

# THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

## May 2022

Although it was tiny, the little bathroom just off the back kitchen in the first house I knew, had great acoustics. I realised this at the very early age of 3 or 4, when on bath nights when my Dad scrubbed me clean he would teach me many songs ... everything from the Blaydon Races to Methodist hymns.

One hymn that we sang, which was from the old Methodist Hymn Book, which is rarely sung now ...

“Thou shepherd of Israel and mine; thou joy and desire of my heart  
For closer communion I pine, I long to reside where thou art ...”

I remember too how for the rest of the hymn Dad would make up silly rhymes about how you should not ought-a ~ drink soapy water ... and we'd dissolve into giggles, but my Mam would go mad, shouting to us that it was sacrilege, and that Charles Wesley would turn in his grave.

At the time I did not know what on earth she meant, I just knew that then and ever since when I remember that hymn it makes me smile.

Throughout our hymns and of course the Bible, there are many references to shepherds, Jesus referred to himself as the good shepherd, saying “**I am the good shepherd.**” In so doing he was offering to care for people if they would accept it asking that they would follow him and his style of life and love. This was not an unthinking following, but to take on his characteristics – be part of his kingdom of love and to be part of fixing that which is wrong and offering a loving positive substitute.

The world needs fixers, and we are called to be the world's fixers, restoring goodness and love to places and people where it is needed.

Near the village where we once lived there was a small farm, and the family who worked it came to our church. On my visits there I used to bump into one of the workers who everyone knew as Phil the Fixer. For when he was not tending the cattle or the sheep you could find him mending or making anything for use on the farm. Above the door of his workshop was nailed a scrap piece of wood painted with the words **Tikkum Olam**. When I asked him what they meant, he told me with a twinkle that they were the only foreign words he knew; they were Hebrew for ‘Repairing the World.’

When Jesus said, “**I am the good shepherd**” he was building on the O.T. theme and picturesquely putting forward the fact that trust in him was the gateway to being connected with the divine and to be part of offering that restorative and repairing love.

As another hymn puts it

*May the mind of Christ my Saviour  
Live in me from day to day  
By his love and power controlling  
All I do or say*

*May I run the race before me  
Strong and brave to face the foe  
Looking only unto Jesus  
As I onward go.*





## St Alban's Book Club



Spring 2022 has not been without its difficulties for us to meet in person, due to Covid, yet again! Thank goodness for technology.

## Take a walk on the wild side!

How neat do we like our gardens to be? Full of manicured lawns, with immaculate flower beds?

Well, yes and no. A recent survey by BBC's Gardener's World magazine has found that more than half (54 per cent) of gardeners now include 'uncultivated areas' in their garden. And some 44 per cent of gardeners have also set up a wildflower area.

Certainly, Nature could use a helping hand just now. In 2019, 32 per cent of us saw a butterfly in our garden. By 2020 that was down to 21 percent. By 2021, that was down again, to just 16 per cent.

Simple tips to rewild your garden:

- \* Avoid chemical pesticides and herbicides, which also kill 'good bugs', butterflies and bees.
- \* Tolerate as much mess as you can. Leave wood and leaf piles for hedgehogs and invertebrates.
- \* Set aside some room where grass can grow longer, and wildflowers can bloom.
- \* Don't pull up all your weeds – they can be a critical source of pollen for bees.



## Walking Group



The organ is regarded as one of the finest in the Newcastle area, and the organists will include Joseph Beech of Durham Cathedral, Michael Haynes of Hexham Abbey, Henry Wallace of Greyfriars, Edinburgh, and Oliver Waterer of Selby Abbey. St George's is a remarkable building, not easily classified because Charles Mitchell, a local shipbuilder, commissioned it and appointed his shipyard

architect, Thomas Ralph Spence, to design and build it. His inclusion of a variety of architectural styles has to be unique.

## Out and about on the roads? Remember the NEW Highway Code

When did you last read the Highway Code? Various ‘fundamental’ changes were recently made which will surely affect you.


For example, there is a new hierarchy of road users, where drivers now have new responsibilities to watch out for people who are walking, cycling, or riding a horse.

Another example is that cyclists are now advised to cycle in the *centre* of lanes in slower-moving traffic.

Finally, do you even know how best to open your car door? According to the Highway Code, you should use your hand on the opposite side to the door you are opening; for example, use your left hand to open a door on your right-hand side. This will make you turn your head to look over your shoulder. You are then more likely to avoid causing injury to cyclists or motorcyclists passing you on the road, or to people on the pavement.

## DANDELIONS?

On holiday one year, I was fascinated by this small, colourful flowering plant a bit like an exotic dandelion that I saw growing wild in all sorts of places. What a waste for this plant with its attractive dark leaves and bright yellow flower to be sticking out of cracks in walls; living on the rubble of building suites and surviving in the crevices between paving stones. So, before we returned home, I took out my penknife and carefully dug up a healthy specimen.

I then washed all the dirt from its roots and wrapped them in damp tissue paper. Then I put the whole plant in a sealed polythene bag and brought it home.

Almost as soon as we returned, I took a clean plant pot, filled it with good potting compost and planted my holiday trophy in it. I kept the plant on the kitchen windowsill and looked after it royally - watering it and talking to it at regular intervals.

However, I am sad to report that as the days passed the plant looked increasingly distressed and eventually curled up and died. What a cheek – after all I had done for it!

I never even considered that the plant was designed to blossom where it had been originally planted. It had the skill; the ability; the local knowledge. And do you know what? When I came home, wherever I looked - in the street and in local gardens, there were local dandelions blossoming everywhere.

As you know, life is not perfect, and never has been, even a quick scan of the news tells us that. Yet the good news is that the vast majority of people are designed to flourish in the circumstances where they are planted. It's not easy and sometimes it is not fair, but nonetheless it is a fact. Blossom where you are.

Among the advice on many plants, my old Percy Thrower gardening book gives encouragement to cultivate dandelions! He says as well as being a good source of vitamin C, they are known for reducing stress and giving cheer. Let me try to be a local dandelion any day.
