, searching for food, was separated from us, but with a dynamic that held us briefly together. A time then to laugh and enjoy the moment. Nothing wrong, now and then, however, in finding the time also to look in at ourselves, similarly searching for sustenance; and also seeking honesty with ourselves, not hiding behind that pane of glass.

Teresa of Avila (whose saint's day is October 15) was an expert in "looking in." She was fed by contemplative prayer, what she described as " a close sharing between friends; it





And the consequence of this dialogue with oneself and with the Divine is, of course, being fortified to get to the other side of that glass, to look out at and to respond to some of the screeching and hunger which is going on out there. For many of us, the "looking out" is an undramatic call to stay loyal to our present commitments and loves, staying perhaps unobserved, even unto death. For some it could be more vigorous involvement with the current debate about "push back", the demand by some for our borders, our windows, to be closed against refugees who are spending their all on illegal and dangerous Channel crossings.

Others might choose to legally "open up the window", by joining Martin Tett and the County Council* in his Helping Hand for Afghanistan Refugees initiative, part of a Gov-

ernment sponsored plan to integrate Afghan families into our communities. There is an ongoing need for skills, accommodation and, of course, money. Quite a challenge. So, whatever our response. thank you, Mr Nosey Beak, for your attempted visit. I'm glad we kept you out, but let us pray instead for the wisdom to know the right way to act towards all who do need the window to be open and a welcome from us.

Anniversaries

DANTE

The great Italian poet died in 1321

Dante was one of the greatest of European poets, standing along-side Shakespeare and Goethe, and he was in effect the inventor of the Italian literary language. He was the first Italian poet to decide to write in the vernacular, rather than Latin, but at the time there was no one Italian language, just a series of local dialects. Dante developed a language based on

the Tuscan dialect but incorporating words and phrases from other dialects. His was the language used later by Boccaccio and Petrarch and is the foundation of modern Italian. He was also the first to use the challenging poetic form known as Terza Rima. This consists of three-line

stanzas, with the first and third lines rhyming with the second line of the previous verse. The final stanza consists of one or two lines, rhyming with the second line of the previous verse.

His most famous work is The Divine Comedy, profoundly theological epic poem, possibly more read about than nowaread days. It describes journey from Hell, via Purgatory Paradise, guided by the Latin epic poet Virail through the

first two and then, in Paradise, by Beatrice. In Purgatory he "must be disabused of harmful values that somehow prevent him from rising above his fallen world" (in the words of the Encyclopaedia Britannica). His meetings with some of the characters in Hell, including the "virtuous pagans" and several scandalous Popes are among the most dramatic episodes in the poem.

It was from Virgil that Dante borrowed the concept of the epic poem. Virgil wrote about Aeneas, expelled from Troy and seeking another city, eventually founding the city of Rome. Dante had been expelled from Florence and was seeking another city, in his case a heavenly one. when Dante travels on to Paradise he has to part company with Virgil and Beatrice takes over as his guide. Paradise gives expression to those figures from the past who seem to defy death. Their historical impact continues and the totality of their commitment inspires in their followers a feeling of exaltation and a desire for identification" (Encyclopaedia Britannica). At the heart of the poem is a philosophy of love.

WB Yeats called Dante "the chief imagination of Christendom". Like Shakespeare, he created universal types from historical characters. The Divine Comedy remains one of the most profound expressions of our earthly pilgrimage "The poem," as Christians. comments the Encyclopaedia Britannica, "amazes by its array of learning, its penetrating and comprehensive analysis of contemporary problems, and its inventiveness of language and imagery."


