The Collect (Opening Prayer) for the Second Sunday of Epiphany

Almighty God, in Christ you make all things new: transform the poverty of our nature by the riches of your grace, and in the renewal of our lives make known your heavenly glory; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen.**

The Reading from the New Testament – Revelation 5:1-10

Then I saw in the right hand of the one seated on the throne a scroll written on the inside and on the back, sealed with seven seals; and I saw a mighty angel proclaiming with a loud voice, 'Who is worthy to open the scroll and break its seals?' And no one in heaven or on earth or under the earth was able to open the scroll or to look into it. And I began to weep bitterly because no one was found worthy to open the scroll or to look into it. Then one of the elders said to me, 'Do not weep. See, the Lion of the tribe of Judah, the Root of David, has conquered, so that he can open the scroll and its seven seals.'

Then I saw between the throne and the four living creatures and among the elders a Lamb standing as if it had been slaughtered, having seven horns and seven eyes, which are the seven spirits of God sent out into all the earth. He went and took the scroll from the right hand of the one who was seated on the throne. When he had taken the scroll, the four living creatures and the twenty-four elders fell before the Lamb, each holding a harp and golden bowls full of incense, which are the prayers of the saints. They sing a new song:

'You are worthy to take the scroll and to open its seals, for you were slaughtered and by your blood you ransomed for God saints from every tribe and language and people and nation; you have made them to be a kingdom and priests serving our God, and they will reign on earth.'

The Gospel Reading – John 1:43-51

The next day Jesus decided to go to Galilee. He found Philip and said to him, 'Follow me.' Now Philip was from Bethsaida, the city of Andrew and Peter. Philip found Nathanael and said to him, 'We have found him about whom Moses in the law and also the prophets wrote, Jesus son of Joseph from Nazareth.' Nathanael said to him, 'Can anything good come out of Nazareth?' Philip said to him, 'Come and see.' When Jesus saw Nathanael coming towards him, he said of him, 'Here is truly an Israelite in whom there is no deceit!' Nathanael asked him, 'Where did you come to know me?' Jesus answered, 'I saw you under the fig tree before Philip called you.' Nathanael replied, 'Rabbi, you are the Son of God! You are the King of Israel!' Jesus answered, 'Do you believe because I told you that I saw you under the fig tree? You will see greater things than these.' And he said to him, 'Very truly, I tell you, you will see heaven opened and the angels of God ascending and descending upon the Son of Man.'

PUBLIC WORSHIP AND PRIVATE PRAYER

A repeat of the notice from last week. All public worship (services in church) is currently suspended. Please listen to the recorded audio service at 1000 on Sundays and, if you really want to receive Holy Communion, come to church (on Sundays) between 1100 and 1230. You will be admitted alone (or as a couple) for a brief prayer with me and Communion from the Reserved Sacrament. **There will be no celebration of the Eucharist on Sundays or Thursdays** until we receive further guidance from the Government and Diocese. The Bishop of Chichester has given permission for his priests to celebrate the Eucharist alone: I will do that in order to replenish the Reserved Sacrament.

The church building will remain open for **private prayer** Monday to Saturday from 1400-1500.

We will no longer providing printed copies of **The Lookout** except to anyone who cannot access it online. If you need to have a copy delivered, please let me know.

I will not visit people in their homes unless in a real pastoral emergency, which I am permitted to do: 'religious staff' are listed as Government Keyworkers.

Let us pray for one another and worship God in the new way that we discovered in the first national lockdown last year. Please take the greatest care of yourselves. May God bless us all.
