Quiz Trail in Cheadle Hulme

Start and finish at St Andrews on Cheadle Road

Distance: 2.25 miles, 3.6Km

Time: Approximately 60-75 minutes at a steady pace

The car park behind the church has free parking available.

The route is mostly pushchair-friendly: at one point the path is a little narrow and bumpy; at another there are 3 steps.

Safety tips: Take care when crossing roads and use pedestrian crossings when available.

Enjoy the fun facts to do with what you are seeing, and the suggested activities while you walk..

Activity: If you had to choose a motto for your family, what would it be?

From St Andrew's (exiting the car park at the front) turn right along Cheadle Road, and you will soon come to the Kenilworth Arms. Look at the shield on their name board.

Q1. What is their motto?

Continue past the shops and turn first right into Maple Avenue. Pass through Maple Avenue Park, leaving the play area on your right, then turn left up Cheviot Avenue. When you get to Turves Road, cross it carefully to take a footpath immediately opposite. Follow this round until you come out on Cherry Tree Road. Turn right and then first left: this is another 'tree' road:

Fun fact: in Latin, this means 'striving'. Not to be confused with a very similar word (think of a game, add an 'N', and that word in Japanese means, 'leave luck to heaven!'). We don't know why this is the motto on the pub – it is not the motto of either the former owners of Kenilworth Castle (the Nevilles: their motto was NE VILE VILES which means 'nothing distasteful or vulgar') nor of Kenilworth Town (theirs dates from 1966 and is CIVES OPPIDI FUNDAMENTA, which means 'Citizens are the foundation of a town')

Q2. What tree is the road named after? _ _ _ _ _

Follow this round the corner then turn left into Nursery Road. At the bottom you come to the railway and Heathbank Road; turn right alongside the railway. You will walk past Greenbank Preparatory School, where they have a notice about parking.

Activity see how many trees you can think of - perhaps try to name one for each letter of the alphabet, or 5 starting with A

Q3. Where do they say you shouldn't park? _ _ / / _ _ _ _ _ / _ _ _ _ _ /

Activity: talk about what groups you belong to. Do you belong to them because you live somewhere, or from birth, or because you choose to?

At the cross-roads soon after the school, cross Highfield Road first and then Heathbank Road to go under the Railway on the footpath of Claremont Road. Walk up Claremont Road past Cheadle Hulme School.

Q4. What is their motto?

Fun fact: before you crossed Heathbank road on that corner you were back in St Andrew's parish, which you left when you crossed Turves Road. Everywhere in England is in a 'parish' – which means that there is a Church of England church who would have to read out notices (called 'banns') if you wanted to get married in a C of E church. They would also be your first point of call if you wanted to have a C of E baptism ('christening').

Fun fact: This means 'in the place of parents'

Activity: discuss in what ways you think schools act as parents?

When you reach Hulme Hall Road, turn left. Across the road, the site of Hulme Hall Grammar School is now being developed as housing.

Q5. What is the name of the development?

On your left as you walk past the housing development there is a little road which is the only 'STREET' in Cheadle Hulme!

Q6. What is it called?

PTO for the fun fact about someone who was born in this street!

Fun fact: In one of these houses was born Joshua Brookes, the son of a cobbler. He was described in a novel published in 1876 by the British writer Isabella Banks called 'The Manchester Man'. The story follows the life of a Manchester resident, Jabez Clegg, during the nineteenth century and his rise to prosperity in the booming industrial city. As an orphaned child he was rescued by a tanner and his daughter from the River Irk during a storm. Simon, the tanner learns that the child's family did not survive the flood and Bess, his daughter, decides to foster the child herself. They christen him Jabez Clegg and he is educated as a Blue Coat Boy at Chetham's Hospital School under the supervision of clergyman Joshua Brookes. Jabez meets the wealthy Laurence Aspinall, who is to be a rival for the rest of his life. Meanwhile, Bess is longing for the return of her lover, Tom Hulme, who is fighting in the Napoleonic wars. On his return, he sees Bess with Jabez and assumes that she has forgotten about him and remarried... 'The Manchester Man' is remarkable for its historical detail. It contains vivid accounts of early 19th century textiles and fashions, historical characters, and historical events including the Peterloo massacre and the sinking of the Emma, based on unpublished eye-witness accounts. The novel includes appendices in which the author tells which parts were historical and which she made up.

Activity: If you were to write a novel set in today's time, what people and events would you like to include in your story?

As you come round the corner and pass Hulme Hall on your left, you should cross the road when it is safe, but continue to walk in the same direction along it. On your right you will pass the second-oldest pub in Cheadle Hulme.

Q7. What is it's name? /

Fun fact: On the opposite side of the road from the Hesketh is where Cheadle [Hulme] station was until 1846, when the new line to Stoke meant that the station was moved to its current position.

Activity: in this section of your walk you will go alongside the railway. Count how many trains go past while you walk – and also see how many different animals and birds you see!

Fun fact: This Waitrose site was the first purpose-built retail outlet in northern England.

Follow the main road round, crossing Swann lane carefully, and go under the railway bridge. Immediately take the footpath alongside the railway on your right; there are 3 steps up. You emerge at the far end beside Waitrose.

Q8. What is the name of the butcher's shop across the road, established in 1869, which on a sign advertises 'Nationwide delivery'?

Turn left along Station Road. After passing the shopping precinct, use the pedestrian crossings to go straight across the junction into Queen's Road. At this junction the road which we crossed to our left earlier was called 'Turves Road'. At this point to the right it becomes 'Ladybridge Road'.

Q.9 What is its name to the left at this point? /

Q.10 The name of the building on your left refers to 'Christ'. What is the name of the person we know as 'Christ'?

Activity: talk about things you believe but perhaps can't prove, eg. What is the wind and how you know the wind is blowing? What makes something a particular colour? (have you seen that picture of the dress: is it black & blue or white & gold?)

Fun fact: 'Christian Science' is not the same as 'Christians who are Scientists'. You can look up eg. on Wikipedia the beliefs of this particular organisation and find out how they differ from those of Christian churches like St Andrew's.

Continue along Queen's Road until you get to Buckingham Road. The school here was formed in September 2015 by combining Orrishmere School and Queen's Road School.

Q11. What is it called now?

Fun fact: This is the name of one of the Royal palaces.

Turn left along Buckingham Road.

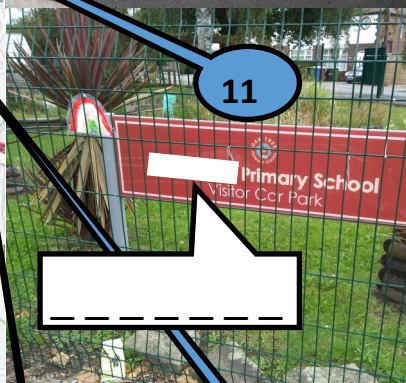
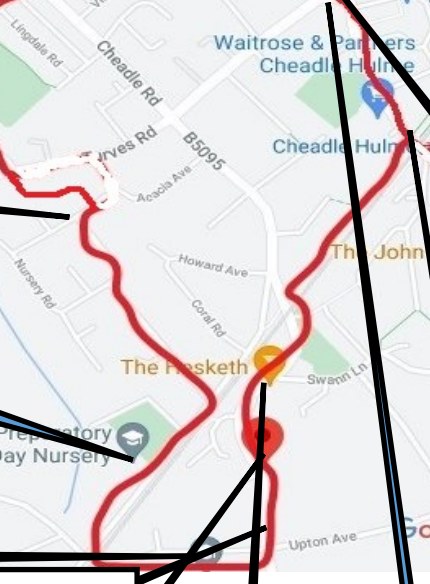
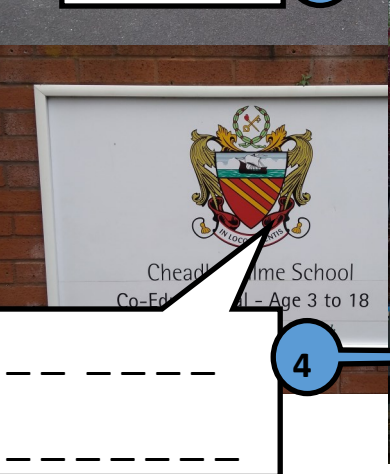
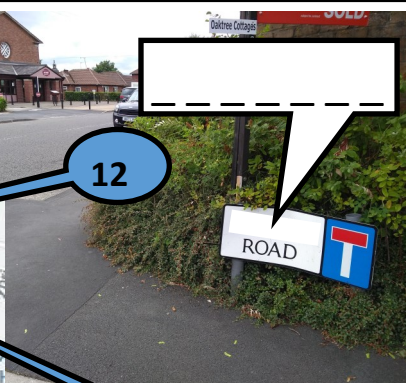
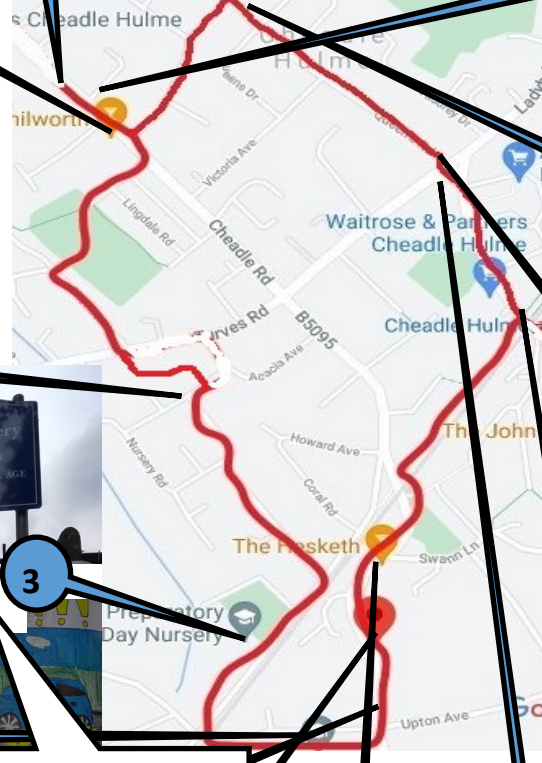
