5. Verse 18 speaks of *‘our present sufferings’*. What kind of sufferings do you think Paul is referring to, and how does he encourage believers to view them in light of the glory to come? How might our sufferings differ to those of Paul in his time?
6. In verses 19-22, how does Paul describe the creation's current state, and what is its hope? How can believers play a role in the redemption and renewal of creation?
7. Verses 26-27 talk about the Holy Spirit interceding for us with groanings too deep for words. What significance does this have in our prayer life, and how does it relate to our weakness and dependence on God?
