#### The Rector's letter

Dear friends,

# The Crystal Ball

Music for June 2022

he first Sunday of June this year is what I still call Whitsunday, the feast of the Holy Spirit, for which we shall sing John Rutter's setting of the RSCM motto, *I will sing with the spirit*; but before that happens, for reasons upon which I need not elaborate, Her Majesty's representative and other dignitaries will enter the church at the beginning of our Sung Eucharist to the strains of Handel's *Zadok the Priest*. Make the most of it, as it's not likely to happen again . . .

But even before that, we have been doing our civic duty on the previous Thursday evening, as we performed the Commonwealth Song *A life lived with grace* and the anthem *In our service* on Tod's Piece at the lighting of the celebratory beacon; a bit of a change from our usual performing conditions, but this is a very special occasion.

Whitsunday, of course, is followed by Trinity Sunday (and all the Sundays after – not 'of' – Trinity), when we shall give another performance of Purcell's verse anthem *O God*, thou art my God, first heard at Choral Evensong in February this year. The setting of these verses from Psalm 63 is typical of Purcell's very individual harmonic language, and there is much to enjoy in the interplay of full choir and groups of solo singers; but the piece is still best known for the final Hallelujah, which has given us the majestic hymn-tune known as 'Westminster Abbey'.

Another great master of the English tradition, William Byrd, provides our anthem on 19 June: his tender setting of *Ave verum corpus* never ceases to give pleasure however often it may be sung.

Which brings me, finally, to this month's Choral Evensong on 26 June, which will double as a patronal festival celebration. For the introit, we have Bruckner's *multum in parvo* motet *Locus iste*, which packs an enormous amount of musical energy into its two pages; for the anthem, we have John Joubert's powerful setting of the anonymous Tudor text *O Lorde, the maker of al thinge*, which still startles with its originality some seventy years after it first appeared; the canticles will be sung to the familiar and well-loved setting in B minor by T. Tertius Noble. The joker in the pack, as it were, is a new set of responses specially written (by request) for our choir by Succentor wearing his composer's hat. Our singers have (so far) reacted favourably to this set; I hope our Evensong congregation will agree.

#### **Rector's Review 2021**

Before I start my review of 2021, I would like to just say a huge thank-you to all who kept things going during my recent absences, especially Debbie, Jenny and Peter, as well as our Church Warden and Deputies.

2021 started in a slightly strange way, as Covid-19 cases had begun to rise again after Christmas. We managed to celebrate Epiphany and the Baptism of Christ before we found ourselves back to online worship. On Monday 11<sup>th</sup> January the PCC, following the Bishop's advice, decided to close the Church due to increasing infections, and to continue with online and phone services. Our aim was, and has been all along, to keep our congregation members as safe as possible until the vaccination process made us all a little less vulnerable. It was a real celebration to be able to open our Church again at the beginning of Holy week and to introduce services to lead us up to a celebration of Easter. This was not our usual fayre but did give us space for reflection all together. Easter Day was celebrated in Church by 70 communicants, even if in a quieter way than we would have liked.

During the summer Term, Debbie and a team took Happiness Investigators into Uppingham CofE Primary School as an after-school club. This was a way of encouraging some of the children in looking at what makes us happy and how we can help keep our mental health strong. It was good to be back in school and engaging with the young people. I was delighted to be invited to take part in the school Leavers event and to present each of the year 6 pupils with a Bible from their Church.

In June, Debbie was Ordained Priest in Peterborough Cathedral. Sadly, numbers in the Cathedral were limited, so we had to reserve our Benefice celebrations until her first celebration of Communion. Debbie celebrated for the first time at our joint Patronal Festivals on the following Tuesday evening, when we were delighted to welcome Richard Stainer, the Vicar of her sending Church, to be our preacher. It was a lovely evening as we celebrated this very special occasion with Debbie and her family. We were also pleased to be able to present Debbie with a Communion set for ministering to the sick and housebound.

During the summer, once again, the Church took part in the Social Sunday initiative in the Market Place. My thanks have to go to Nicky and all the team who worked so hard on these Sundays and helped to raise money for our Church funds. As part of the Social Sundays we were able to hold a Fashion Event in Church, thanks to Jenny and Pat. We also held a Pet Service again, and many dogs and their owners were prayed for by name. Churches Together held two Kidz Days on Tod's Piece. It was good to be able to engage with some of the young people of the town. A great time was had by all, children and leaders alike.

I celebrated 10 years as your Rector on Sunday 19<sup>th</sup> September. I would like to say again that it has been a privilege to have been your Rector over the last 10 years and you all hold a special place in my heart and my prayers. September also was the time we celebrated our Harvest Festival. We usually celebrate Harvest as Churches Together, which was not physically possible with restrictions, but we still managed to celebrate at the same time and to share the same Sermon given by Rev Bekkie Wright from the Methodist Church on all our screens. During the early part of the year Ian Cripps and Debbie ran the Beyond Ourselves Course, for those who wanted to know more about faith. Following on from that, September saw the launch of our House Groups and a good number of people signing up to be part of a House Group. Thank you to Anna and Debbie who have led groups over the year. If you are not a member of a House Group and would like to consider membership of one, please let myself or Debbie know, and we can match you up with a group.

Having created a Worship Committee, we spent a lot of time looking at our pre Covid worship and whether that reflected who we were and who we wanted to be. From those meetings the PCC decided to make some subtle changes to our worship and to add a more informal outreach Service called *Come Rejoice* on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Saturday and 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday of the month. This has been going well, and we are beginning to get new people to attend, especially on the Saturday evenings.

September also saw the hardy few setting off on the Churches Together Pilgrimage to Launde Abbey. The less hardy few gathered at Launde for afternoon tea and a final act of worship in the Chapel. Thank you once again to Richard and Nick for organising the day and keeping the walkers in check.

It was really special this year to be able to celebrate Remembrance Sunday in style. Despite keeping numbers down, we had 225 people joining in our Service and Act of Remembrance. Thank you to Richard, the choir and all who put so much hard work into making this the Service that it is.

In November, the choir held a concert called *Saints & Angels* where we were treated to a variety of different music on the theme. Thank you to John and all the Choir for their hard work not just for this but for over the whole year. I would also like to thank them for putting up with the everchanging landscape of rules and regulations.

Christmas came with no new restrictions on our worship, and the ability to sing, meaning we could celebrate with heart and voice. This year the Festival of 9 Lessons and Carols could be a live event, making it special for choir and congregation alike. Over the Christmas period we had 90 communicants, with a further 20 the following day which happened to be a Sunday.

It was lovely to be able to welcome people back to church for the Occasional Offices. We had two weddings and two blessings of marriage as well as 6 children baptised. Sadly, the number of funerals held up with members of our team doing over 25 funerals in Church and at the Crematorium. Among those who died during the year were some much loved and valued members of our Church community. This year we said farewell to Joan Taylor, Joan Tyler, Christine Ellingworth, Donald Goodyer, Margaret Demaine and Shirley Harris. We were very shocked by the deaths of Margaret and Shirley, as they had both been such lively and active members of our Church family right up until the end. They will both be greatly missed for their dedication and hard work, their friendship and their deep abiding faith. We send their families and the families of all who have died our deepest sympathies at this time. We also hosted Pat Taylor's funeral in Church. Pat was a Methodist and her service was taken by Bekkie Wright, but we remember Pat as a member of our Mother's Union.

Despite all the restrictions, it seems that we have had a reasonably busy year. Alongside all that I have mentioned, we have continued to thrive in so many ways, as you will see from the booklet that Jenny has put together for this evening.

Finally, I would like to say thank you to Jenny for all she does to keep me sane, especially all the paperwork that makes times like tonight go smoothly. To Jeff, Richard and Anne for all they do as Church Warden and Assistant Church Wardens. Especially all they have done to keep people safe during covid without making things difficult. To Debbie who brings enthusiasm and care to all she does. Our retired clergy and Readers who give us the time and space to step back occasionally. To Nicky who in the background makes things look proper and keeps us in our place. Most of all thank you to all of you for being who you are and for all that you bring to this family of St Peter and St Paul. Thank YOU!!




